

MAN SHOT BY NURSE IN HOTEL IN KANSAS

WAS READING HALL OF DOOM

Nurse Turned Revolver on Herself and Was Found in a Dying Condition.

Kansas, City, Mo., June 6—Frank Anderson, superintendent of the Jones department store, was found shot to death in a room in a hotel here early today.

Beside his body lay Miss Marie L. Beals, said by the police to be a nurse in a hospital in Springfield, Ill., a bullet wound in her side and her silken undergarments afire.

The nurse was registered at the hotel as Anderson's wife. She admitted, the police say, that she shot Anderson.

"Don't ask why I did it," she gasped, as hotel attaches crawled through a transom. "Ask him what he did."

Then she fainted. Beside the body of the woman lay a note containing the well known poem by Francis Bourdillon, reading:

The night has a thousand eyes
And the day but one,
And yet the light of the bright world
Dies
With the dying sun.

And the mind has a thousand eyes
And the heart but one,
Yet the light of a whole life
Dies
When love is done.

The note which was in the woman's handwriting, was on top of a book which had been opened at a chapter, "The Hall of Doom." Prefacing the chapter in the book was the picture of a woman, a dagger in her hand, standing beside the body of a slain man.

The chapter "Hall of Doom" began. "The room was empty save for herself and the still form of him—Jedak of Lothar—lying there at her feet."

At the hospital the woman, by nods of her head, told reporters she was not Anderson's wife, but declared he had promised to marry her. The police say they believe Anderson is a member of a prominent family in Camden, N. J., or Collingswood, N. J. He came here two months ago from St. Louis.

In the hotel room were found scattered newspaper accounts of murders and of "eternal triangle" cases. The story of Peggy Hopkins Joyce's escapades and of the men who were infatuated with her were among these. Love notes containing passionate passages, declared to have been signed by Anderson were also found.

Some unknown difference arose between the woman and Anderson after she came here from Springfield, and this led to her shooting Anderson and attempting to take her own life, the police authorities said.

The girl is said to have remarked to Mrs. Alice Leonard, Anderson's landlady, yesterday, "My husband has not been the same to me lately." At the same time Anderson went to the Midwest hotel, where the tragedy occurred, and told the clerk he would pay room rent for himself only—that "my wife is going back to Illinois."

"Mrs. Beals" told Mrs. Leonard she and Anderson had been married in a little Illinois town two years ago. Prior to that the girl said to Mrs. Leonard that she and Anderson had once parted, but "now I never expect to go back to nursing, we are so happy together."

U. S. BOXERS KNOCKED OUT

London, June 6—Sailors of the U. S. S. Utah fought a number of well known British service boxers in Portsmouth when six star bouts two Yankee gobs were knocked out and three outpointed by the Limeys. The only American winner was Benny Hilliard, former lightweight champion of the United States Navy who outpointed Ingram a naval steward. Sammy Markowitz, runner-up for the United States naval championship was outpointed in twelve rounds by Robertson of the Royal Field Artillery.

TO EXPOSE THE SOUL OF FAMOUS STATUARY

Finest Collection in the World to be Filmed and Shown to Public.

Paris, June 6—The directors of the Louvre have announced that the finest collection of statuary in the world soon will be filmed and shown to the public. The leaders of French art and science, particularly Baron L'Estimard de Constant, long have insisted that proper filming would enhance the value of the national collection a thousand fold. They point out that the beauty of great sculpture usually depends upon the illusion of movement conveyed and that this depends largely upon the light in which it is placed.

The superiority of the Louvre collection is partly due to the careful placing of the statues under diluted sunlight, which is stationary except as the sun moves from east to west. The most sensitive modern film camera controls the light almost absolutely and will, if properly operated, bring out the latent "soul" in each dead masterpiece.

The Louvre directors have already experimented with the famous seventeenth century head of Henry IV., which slowly revolved before the camera, displays on all sides realism that has been buried for generations.

