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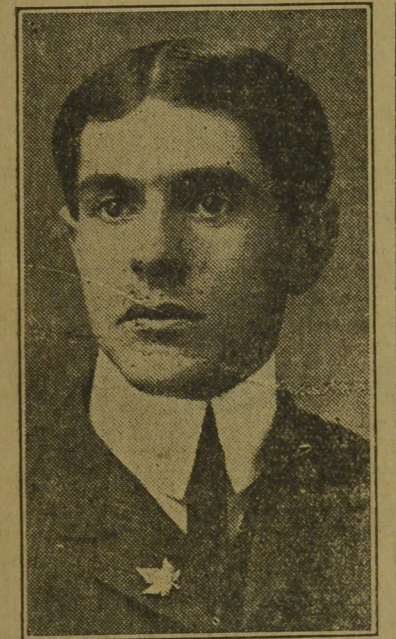
ROBICHAUD ELECTED BY ACCLAMATION

BLOODLESS VICTORY IN GLOUCESTER

Nomination Proceedings Passed off Quietly—New Member Returns Thanks.

Bathurst, N. B., Nov. 20—John G. Robichaud M. P. F., the Liberal candidate was elected by acclamation today to represent Gloucester in the House of Commons, succeeding to the seat left vacant by the appointment of Onesiphore Turgeon to the Senate. The proceedings at the court house here were quietly concluded.

The nomination of Mr. Robichaud

was filled and when no other nominations were received Sheriff A. J. Meahan declared Mr. Robichaud elected. There was a large audience present but the lack of a contest kept the interest from reaching a high pitch.

After the declaration of the sheriff Seraphin Leger, M. P. P. took the chair and there were several speeches.

The new member of parliament thanked the voters of the constituency for their support. He announced that although his home was in Shippegan he would open an office in Bathurst where he would be present frequently so that his constituents might consult with him when necessary.

Senator Turgeon thanked the people of the constituency for the support they had given him in years past and he offered to assist the new member in every possible way.

J. A. Doucet whose name had been before the convention when Mr. Robichaud was nominated offered his support to the new member and expressed his willingness to do all in his power to advance the Liberal interests.

Hon. Peter J. Veniot provincial minister of public works told of the good work of Mr. Robichaud while in a member of the legislature and as chairman of the corporations committee. He was sure that the new member would be a credit to his province while in the Federal House. He was sorry to lose him from the local House but he agreed with the expression of the convention. If he displayed the same ability and energy in Ottawa that he did in Fredericton he would be a success.

Some newspapers had been offering suggestions as to his own career Mr. Veniot said but he felt that he was still capable of doing these matters for himself.

He also mentioned the fact that the Conservatives had not nominated a candidate and he felt sure that this was an appreciation of the action of Mackenzie King who had honored the constituency by appointing Senator Turgeon to his new position.

CANADA MAY YET FLOW WITH MILK AND HONEY

London Papers Comment on the Montreal Speech of Lord Shaughnessy.

London, Nov. 21—Inspired by the speech made by Lord Shaughnessy in Montreal on Thursday last the Daily Telegraph devoted an unusually long leading editorial to the matter enthusiastically predicting a great future for Canada.

The Telegraph says the advance made by Canada in the past two of three decades out rivaling even the United States in the period following the war between the Northern and Southern States may tempt Canada to be over cautious in adding to cast up the balance sheet in calculating assets against liabilities they can face the future with confidence.

Canadians are heirs to a land the Telegraph says which in the course of a century or less can under a policy of courage and wisdom be made capable of supporting 100,000,000 men and women and a land which may yet run with milk and honey.

Lord Shaughnessy's speech which is commented on by the London Daily Telegraph was made to the Kiwanis Club of Montreal on Thursday. His subject was "Immigration Selected and Directed." He declared that as Canada had but a sparse population to meet its enormous liabilities an immediate influx of desirable settlers was imperative in the interests of the Dominion's prosperity and happiness. Lord Shaughnessy charged that practically nothing had been done in the past eight years to attract settlers to Canada.

Hope World Peace May Result From Lausanne Conference

OPTIMISTIC NOTE IN SPEECHES OF DELEGATES AT THE OPENING—REAL BUSINESS TO BE TAKEN UP TODAY—STRONG DELEGATION FROM FAR-AWAY JAPAN—STRONG MAN OF ITALY IS MUCH IN EVIDENCE.

Lausanne, Nov. 20—Hope that peace on earth would result from the labors of the Near Eastern conference was expressed by the speakers at the brief opening session today.

This sentiment was voiced first by President Haab of the Swiss confederation, who presided over the opening of the plenary meeting and it was dwelt upon by both Lord Curzon and Ismet Pasha in their remarks on behalf of the numerous delegations assembled in the Lausanne casino, where the impressive inaugural ceremony was held.

Today's sitting required but a short half hour, and tomorrow morning the business of the conference will be actively begun.

U. S. ACTIVITY IN CONFERENCE

The prospects of the United States activity in the conference which many of the foreigners appeared to interpret as the launching of a new American policy in Europe, and the presence of a strong delegation from far away Japan, gave worldwide significance to the conclave.

Benito Mussolini, the new strong man of Italy, with his air of alert determination, drew all eyes as he moved to his place not far from the white haired and white headed Venizelos, whose activities and popularity practically forced the abdication of a Grecian king and who is here to apply all his diplomatic skill to save what he can for his country in the peace with Turkey, which the conference is to formulate.

Venizelos sat inscrutable under the accusations of the chief Turkish plenipotentiary, Ismet Pasha, that the Greek army, without justification, had systematically devastated the Turkish countryside and made a million innocent Turks homeless, hungry, wanderers. The Ottoman nation wants peace with all, Ismet told his hearers, but he warned them that lasting peace must be founded upon mutual respect of national liberty and independence.

