Forty Thousand Dollars Ru-  
mored as Purchase Price—  
Mr. Colter Declined to  
Discuss Matter.

Ashley A. Colter of this city has purchased the property in this city known as Frogmore located immediately south of the C. P. R. tracks and fronting on Regent street. The property has belonged to the FitzRandolph family for many years and was the residence of Allan FitzRandolph up to the time of his removal to St. John to become associated with the lumbering business of Randolph & Baker. The late A. FitzRandolph, his father also occupied the property.

Twenty Acres in Property.

Mr. Colter declined today to discuss his purchase but it is understood that he will occupy the residence himself the furnishings being included in the transaction. The amount mentioned in connection with the transfer is forty thousand dollars. The property includes twenty acres of land and is one of the best residential properties in this city.

Used By Governor General.

Frogmore at the time of the visit of His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught to Fredericton in his capacity as Governor General of Canada several years ago, was used as his residence because of lack of an official Government House here.

Suspended Sentence.

An aged resident of Kingsclear who was charged with illicit fishing in the waters of the St. John, pleaded guilty and was given a suspended sentence, Thursday in the Police Court. The offence occurred last year and the accused has remained in hiding ever since.

Pleaded Not Guilty.

A local man charged with two violations under the Game Act, one of killing a deer and the other of carrying rifle both out of season, pleaded not guilty to both charges Thursday in Police Court. Owing to the fact that one of the witnesses was sick and the Chief Game Warden was out of town, hearing in the case was set for Thursday April 27th.

Fined For Assault.

A resident of Victoria Mills was Thursday fined \$10 and costs in the Police Court for assaulting a resident of Stanley one evening this week. It seems that the Stanley man has been visiting in this city and has been paying attention to the defendant's young lady who is a member of the staff of one of the local hotels. The offence occurred on Queen street in the presence of the young lady who appeared as one of the witnesses in the trial.

G. W. V. A. Monthly Meeting.

At the regular monthly meeting of the G. W. V. A. held Thursday evening, the secretary, John S. Scott presented his monthly report showing that \$49.57 had been distributed in relief work and that fifty-three cases had been adjusted in the Clean Sweep Campaign during the past month by the local branch. Membership is steadily increasing, over fifty having been admitted since last October. Finances are in an excellent condition, a good balance being in the treasury.

MUST RESIGN

FRICITION IN FORCE  
HAS THAT RESULT

Reorganized Police Commis-  
sion Held its First Meeting  
Thursday Night — Motor  
Speeding to be Stopped.

Because of friction between Chief of Police Finley and Patrolman G. Alex. Murray the Police Commission will ask for the resignation of the patrolman. This action is taken by the reorganized commission composed of W. A. B. McLellan, Mayor J. A. Reid and Police Magistrate Limerick. Special instructions to stop motor-speeding have been issued. No appointment in the place of Murray will be made at the present time.

The first meeting of the new Commission was held Thursday night and was several hours in duration many matters being discussed.

Better Street Lighting.

A report from Chief of Police Finley was before the commissioners and dealt with activities of the force during the past month. Among other matters referred to was the poorly lighted conditions of the city streets. It is expected that the Commission will draw the attention to the City Council to the situation and will suggest that some improvement in the street lighting be made as soon as possible.

Friction in Force.

Acting upon a section of the Chief's report relating to internal dissension in the force, the Commission decided to ask for the resignation of Patrolman G. Alex. Murray and his retirement from the Police Department will be effective on May 1st. He has been a member of the force for several years, having been appointed soon after Chief Finley took charge of the department. Last autumn Patrolman Murray was suspended for two days by Chief Finley for alleged insubordination.

After Speeding-Motorists.

The Commission issued instructions to Chief Finley that there must be a more efficient enforcement of the Traffic Regulations, which will remain in effect until new regulations have been compiled as soon as the board have the Act passed at the recent session of the Legislature before them. The Chief was instructed to have attention devoted especially to a prevention of speeding and the purchase of an additional stopwatch (Continued on page four.)

THEFT OF FUNDS  
FROM CHURCH IS  
THE CHARGE

DOUGLAS BAPTISTS  
HAVE INTERNAL DISPUTE

Ray Parent of Douglas in Police  
Court on Unusual Accusa-  
tion—Is Defending  
Case.

Ray Parent, a resident of Douglas, York County, upon a summons appeared in the Police Court this morning to answer a charge of theft of funds belonging to the United Baptist Church, Douglas.

Repair Work on Church.

It seems that certain repair work has been done to this church lately and a new steeple erected. A committee was appointed with Ray Parent as treasurer to raise sufficient money for this purpose and to carry on the work. A shortage in Parent's accounts of \$560 is claimed by the committee the members of which however owing to the lack of a proper book-keeping system are not in a position to prove a shortage of over \$330 and he is therefore charged with purloining the latter amount.

Magistrate.

E. Allison McKay, Sitting Magistrate is hearing the case because of the fact that recently Police Magistrate Limerick through the instigation of both the committee and Parent tried to act as a mediator in having the accounts properly adjusted. At the time, he was successful but lately more friction has occurred with the result that after an unsuccessful attempt on the part of a local law firm, Hanson and Dougherty, to secure a settlement, the matter is being finally aired in the Police Court.

The case this morning was not completed and the hearing will be resumed this afternoon. P. J. Hughes is conducting the prosecution while G. H. F. Teed of St. John is appearing for the defendant.

Death of Mrs. Hillman.

The death occurred Thursday evening at the home of her son-in-law, Lloyd Camerson, Saunders street, of Mrs. Jerusha Hillman, widow of the late Edmund Hillman. The deceased was seventy-nine years of age and succumbed after a lingering illness. She is survived by five sons, five daughters, three brothers and three sisters. The funeral announcement will be made later.