A group of Greek treasures—notably the Winged Victory—are to be tried next to bring out even more movement than already is apparent in the celebrated work of the ancient sculptors. The pieces of Rodin, who is known to have often rebelled under the limitations of his clay, are expected to reveal marvels of liberated feeling under the new treatment.

WROTE WORDS IN THE SKY

London, June 6—A novel newspaper stunt has been attracting London crowds this week and giving them the aviation neck as they watched an airplane high in the sky write with a stream of white smoke the letters "Daily Mail." The stunt was first tried on Derby Day when betting on the big race was active.

The machine was easily 10,000 feet in the air, where there was no wind. When the word "Daily" had been written and the aviator was maneuvering to begin a new word the bookies asked what odds people would lay as to which one of half a dozen newspapers would be named. The smoke hung against the blue background and the letters were distinct for some time. The plane carried a smoke generator and powerful ejector, which forced jets of smoke in the trail of the machine as it climbed up and down in the air. It was estimated the space occupied by "Daily Mail" in the sky was more than three miles wide.

KING WORKS IN A GARDEN

Sofia, June 6—King Boris of Bulgaria has become his own gardener. He may be seen working and day at the palace grounds. He believes the time has come when kings must be something more than mere constitutional figureheads.

"In our country," he said, "every one must work. Our policy is one of productivity. Even my sisters (Princess Eudoxia and Princess Nadeja are doing their share. You will find them in the kitchen doing some useful household tasks. Kings as well as countries have their days of adversity and it is only through labor that we can regain our normal level."

No Bids For Lands

No bids were received at the Crown Land today for the General Coffyn lots in Victoria County. The site of the old Sussex cheese factory was sold to the Sussex Cheese and Butter Co., for the upset price of \$600. Other lots were sold at upset price except one hundred acres on Salmon River, Queen's County, which was bid by A. E. Hanson, Fredericton, for \$65.

Recommends Cut Twenty Per Cent in Miners' Wages

REPORT OF THE SCOTT BOARD OF CONCILIATION IS MADE PUBLIC AT OTTAWA—MINERS REPRESENTATIVE FAILED TO AGREE WITH THE CONCLUSIONS ARRIVED AT—WAGES MUST BE BASED ON PRICE OF COAL.

Ottawa, June 5—"We are of the opinion that the McKinnon award rates, with a reduction of twenty per cent in the wages of all employees, with a minimum of \$3 per day for fatal men over the age of eighteen years, should be adopted."

The above is the conclusion in regard to wages of the majority report of the Scott board of conciliation which investigated the dispute between the British Empire Steel Corporation, its subsidiaries, the Dominion Coal Co., Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Co., and the Acadia Coal Co. and their employees. The board which was appointed by Hon. James Murdock, minister of labor, after a policy of "strike on the job" had been declared in some of the Nova Scotia mines, consisted of D'Arcy Scott, Ottawa, chairman; John E. Moore, St. John, N. B., representing the employers, and I. D. Macdougall, of Inverness, N. S., representing the men.

The majority report was signed by Mr. Scott and Mr. Moore. Mr. Macdougall failed to agree with his associates, mainly in the matter of wages, and submitted a minority report.

The majority report says that too great a reduction in the data rates was made by the Gillen award. "We feel that the smaller the daily revenue of the worker, the less any reduction applicable to him should be," it said.

MINERS GET COAL AT \$2.25

It adds that in considering rates of pay, the board has taken into consideration that the company is supplying coal for domestic use to all miners at \$2.25 per ton, and houses at a rental much below the real value."

The majority report deals with the complaints of the miners under a number of heads, the first of which is "miners houses." It says that the houses supplied to the miners by the company are not in a satisfactory condition, and that many of them are so old and out of repair that they should be abandoned and pulled down. "This, however," it is added, "could not be done at present because there is a scarcity of suitable houses now available for the accommodation of the employees."