Lord Curzon wanted Lausanne to make a final peace of all. He pledged England's whole-souled support in this cause. It is understood that the difficulty in satisfying Italy rose from the Italian contention that in the treaty of Sevres which the present conference must revise Italy's national rights in the Near Eastern insufficiently represented and protected. Italy will in the Lausanne negotiations insist on what she considers her legitimate aspirations, and, above all, treatment on an equal basis with Great Britain and France.

LIBERALS TAKE THREE SEATS OUT OF FIVE

Ottawa, Nov. 20—As a result of today's official nominations for candidates to fill the five vacant federal constituencies, there will be only two election contests. As forecasted, Liberal candidates in the constituencies of Megantic and Jacques Cartier, Que., and Gloucester, N. B., were acclaimed. Eusebe Roberge, of Laurierville, is the member for Megantic; Theodule Rheame will represent Jacques Cartier, and John G. Robichaud is member for Gloucester. These constituencies were all represented by Liberals in the last Parliament. In Lanark, Ont., there is a straight fight between Dr. R. F. Preston, Conservative, and David Findlay, Liberal. Both candidates live in Carleton Place. The contest in Halifax is a three-cornered one, with no conservative in the field. Hon. R. E. Finn, minister without portfolio in the Nova Scotia government and official candidate of the Liberal party, is opposed by J. J. Power, K. C., running as an Independent Liberal, and James O'Connell, representing Labor. Mr. Finn has been member for Halifax in the Nova Scotia legislature since 1906.

LONGEVITY SECRET IS OUTLINED

Discoveries Give Light on Re-building Corpuscles to Renew the Tissues.

New York, Nov. 21—Discoveries of the tissue-building activities of the white-blood corpuscles believed by scientists to point the way to the indefinite prologation of a man's life were outlined today by Dr. Alexis Carrell of the Rockefeller Institute in an address before the National Academy of Sciences.

Dr. Carrell's statements were taken by many prominent scientists in his audience to indicate that the secret of longevity might be found through the discovery of a means of stimulating the activity of these corpuscles.

Dr. Carrell described the work of the leucocytes, or white blood corpuscles which experiments had shown he said protected the body against infection and also stimulated the growth of new tissue and the regeneration of dormant cells.

He told of his experiments with animals which had indicated that the white blood corpuscles stimulated the growth of the new tissue "by getting free growth activating substances in the tissues". He pointed out that in extreme old age new tissue grew to heal wounds and broke bones.

Hideyo Houguchi a Japanese scientist who is also a member of the Rockefeller Institute announced he had developed an anti-serum for Rocky Mountain spotted fever which now has a mortality rate of 70 per cent in the Rocky Mountain and Pacific Coast States.

Dr. Theobald Smith of the institute's Princeton laboratory announced his discovery that the rate of mortality among calves was considerably decreased by allowing the animals to nurse only fifteen minutes at their first meal and then changing them to ordinary milk. The calf he said was dependent for protection from disease upon properties in the milk of its mother.

BOOTLEG DEALS ARE ATTRIBUTED TO IMPORTERS

ARRESTS MADE IN PHILADELPHIA

Firm Had Permit to Supply Hospitals But Did Not Stop There.

Philadelphia, Nov. 21—Warrants were issued yesterday by United States Attorney Coles for the arrest of I. L. Lipschutz a wealthy importer and his son Milton W. Lipschutz they are charged with diverting \$1,000,000 worth of wines and liquors they had imported to the bootleg market.

Customs officers, prohibition agents postal authorities and secret service agents made a raid on the Lipschutz warehouse at 226 South street in the afternoon and confiscated more than 2400 cases of rare wines, whiskey and cordials and 249 casks of wine. The two men also will be charged with conspiracy to use the mails to defraud maintaining a nuisance conspiracy to commit an offense against the United States and issuing fraudulent and forged permits. If convicted Lipschutz and his son are liable to seven years in prison and large fines.

The Lipschutzes were in the importing business before the Prohibition Act. They obtained a basis permit to import liquor and to sell to legitimate users such as hospitals and drug stores. From August 1, 1920 Government agents charge the company imported 4580 cases of wines and cordials, 1509 cases of whiskey 435 cases of gin, 1100 cases of brandy and 530 cases of miscellaneous wines.

Three months ago agents became suspicious of several transactions and began an investigation. They found that on the return blanks of the company 1909 cases had been entered as sold to the New Jersey Drug Company 147 Orange Avenue, Newark N. J. and 100 cases of whiskey and wines to another concern.

Quigley and Connors prohibition agents say they learned those firms never received the goods. Further investigation, Assistant United States Attorney Friedman said, revealed that hundreds of vendor and vendors permits had been forged with the name of John T. Davis, State Prohibition Director. Mr. Friedman said that instead of selling the liquor to persons who were entitled to it the firm "bootlegged" it with fraudulent permits.

After those discoveries the agents went to the South street address and took possession of the premises and the liquors. Steps were taken immediately by the Collector of Internal Revenue to have the basic permit of the company revoked.

"There is no question in my mind," said Mr. Friedman "that the company has diverted more than \$1,000,000 worth of liquor to the bootleg market."

William A. Gray attorney for the accused men denied last night that the Lipschutzes has broken any law.

"They had a legal permit to import liquors into the country and every drop that was sold on a lawful permit in a legal manner. None of the liquors was diverted to the bootleg market by my clients and when the proper time comes we shall prove it."

Blueberry Lease Sold

At the Crown Land Office this morning a blueberry lease was sold to the applicant H. M. Balkam of Milltown at the upset price of one hundred dollars per year for a period of ten years. The land is located in the Parish of St. George, east of Magaguadavic River.
