

GERMANS ARE READY TO SURRENDER

BULGARIAN CHAMBER IS DISSOLVED A STATE OF WAR EXISTS

Government Forces Lose Heavily in a Battle with Insurrectionists.

(Special to the Daily Mail)
Athens, Sept. 24—Bulgarian Government forces have lost 700 dead and than 4,000 wounded in attacks against the Agrarian insurrectionists dispatches from Salonika said today. Messages from Philippoli said the Government forces were losing ground over the whole of southern and northeastern Bulgaria. The King has signed a decree in Sofia dissolving the chamber of deputies and calling new elections within two months. The Agrarians and Communists after bitter fighting have captured Plevna and raised the Red Flag an unconfirmed dispatch from Sofia said.

A State of War.

London, Sept. 24—A state of war has been declared by the Government of Bulgaria as a consequence of Communist riots, says an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Sofia.

Paris, Sept. 24—A Havas despatch from Sofia dated Saturday says the Bulgarian Chamber of Deputies was dissolved by royal decree. The despatch added that the date of the elections had not been fixed, but, under the constitution, these would take place within two months of the dissolution of the Chamber.

A NATIONAL OUTBURST IS PREDICTED

EVIDENCE OF FOUL PLAY IS REVEALED

Body of Jacquet River Man Exhumed and Inquest Held.

Bathurst, Sept. 23—The body of James Goodin, which was found on two logs under the bridge at Jacquet River two weeks ago, was exhumed on Friday and a report of the condition of the body is being forwarded to the Attorney-General. Although no official statement could be secured tonight, it is understood that marks were found on the body which indicated that Goodin had been badly beaten before his death.

After the body was found an inquest was held and the jury returned an open verdict. Members of the jury are quoted as saying that they were not satisfied with this result and the circumstances were reported to the office of the Attorney-General, who ordered an investigation. This was started by Inspector Joshua Gammon.

It is believed that the family of the dead man holds the opinion that his death was not accidental, and his father has written to a Campbellton paper stating that the body of his son was terribly bruised, that his nose was broken and that there was a deep cut on his head.

If the report made to the Attorney-General is to the effect that evidences of beating were found on Goodin's body, it is probable that several men who were seen with him on the night of his death and who were said to have been drinking and quarrelling with him, will be called upon for an explanation.

Stresemann Announces That Resistance in the Ruhr Must be Given up

Statement Made to the Ruhr and Rhineland Defence Organizations—Fate of Those Imprisoned Cannot be Taken Into Consideration—Reichstag to be Informed on Wednesday.

Berlin, September 24—Chancellor Stresemann today informed the Ruhr and Rhineland defence organizations of the governments decision to capitulate to France. Resistance must be given up without condition, the Chancellor told the first delegates who visited him. The fate of German citizens expelled from the occupied areas or imprisoned for obeying the government's orders for resistance cannot be taken into consideration, Stresemann said. However, the Chancellor added, there is reason to believe that most of these Germans will be restored to their homes when official and public announcement of the decision to quit resistance is made.

UNCONDITIONAL SURRENDER

Stresemann's statements to the delegates of the defence organizations completely confirmed the developments in the Government's attitude toward the resistance program as outlined exclusively in daily United Press dispatches since last Wednesday. The Chancellor will make known the government's decision for unconditional surrender to delegates of the remaining Ruhr and Rhineland organizations later this afternoon. The State Premiers will be informed tomorrow when they meet here with the government and when the Reichstag hears it officially on Wednesday.

SEPARATISTS HOLD MEETING

Mayence, Sept. 24—While rumors of the impending public announcement of Germany's capitulation to France circulated throughout the Rhineland today the Rhenish Separatists movement appeared to be gaining ground. More than five thousand Upper Rhine Separatists attended a great meeting here yesterday and heard speeches by three leaders Dr. Dorten and Herr Matthews and Frauenstein. The watchword of all the speeches was "cut loose from Prussia". Germany intends to wage war anew as soon as the Rhineland and the Ruhr are returned to her, Herr Matthews said.

BORERS CLAIMED TO BE DAMAGING TIMBER ALREADY

Dr. Gibson, Dominion Entomologist, Conferred with Departmental Heads—Difference of Opinion.

Dr. Arthur Gibson of Ottawa, Dominion Entomologist, on Saturday conferred with a number of heads of province departments on the question of insects in New Brunswick and the work of the Entomological Service in this province.

Harvey Mitchell Deputy Minister of Agriculture, represented his department. Col. T. G. Loggie, Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines, and Chief Forester G. H. Prince, represented the Department of Lands and Mines. Dr. J. D. Tothill of this city was with Dr. Gibson.

Dr. Gibson left on Sunday for Digby, N. S., intending to spend some time in the fruit growing sections of Nova Scotia where the Entomological Service is well represented.

Burned Timber Question.

The chief question concerning the entomologists in New Brunswick at the present time is the extent of the ravages of borers and other insects on the burned timber killed by the big forest fires of the past summer. A difference of opinion seems to exist between them and the lumbermen the latter claim that already insects have bored several inches into burned timber while the entomologists maintain that a depth of one inch, the year the timber is killed is the accepted extent of damage. STANLEY CAR LODGED IN TREES NO ONE HURT

Leo Malone Went Over Bank Above Marysville—Douglas Tims' Car Turned Over.

Leo Malone, his mother and Mrs. Douglass, all of Stanley while going home from Fredericton Sunday night had a narrow escape from death near the residence of Spafford Wade a few miles above Marysville. Their car left the road and went over a bank. If it had not been for trees on which the car caught it would have gone in the Nashwaak River. Injuries were slight.

