Answers to Enquiries  
In the Legislature

HON. MR. MERSEREAU in reply to Mr. Taylor:  
1. Referring to the Public Accounts 1922, Page 55, the total grant to Agricultural Societies is stated as \$23,191.14. Referring to Page 149, Agricultural Report, 1922, Grand total Provincial Grant to Societies is \$17,759.80. For what purpose was the balance of this amount expended?

A. The balance of this amount was expended as follows:—Grant to the New Brunswick Farmers' & Dairymen's Association; subscriptions to the "Maritime Farmer", and one-half expenses of delegates attending the New Brunswick Farmers' & Dairymen's Association, in accordance with resolutions passed at the annual meetings of the Farmers' & Dairymen's Association, which is made up of delegates representing the Agricultural Societies.

HON. MR. MERSEREAU in reply to Mr. Dickson:

1. Did this Government, when it came into power, find in the possession of the Department of Agriculture (1) a Portable Limestone Crusher, (2) a Buckeye Traction Ditcher, (3) a Clover Huller?

A. Yes.

2. If so, are these still owned by the Government?

A. Yes.

3. If not, how were they disposed of?

A. Answered by No. 2.

4. If sold, to whom and at what price and has the Government received payment in full?

A. Answered by No. 2.

The Portable Limestone Crusher is loaned to a quarry in Gloucester County with an option to purchase.

The Ditcher is stored at Apohaqui, Kings County.

The Clover Huller is stored at Florenceville, Carleton County.

HON. MR. HETHERINGTON in reply to Mr. Young:

1. Reference Page 28 Public Accounts 1922 "Amendment Admission Tax Collections." Item Exhibitions \$7,909.16. What Exhibitions contributed to this amount, and how much did each contribute?

A. The following amounts were collected from persons attending Exhibition performances at the following places:

2. What was the amount of Government Grant to each of these Exhibitions?

A. St. John \$5,000.00; Woodstock \$5,000.00; St. Stephen \$2,500.00.

3. Have any of these Exhibition Associations requested the Government to forego the collection of this Tax?

A. No formal application has been made to the Government, but the matter has been unofficially discussed with the Premier and is under consideration.

HON. MR. VENIOT in reply to Mr. Stewart:

Q. 1. What quantity of concrete pipe has been shipped into the County of Restigouche since the present Government came into office, and what amount has been paid for freight on same?

A. The following concrete pipe with cost and freight was delivered into Restigouche County from May 1917 to October 1921: 554 feet of 12 inch, 1297½ feet of 15 inch, 1478 of 18 inch, 339 feet of 24 inch; cost of pipe \$4,595.45; freight on shipments \$1,071.73. The 1922 accounts are in the hands of the Public Accounts Committee where the information for that year may be obtained.

HON. MR. VENIOT in reply to Mr. Richards:

Q. What Bond issues have been made by the Government since October 1st, 1922? For what purposes were they applied?

A. \$1,650,000. January 15th, 1922.

1. Referring to the answers to Enquiry No. 15, under what statutory or other authority was the Order-in-Council referred to passed?

A. Orders-in-Council do not require statutory authority.

2. Was the Government or any member thereof or any official of the Crown Land Department informed at the time appointed for the sale that any other party or parties were prepared to bid more than the upset price of \$20.00 per square mile?

A. No.

HON. MR. VENIOT in reply to Mr. Fawcett:

Q. 1. From whom was the sand or gravel purchased used in the construction of the Road last summer from the City of Moncton to Leger's Corner?

A. This gravel was taken from pits under lease of the Government since 1919.

Q. 2. What price was paid for the same?

A. Under lease a royalty of 5 cents per ton is paid to lessors.

Q. 3. By whom was the said gravel purchased?

A. Answered by Answer to No. 1.

Q. 4. What is the official position of the purchaser?

A. Arrangements for leasing were made by Simeon Melanson, then supervisor of roads, on behalf of the Government.

Q. 5. Were tenders invited in connection with the purchase of the said gravel?

A. No tenders called for as Government owned gravel.

Q. 6. If so, on what dates and in what manner were the said tenders invited?

A. Answered by answer to No. 5.

HON. MR. VENIOT in reply to Mr. Hunter:

Q. 1. Was William H. Mundle employed as Inspector on the construction of the St. Nicholas River Mouth Bridge, Kent Co?

A. Yes.

Q. 2. If so, when was he appointed?

A. May 4th., 1917.

Q. 3. When did his employment as such Inspector cease?

A. June 9th., 1921.

Q. 4. How much has the said William H. Mundle received for such services for each year during his employment?

A. 1917, \$116.00; 1918, \$500.00; 1919 \$704.00; 1920, \$481.00; 1921, \$208.00. Total \$2,009.00.

Q. 5. Is the said William H. Mundle employed by the Government at the present time?

A. No.

Q. 6. If so, in what capacity?

Q. 7. What remuneration does he receive?

A. Questions No. 6 and No. 7 answered by answer to No. 5.

HON. MR. HETHERINGTON in reply to Mr. Young:

1. What revenue did the Government receive from the tax on Gate Receipts at the various Agricultural Exhibitions in 1922?

2. Has the Government received any requests for the removal of this tax?

3. If so, from what persons or organizations, and is it the intention of the Government to comply with this request?

A. No revenue has been received from tax on admissions to purely Agricultural Exhibitions in 1922. Tax on admissions to Agricultural Exhibitions combined with amusement features is charged under the Law and is considered a fair and reasonable Tax.

HON. MR. VENIOT in reply to Mr. Flewelling:

Q. 1. (a) According to the Public Accounts Report, the sum of \$165.59 was spent in repairing Pond Hole Bridge, Dear Island, last year. Did this expenditure cover the entire cost of the work or is it still unfinished?

(b) In the latter case, how much further expenditure will be necessary and when will the work be completed?

A. (a) Since the above work was done a further expenditure of \$727.45 was made.

(b) A small expenditure for grading to be done when conditions permit will complete the work.

HON. MR. VENIOT in reply to Mr. Young:

Q. 1. Was any work done on the South Bay Bridge, Saint John County during the Provincial bye-election campaign which terminated on the 10th, June 1922?

A. From June 1st., to 10th., inclusive the work done amounted to \$3,073.10.

Q. 2. If so, what was the nature of the work?

A. Work consisted of the reconstruction of said Bridge.

Q. 3. Was the work let by tender?

A. No.

Q. 4. If so, who was the successful tenderer?

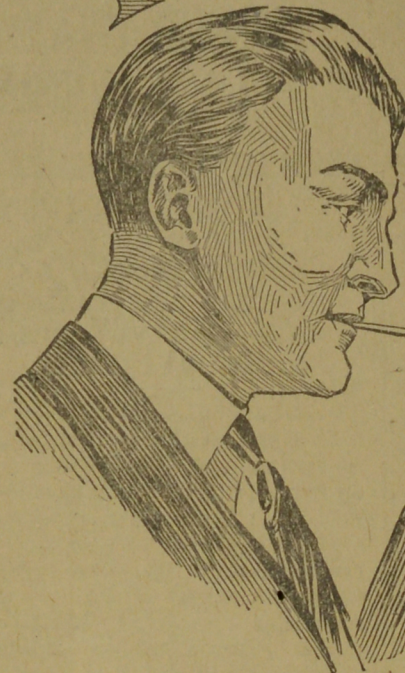
