

LOUIS MARS ARRESTED FOR MOONSHINING

SPANIARD CAUGHT AT CLAUDY SETT.

Officials Had Been After Him For Some Time—Nothing Found at His Residence.

Louis Mars, a Spaniard was arrested this morning by Chief of Police Finley at Claudy, parish of Douglas charged with violating the Inland Revenue Act. The information was laid by Sub-inspector Fraser Saunders who accompanied the Chief of Police on his early morning drive. They arrived in this city about noon accompanied by their prisoner who it is claimed has been manufacturing the forbidden liquor for the past year, unmolested. They got the man but not the goods, the still not being located.

The prisoner came up before Magistrate Limerick and was remanded to jail until Thursday, March 16th when his case will be heard.

Not First Attempt.

This is the second or third attempt made by officers of the law to apprehend the apparently elusive foreigner. Although little has been disclosed by those higher up it is understood that an early morning trip out to Claudy some time ago was not quite so successful, neither the man nor the hooch being found. The still was not discovered this morning either but it is claimed that the officers who made the arrest are in possession of sufficient information to obtain a conviction.

About a year ago the late Mr. McGregor underwent an operation at Montreal from which he never fully recovered.

Property Transfer

J. C. Vermeeran, who conducts the Uncle Sam's Exchange, has bought the residence of Ald. Harold M. Young, 339 King Street and intends to transform the ground floor into a store to carry on his business. The price paid is understood to be in the vicinity of \$3,500. Mr. Vermeeran will occupy this new site about May 1st removing from his present location which was formerly occupied by the Fredericton Cooperative Ltd., a store which was started by the Fredericton Labor Council, but ceased to exist about a year ago.

Langley Case Dismissed.

In the Police Court yesterday afternoon the case against James A. Langley accused of a serious offence against a young girl of 13 was dismissed for lack of corroborative evidence. The girl and her mother were represented by counsel yesterday but because no new witnesses were produced, the Magistrate deeming the evidence insufficient and lacking in detail dismissed the case.

The girl is apparently weak-minded and her description of the circumstances surrounding the case lacked cleanliness. She had never seen Langley prior to his attack and her mother had never seen the two of them together. Such evidence was therefore not sufficient to obtain a conviction and so Langley has been freed without the necessity of his establishing any defence.

NEW THEATRE WILL HAVE FRONT ON KING STREET

F. G. SPENCER SAYS BUSINESS DEPRESSED

House Will Have Seating Capacity All on One Floor—Building to Start Next Month.

The construction of the new theatre to be built by Fred G. Spencer of St. John at the corner of King and Carleton streets on the site of the old "Gem" which was destroyed by a fire over two years ago, will be commenced towards the latter part of April, and will be finished before September. The contract has not yet been awarded.

To Front on King Street.

The new building when completed will occupy a space 150 feet long and 105 feet wide, and will seat between seven and eight hundred people. It will be constructed of brick and will front on King street. No estimate of the cost has been disclosed. The seating will be all on one floor.

The site is owned by the University of New Brunswick but was leased to Mrs. David M. Richards. Mr. Spencer has taken over the lease from her.

Business Depressed.

When asked respecting the present business depression and its effect on the moving picture industry Mr. Spencer who is at present in the city said that his business had been hit just as hard and perhaps harder than most. Attendance had fallen off at every theatre. People did not have the money to spend on luxuries and so they stayed away from the movies. As business progressed however, attendance would increase.

A proposition has been made to the city that the new theatre be permitted to extend from King street to the line of the street lighting property the city in return taking a right of way from King street.

Palmer-McLellan Won.

The leadership of A section of the Commercial League was decided last night when the Palmer-McLellan team defeated R. Chestnut and Sons by a score of 3 to 1. The game was played on soft ice and was accordingly not very fast. Palmer-McLellan will now meet the leaders of B. section for the championship of the league when the tie in that section is finally dissolved.

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LORD MORLEY, HIS PLACE IN RECENT HISTORY

FIRST LECTURE UNDER ENGLISH ASSOCIATION

Prof. Malcolm Wallace of Toronto University Interesting Speaker—Morley's Views on Ireland and India.

Last evening at the City Y. M. C. A. a fairly large audience listened with rapt attention to the lecture which Prof. Malcolm Wallace Ph. D., of University College, Toronto delivered on "Lord Morley". This is the first of a series of lectures which will be delivered under the auspices of the N. B. branch of the English Association. Theodore Goodrich Roberts is scheduled to deliver the next on Thursday March 23rd, his subject being "Truth and Fiction."

Supporter of Rationalism.

The lecturer last evening traced the life history of Lord Morley from the time when as a young man he was graduated from Oxford in 1859, not educated in the general meaning of the word, but rather possessed of a broad conception of human nature. He did not go into the ministry as his father had intended but took up journalism instead. We soon find him in politics the most rationalistic of Liberals. In 1883 after two previous unsuccessful attempts he was finally elected, representing Newcastle at London. There we see him a co-leader with Chamberlain and a staunch supporter of Rationalism. In 1908 he was elevated to a seat in the House of Lords. From 1905 to 1910 he was Secretary of State for India, during which period Lord Minto was Viceroy. Although differing in many matters of policy they had the greatest respect for one another's opinion, the letters which passed between them clearly showing this.

Irish Journal.

Prof. Wallace read several extracts from these letters of Lord Morley as well as from his "Irish Journal." The extracts from the latter in particular delighted his audience, disclosing an intimate and delightful knowledge of the simplicity of Irish life and a ready sympathy for the aims and aspirations of the Irish people. Lord Morley pitied the poor of all countries declaring that in England life was "a paradise for the wealthy, a purgatory for the able, and a hell for the poor."

At the conclusion of this most interesting lecture, a vote of thanks moved by His Worship Mayor Reid was extended to Prof. Wallace.

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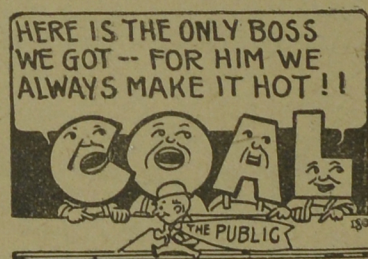
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
