GRAND ORANGE LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK OPENED ON WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

**Mayor Reid Delivered Address of Welcome —
Hon. D. W. MacPherson Master of Sovereign Grand Lodge of B.N.A. Spoke at Night —
Model of Proposed Orphanage Exhibited Before L. O. B. A.**

The Grand Lodge, Ladies Orange Benevolent Association paid a fraternal visit Wednesday night to the Grand Orange Lodge of New Brunswick which was in session in Oddfellows Hall. The united bodies heard an eloquent address by Hon. W. D. MacPherson, of Toronto, Master of the Sovereign Grand Orange Lodge of British North America, Hon. Mr. MacPherson in his speech followed a patriotic line entirely.

After the withdrawal of the L.O. B.A. delegates the Grand Orange Lodge proceeded to routine business. Considerable time was given to insurance matters and the delegates heard the matter discussed fully by Col. Duff and Thomas H. Bell of Toronto.

OPENING SESSION

At both there was a large attendance of delegates representing all parts of the province. The session will continue until Thursday night.

Welcome By Mayor.

BABY RACE RAISES STORM OF PROTEST

London, April 19—Indignation has been aroused among English women by the recent London to Brighton baby carriage race when five mothers, each pushing a baby perambulator containing a baby, completed the amazing walking contest of fifty two miles. The race was won by Mrs. Lily Groom, 40 years old, of Eastbourne, who covered the distance in 12 hours and 20 minutes.

At the finish her two-year-old baby it is charged was covered with dust from head to foot, and was bleeding at the nose. The other babies in the race are said to have been in a similar or worse condition. Consequently the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to children, which tried vainly for weeks to prevent the contest, is considering the question of prosecuting the mothers and the promoter of the race.

The organizer of the race was A. R. Edwards whose wife was one of the competitors. He said that he organized it because the "education authorities were not doing their duty." But the spectators greeted the mothers with boos and hisses at the finish. The mothers were disappointed too by the fact that no prizes were awarded. Edwards expected to provide the prizes by selling programs along the route but the people refused to buy them.