On Sunday a sedan car driven by Douglas Tims of Fredericton turned over in Lincoln and had its top torn off. The occupants were uninjured.

The car turned over several times and lodged against a wire fence. It was righted after a time.

The slope of the terrace is believed to be too steep to hold the soil against the natural water-shed of the sidehill.

WANT CHANGE OF VENUE IN MINERS' CASE

Council for Defendants Serve Notice on the Attorney General.

Halifax, Sept. 24—Hon. W. J. O'Hearn, Attorney General for Nova Scotia, was served on Saturday by counsel acting on behalf of J. B. McLachlan and Daniel Livingstone, formerly secretary and president of the United Mine Workers, District 26, with a notice that they were going to move before Mr. Justice Melish, for an order to change the venue of the McLachlan-Livingstone case, which is to come up in the next session of the Supreme Court, from Halifax to Sydney. The ground for the motion are: First, that the trial at Halifax involves too much expense for the defendants; second, partiality of a Halifax jury; third, necessity of having jury in Sydney, the locality where the incidents alleged by McLachlan and Livingstone, occurred, and upon which allegations the charge against them is preferred. The papers were served by Daley, Walker, Phinney and Vair, counsel for the defendants.

The McLachlan-Livingstone case arose out of the recent steel strike in Sydney, when the defendants, as officers of the U. M. W., were charged with publication of seditious libel following upon the raid which was made upon the gates of the Steel Plant one Sunday morning. The accused was arrested and brought to Halifax and committed for trial. Bail was granted and they now await their trial for which their counsel yesterday made the first move for change of venue. The case is scheduled to come up at the Supreme Court criminal trials at Halifax commencing on October 1st.

LORD MORLEY PASSES AWAY IN ENGLAND

London, Sept. 23—Viscount Morley, of Blackburn, former Lord President of the Council and Secretary of State for India, died tonight at his residence in Wimbledon from heart disease. He was taken ill only this morning and the end came peacefully. He was eighty-five years old. Lord Morley leaves no heir and the peerage becomes extinct.

The veteran writer and statesman had lived for a long time in almost complete retirement. Like his famous colleague in the Asquith Ministry, John Burns, he parted from the Government in 1914 because he could not acquiesce in the war policy and since that time had taken no very active part in politics.

In 1914, however, he was appointed a member of a special committee to draft treaties for the protection of the Jews, and later made appeals for sanity in dealing with Ireland.

Lord Morley came out of his retirement in December, 1921, to speak in the House of Lords on the Irish agreement and he gave his support to the Irish treaty.

This afternoon Major Furse went to the University of New Brunswick for the purpose of securing information. He is connected with the Empire Forestry Conference party which visited Fredericton during the summer.

LOAN BEING GENEROUSLY SUBSCRIBED

OVER ONE THIRD IS TAKEN UP

A Crushing Reply Made to the Whisper of Death Campaign.

Toronto, Sept. 23—The remarkable demand for the new Dominion of Canada refunding loan in the two business days which elapsed between the announcement of the issue by the Minister of Finance and its offering to the public tomorrow morning has aroused comment throughout the country. Of the total objective of \$172,000,000 considerably more than \$72,000,000 had been taken by the week-end leaving somewhat less than \$100,000,000 still available for the public. The rapidity with which the first two-fifths were sold gives every indication that the present loan will be one of the most popular offerings ever placed before the people of Canada, it is said.

National pride has been aroused in this issue in a manner unparalleled since the days of the great Victory loan campaign. It was known several months ago that the finance department sounded out both the London and New York markets. That was at a time when the pound sterling had moved up almost to a par with the Canadian dollar. Since that time, however, the pound receded in value in comparison with our dollar to such an extent as to render a loan in England almost impossible.

Domestic Loan.

New York was somewhat piqued at the possibility of losing place to London on the new issue, it is said, and consequently, when houses there saw the London market cut off by the pound's depreciation, they figured that Canada would have to come to them and they prepared to receive and Canadian request. In short, they knew the absolute security of a Dominion of Canada issue, and also knew they could find a ready market for it among their clients. They hoped, however, to take advantage of a temporary market condition in the United States, and get the Canadian bonds at a bargain figure, it is said.

Instead of this, the Minister of Finance decided to make the offering right at home. None knew better than he that Canada was prosperous, and that Canadians had large sums of money on hand for sound investments. Hon. Mr. Fielding, therefore, decided to offer Canadians the soundest investment of all—a bond with the entire resources of the Dominion of Canada behind it, and at a price to yield considerably more than similar bonds were yielding in Great Britain and the United States. His judgment has been vindicated by the very heavy preliminary subscription to the loan.

Purchasers of the new issue, are given the choice of a long term bond, due in 1943, which a leading financier calls "the soundest and sweetest bond ever offered the Canadian people," and a short term bond, due in 1928, which will appeal to those who prefer to get their capital back in five years, or about the duration of the average mortgage. The twenty year bond is offered at \$98.25, and interest which gives it a yield of 5.14 per cent, and the five-year-bond at \$99 and interest which gives the high return of 5.23 per cent over the shorter period.

In addition to giving Canadians the opportunity to secure a Dominion of Canada loan at a favorable rate, Hon. Mr. Fielding is also effecting a very substantial saving by making the offering a domestic one. Had he sold his bonds in New York, interest would have been payable in New York funds.