In regard to stoppage of work, the majority report states the other employs. Instead of the employees taking any such action, the matter should be brought to the attention of the mine manager or the superintendent and reasonable time should be allowed for the settlement of the dispute.

The wage question is the last dealt with in the majority report. It says that the remuneration to be paid to the employees must necessarily be governed by the price which the company is able to get for its coal. "In the present case, in fixing the highest rate of wage that we think the company can reasonably be expected to pay," the report says, "we must be guided to a considerable extent by the conditions of the coal market. We feel that we would be doing the miners a grave injustice if we were to fix a rate of wages so high as to prevent the company from being able to market its coal in competition with its competitors and still pay all necessary expenses."

SOVIET BETS ARE HIGH

Moscow, June 6—For the first time in five years horse racing has been resumed in Moscow. The opening meet was attended by a huge crowd despite the entrance fee being 1,000,000 rubles. The women present were clothed in the latest fashions and the new bourgeoisie rivaled the Soviet aristocrats in the art of spending money.

Much business was done at the totalsator, bets being transacted in figures of almost astronomic magnitude, so great were the sums wagered in paper rubles.

MILKMAN WINS \$25,000

Liverpool, June 6—A \$25,000 "pool" on a recent big race was won by a milk carrier, Charles Mitchell.

Wells, Eng., June 6—Trades union members of this district have declared a boycott of local barbers owing to their high prices for hair cuts and shaves.

ARMY BANDS PLAY ANTHEM

Dublin, June 6—Dublin on Saturday saw 7,000 British troops parade in Phoenix Park in a revival of the annual observance of the King's birthday. This was the first time a review had been held since 1914. Gen. Sir Nevil Macready, commander of the forces in Ireland, was the inspecting officer. The Royal Hibernian pensioners, veterans of the old Irish regiments some of which have already been disbanded and others are soon to be, were accorded places of honor. "God Save the King" was played by eighteen massed bands. After the inspection the officers and men doffed their caps and cheered repeatedly for King George.

PRACTISING ECONOMY

Washington, June 6—Germans are making clothes from cotton waste, so the Department of Commerce was advised by its Berlin Attaché today. Sweepings, rags, ends, clippings, silver and bobbin waste are being used.

ASCENDING TO A PERFECT MONOGAMY

Dr. Bernard Hollander Says That It Should be the Ideal of Mankind.

London, June 6—When we love as monkeys do we will be nearer a perfect monogamy according to Dr. Bernard Hollander, psychoanalyst, who added that man as he is now constituted can and does love more than one woman simultaneously. He said this explained the continued rush for divorces.

"I agree with Andre Tridon," said Dr. Hollander, "that the ordinary man can share his love between a tender, true woman who makes an ideal wife and a second woman who thrills him and stirs his emotions. The ideal of mankind should be monogamy, but a love for two or even more women at the same time is a psychological fact and cannot be controverted. A man who genuinely loves his wife may be attracted by another woman by purely emotional psychological influences. It is not merely a matter of sex impulse.

"We are slowly ascending toward a more perfect monogamy. I believe the human impulse is polygamous, but education has taught us that one mate is best for mankind. We have much to learn from the lower orders of nature about perfect monogamy. Among anthropoid apes, for example, you have an almost perfect instance of single attachment between male and female. The mother love of the ape is unparalleled in the animal world and scarcely equalled by mankind.

"We need restoration of the plain old fashioned sense of loyalty—loyalty which makes men stand by each other in peril should make men stand by their chosen partner in the battle of life. It is all a constant war between intemperance and control. The war has created an artificial sense of independence among women, but it is the natural home life environment that will prevail over what I believe is a passing phase."

RUSSELITE STARTED ROW

Vienna, June 6—J. F. Rutherford, an American propagandist for the Bible Research Society, encountered a stormy protest when he prophesied in a mass meeting that the end of the world was near and that many living men would enter the Messianic kingdom without dying. That announcement was received with sneers and laughter by the numerous Communists attending the lecture and a tremendous row followed.

