**Building Will be Moved and
Used as Nurses' Home—
Great Assistance to the
Hospital.**

P. J. Hughes of the Board of Trustees of Victoria Public Hospital, has received advices from Ottawa giving permission for the use of the east wing of the D. S. C. R. Hospital on the Old Government House property, as a Nurses' Home for the Hospital. The building has been examined by competent builders and it had been declared feasible to move the structure from its present site the distance of a couple of hundred yards to the Victoria Hospital property. To do that the building will be cut in two.

Pressing Need of Hospital

Accommodation for the nurses has been one of the pressing needs at Victoria Hospital for some time. Negotiations have been carried on with Ottawa for some time relative to the use of one of the buildings formerly used by the D. S. C. R. The answer received giving permission has been decidedly gratifying to the Hospital Board.

TWO CASES IN DIVORCE COURT TO NEXT TERM

COMMISSION FOR
WOODSTOCK EVIDENCE

**Several Witnesses heard Wednesday in Stairs vs Stairs—
Richardson Case Begun
This Morning.**

Before the Divorce Court this morning the case of Mary Richardson vs William James Richardson was taken up. J. F. H. Teed appeared as proctor. This case is from St. John the name of the plaintiff previous to marriage being Muford. The defendant husband served overseas and after his return went to New York. Upon visiting him there the wife found that he had been guilty of infidelity, the co-respondent being unknown.

R. W. L. Tibbits, deputy provincial secretary, gave evidence of the registration of the clergyman who married the parties in the case.

The plaintiff gave evidence of her marriage and the infidelity of the husband.

Recess then was taken.

Case Stands

Wednesday afternoon the case of George Murray Cusack vs Margaret Cusack evidence was completed. His Honor Judge Crocket stated that he was not satisfied with the evidence produced but on the application of E. Allison MacKay who appeared for Frank A. McCully, proctor, would let the case stand for further testimony next term. This case comes from Alward, Queen's County. The parties were married at Nairn, Scotland, while the husband was overseas. After coming to Canada the wife left her husband and went to live with her parents in Toronto.

Commission at Woodstock

In the case of Hugh J. Stairs vs Mildred H. Stairs G. Earle Logan appeared as proctor. The defendant previous to marriage was Mildred Fleming residing in Woodstock. A co-respondent named Ring was named in this case. Witnesses examined were F. J. Twitchell, W. A. Wakem, Gerald G. Anglin and the plaintiff were examined. The plaintiff told of infidelity on the part of the wife while he was overseas and of the birth of an illegitimate child in 1917 or 1918.

Application of G. Earle Logan for a commission to issue at Woodstock for the taking of the evidence of Rev. Mr. Gibson as to authority to perform marriage, was granted.

The case stands until January.

APPEAL TO BE MADE IN TWO LIQUOR CASES

DISMISSED BY
POLICE MAGISTRATE

Status of Inspector Saunders as Official of Customs Dept. Questioned — Adjournment for Evidence.

Chief Inspector J. B. Hawthorne stated this morning that his department would enter appeal in the case of William Chase charged with having liquor in his possession at a place other than his private dwelling and the case of John King charged with giving liquor at a place other than his private dwelling, both of which were dismissed by Police Magistrate Limerick.

The case against King was dismissed last week. In that the evidence showed that a pint bottle of "moonshine" was given three young men on their way to a Holy Roller service but not in the dwelling of the accused but in the barn.

The case against Chase was heard Wed. afternoon. Evidence showed that the premises of Chase were visited by inspectors during the absence of the owner. Three bottles alleged to contain intoxicating liquor were found in a barn.

Question of Status

The case against William Chase for violation of the Inland Revenue Act by having in his possession wash from which spirituous liquors could be made also came up on Wednesday. J. J. F. Winslow for the defence took objection and asked for the dismissal of the case on the ground that Inspector Fraser Saunders was not an official of the Customs Department and could not lay information. Letters were produced by P. J. Hughes for the prosecution to prove that authority had been given Inspector Saunders by the department. Adjournment until the 28th was made to give the prosecution an opportunity to obtain proof of the authority of the official.

Edmundson Case

An Inland Revenue case against James Edmundson also was heard. Evidence was given by Chief Inspector Hawthorne, Inspector Fraser Saunders and James Snaw of Scotch Lake. The case then was adjourned until the 20th.

All these cases resulted from activity of officers after "moonshiners" in the western part of York County.
