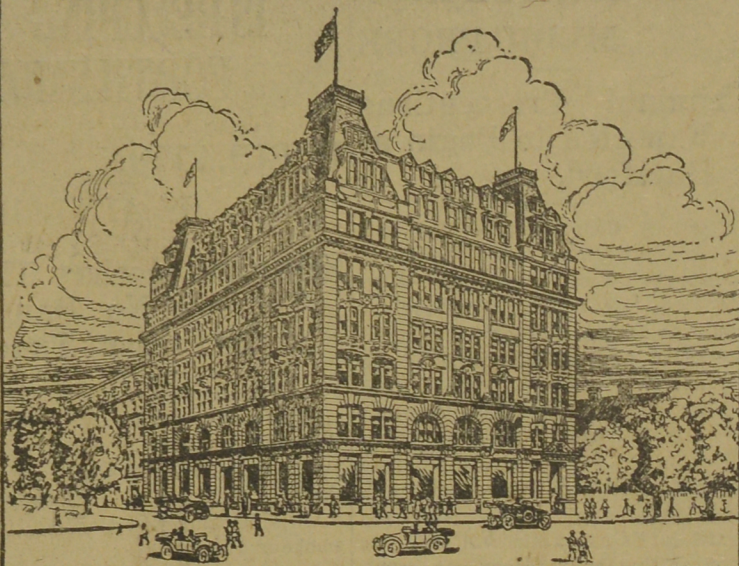

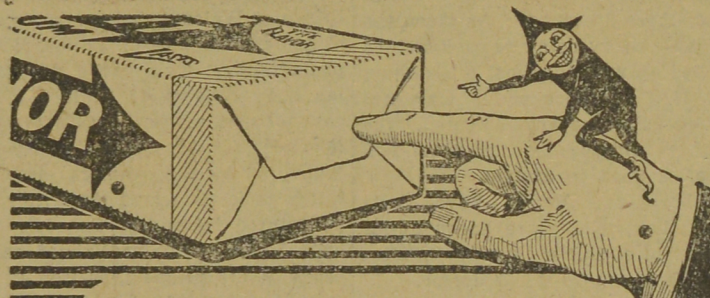

A DUSKY HEIRESS WHO WAS MARRIED IN GREAT POMP

Irvington-On-Hudson, N. Y. Dec. 3.—Miss Mae Walker Robinson, granddaughter of the famous Madame Walker, who started life as a laundress and left a million-dollar estate after inventing a remarkable hair treatment for negroes, was married today to Dr. Henry Gordon Jackson of Chicago.

The wedding was one of the most magnificent and largely attended of New York's social season.

Eighteen hundred guests filled every available space in the large St. Philip's Episcopal church and as many more whose carriages and limousines extended for two blocks in every direction, were disappointed at being unable to enter the church.

Costumes Were Rare.

Gorgeous decorations, rich gowns and jewels such as seldom have been seen made the interior of the edifice a striking setting for the ceremony as the first notes of Lohengrin's wedding march swelled from organ.

Standing at the altar in formal morning attire, Dr. Jackson saw his bride sweep down the aisle on the arm of F. D. Ransom, manager of the Madame Walker Manufacturing Company, which produces the famous hair restorer.

The bride's dress drew gasps of admiration. It was of sheer chiffon, beaded with sea pearls over bride's satin. A tulle veil was attached to a Tutankhamen headress of pearls and was caught with orange blossoms. Dress and veil were designed by Mrs. Pearl Crawford Craft of Philadelphia.

The bride's mother wore a gown of gold metal cloth, designed and made in Paris.

The bridesmaids wore gowns of cream chantilly lace over silver cloth.

Ring Bearer is Cute.

Preeding the happy Miss Robinson down the aisle came maids of honor

and a diminutive ring-bearer, in cream satin with bows at the knees of his knickerbockers, bearing the wedding ring on a cream colored cushion.

After the ceremony specially invited guests accompanied the couple to the magnificent country estate of the bride's mother, Villa Lanaro, purchased by the original Mme. Walker for \$250,000.

A boiled dinner was served.

To the reception that followed 9,000 guests had been invited. Prominent persons from every State in the Union, from Liberia, Nigeria and Cuba were present or sent regrets.

Many magnificent presents were displayed. The bride gave her bridesmaids ivory-bound Episcopal prayer books. She gave her matron of honor a plated green-gold bracelet, fastened with a lock containing two diamonds and a blue sapphire.

Mother Gives Silver.

The best man and ushers received canes and cigarette cases.

The bride's mother gave the couple a specially made mahogany case containing 126 pieces of solid silver from Tiffany's.

After the reception in the afternoon the bride and groom slipped away in a new Rolls-Royce limousine, one of the wedding presents and caught a train for Boston where the honeymoon will be spent.

F. B. Ransom, the manager of the Mme. Walker Company, who gave the bride away, made a statement after the ceremony, correcting an impression that the celebrated preparation had been designed to take the kinks of negroes' hair.

"It simply makes the hair grow," he stated.

"And about this boiled dinner we had," he added, "sometimes that's called a wedding breakfast. But it was at 2 o'clock this afternoon."

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MYSTERIOUS LADY IN HOTEL ROOM ABLE TO KEEP VOW

Minneapolis, Dec. 1.—Police have solved the mystery of the "Lady in 510" and a wedding in the courthouse yesterday tore aside the veil that had kept the gossips' tongues wagging for more than three years.

Names hardly matter, but the facts the police learned have been substantiated by Minneapolis Journal which has told the story in a copyrighted article.

It was more than three years ago that she came to a local hotel accompanied by a man—ostensibly her husband—who carried a crying baby in his arms. They wanted a room "indefinitely" and were given room 510.

From that day no one ever saw her outside her room. Guests in adjacent rooms heard a baby prattle and a mother croon. Then the months rolled into years the prattle became a child-

ish voice and a little boy pressed his nose against the window pane to view the mysterious outdoors.

"Husband" Traveled.

Her husband traveled, he said, and his stays at the hotel were infrequent at brief. The woman ate in her room and ordered from shops by telephone. Her accounts were always promptly paid.

Then by chance detectives heard of "the lady in 510." On her legal authority a policewoman entered the room and from the pale woman of mystery gradually drew her story.

It was that of a woman of twenty years, whose misfortune when a college girl of 17 had prompted the vow that never would she leave the hotel room until a wedding ban circled her finger. And so through the years she waited and hoped.

In the police chief's office she told her story in a voice that faltered and with eyes that blinked away tears. Nearby her "husband" sat silently; a wan cheeked, curious boy of nearly four at her skirts.

Wedding and Honeymoon.

Then came the solution. The man without a word but with a new light in his eyes, touched the woman's arm. Together they went to the wedding license bureau two floors above and the woman became a legal wife and the little boy gained a name.

Last night the windows in room 510 were dark and gossips' tongues were stilled as a man and his wife started on a belated honeymoon and a boy of 4 learned of street cars and outdoor things.
