COUNTY SCOTT ACT CASE

A first offense against the Canada Temperance Act was acknowledged before the police magistrate Monday afternoon by Herbert Jamieson of Canterbury Station, on whose premises a quantity of liquor was seized some days ago by Constable Henry Currie, acting for Canada Temperance Act Inspector Timmins. A fine of fifty dollars with costs was imposed.

NOT INTOXICATING LIQUOR

Deputy Sheriff J. F. Timmins, Canada Temperance Act Inspector for York County has received from Analyst Paddock of St. John the result of the analysis of the liquid seized at "The Farm" when that place was raided some time ago. The alcoholic strength exceeds very little the percentage of one and is considerably below the percentage which under the Canada Temperance Act is necessary for the classification of liquor as intoxicating.

ONE YEAR AGO TODAY.

The first news of the greatest marine disaster in the history of the world, the foundering of the White Star liner Titanic, with nearly 1,600 people in mid-Atlantic, was given to the world just a year ago today. A brief despatch announced that the Titanic had struck an iceberg and that the steamer Virginian was hastening to her assistance. The next despatch told of the appalling loss of life and the hardships of the survivors.

The deceased had been in failing health for the past three months, during which time she was devotedly nursed by her daughter, Isabel. WITH HEAVY LOSS ON
ACCOUNT OF BRIDGE

Much Business Kept Out of City---
Matter Referred to at Board of
Trade Meeting Last
Night

The absence of means of proper communication with St. Mary's and Gibson for vehicles and pedestrians, is the cause of general complaint on the part of merchants of the city who are meeting with heavy loss in business through the interruption of traffic caused by the carrying out the draw-span of the Highway Bridge. That loss has been estimated at a thousand dollars per day by a prominent merchant and is being very much felt.

At last night's meeting of the Board of Trade Secretary H. S. Campbell brought up the matter. He said he did not wish to criticize unduly but that something should be done to restore means of communication with St. Mary's. All merchants were affected by the accident to the bridge and immediate action was required.

Mr. G. Y. Dibble, secretary of the Transportation Committee of the board, in reply to Mr. Campbell, stated that he had conferred with Mr. A. R. Wetmore, engineer of the Public Works Department, in connection with the matter and had been told that there was nothing that could be done at present to restore structure on piles could not be built of the bridge. A suspension bridge was out of the question as it would impede navigation and a temporary structure on piled could not be built until lumber was secured. Mr. W. J. Scott had been engaged to secure piling but the ice-jam at Springhill had prevented its being brought to the city. Mr. D. C. Burpee of Gibson, who had the contract for building the temporary structure, was ready to begin work whenever materials arrived.

The George property at St. Mary's was sold under foreclosure at noon today and bid in by Mr. J. J. F. Winslow, acting for the National Drug and Chemical Company for \$2850. Messrs Shipp and Hanson acted for the mortgagee Mr. A. B. Kitchen.

LAST SITTINGS
OF SUPREME COURT
AS CONSTITUTED

Change Under New Act to go In'o
Effect Probably Before June Sittings
Rumors Regarding New
Judge

The Supreme Court will resume April sittings tomorrow adjournment having been made last week on account of the death of the late Ex-Chief Justice Tuck of St. John. The sittings probably will be the last held under the present organization of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, it being expected that before the June sittings the act under which the organization is changed will go into effect.

Under the new system there will be a Court of Appeal and a Trial Court. Another judge is to be added to the bench under the new arrangement. Several names have been mentioned in connection with the new judgeship. Mr. O. S. Crockett, M.P., is one of the possibilities and Hon. W. C. H. Grimmer is also named in that connection.

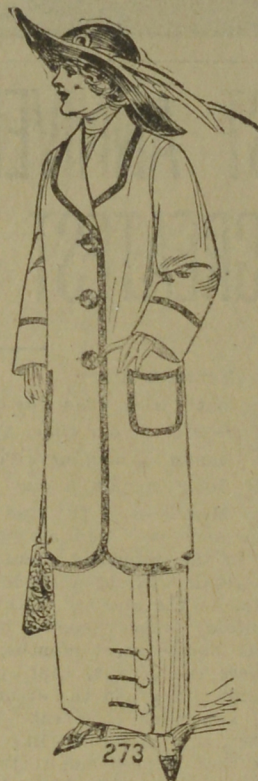

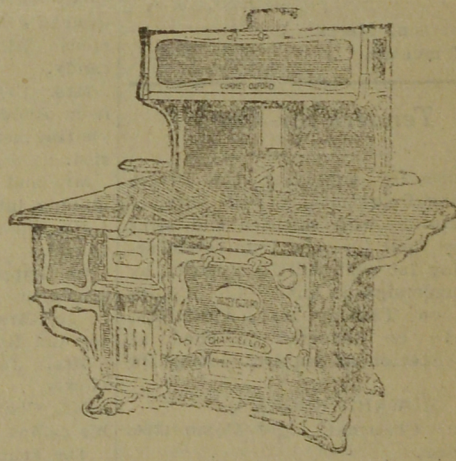