When the Communists took possession of the platform and began to sing the "Internationale" Rutherford had to give up. The police cleared the hall.

Died in Hospital

The death of Percy Howland occurred in Victoria Hospital Monday night after a brief illness with diabetes. He had been admitted with an attack of typhoid fever. The deceased was aged twenty-seven years and is survived by a widow and children. Mrs. Tippet Rickard of Barker's Point is a sister.

After Short Illness

Joseph E. Patterson of Fredericton Junction passed away in Victoria Hospital early today after a short illness. He was aged sixty-three years. Three brothers survive, Samuel of South Bay, Robert of Wilmot, Carleton County, and Benjamin of Fredericton Junction. The funeral will take place at Fredericton Junction Thursday afternoon.

A short time ago a hen turkey belonging to Mr. Alonzo Staples was found dead in the nest, at his farm on Royal Road having been killed by a weazel. The bird was sitting on twenty five eggs which were nearly ready to hatch. The eggs were promptly removed to the house, and placed near the stove where in the course of a few days they hatched out fifteen sturdy, pullets. The youngsters were turned over to another turkey which had just brought out a small hatch and she accepted them with gladness.

MAINE MEN WANT TO HANG BENNY SWIM

A NUMBER OF APPLICATIONS

One Man Offered to Do the Job for \$300 — Other Bids Received.

Woodstock, June 5—No less than ten applications have been received by High Sheriff Albion R. Foster from points in the state of Maine, quoting a price to execute Benny Swim, who is condemned to die on July 15. A letter received today from a nearby Maine town, concerning the execution concludes with: "I will be pleased to do the work for \$300, etc." One very zealous New Englander drove up to the Sheriff's office in a big touring car and asked for a private interview which was granted. When the caller had announced his desire to perform the execution, the usually placid sheriff informed him that his desire and those of other gentlemen from over the border, would not be considered for a moment and surely indicated a depravity that was unspeakable. The man was unceremoniously ejected from the office.

In speaking of the matter, sheriff Foster said: "In nearly every mail I get a letter offering services for this execution and it is hard to believe that such moral degeneracy exists, as I consider men of this calibre degenerated in every sense of word. This is a horrible affair and officers of the law fully realize their own position and the duties assigned them and which must be legally carried out."

Swim in Bad Shape

Swim is in a deplorable state and is rapidly growing worse. He would never be known as the nattily dressed and unconcerned prisoner that was in court only a few weeks ago. Every stitch of clothing has been torn off and he is absolutely naked. If he continues in this state much longer he will be put in a straight-jacket as there is danger of his injuring himself. He seems lately to have acquired enormous strength and a few days ago when Sheriff Foster Deputy Rogers and the death watch took him from his cell for a wash and general cleaning up he fought like a tiger, and the three officers are carrying pronounced marks of the encounter, the deputy sheriff nearly losing two of his fingers.

Dr. J. V. Anglin, of St. John, who was sent here by the department of justice, spent there hours with the condemned man and will make an official report to the department. It is understood that Swim will be subject to further observation.

RILEY'S ARMY EN ROUTE HOME

Ottawa, June 5—After being addressed at Howick hall, at the exhibition grounds tonight by Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King and Hon. James Murdock, minister of labor, "General" Riley's army of unemployed started to march back to Toronto. The men expressed dissatisfaction with the answers given at their demands and queries. The march commenced at 9.45 p. m.

London, June 5—Viscount Grey, of Fallodon, and Lady Glenconner, were married yesterday at the parish church in Wilford County Wiltshire.

Lady Glenconner is a sister of the late George Myndham, M. P., once chief secretary for Ireland. She is noted for her beauty is an accomplished musician and has attained some fame as an author.

Viscount Grey's first wife, whom he married in 1895, died about 15 years ago. He has no heir.
