Fredericton and Vets Broke Even in Opening Games Here Yesterday

Fredericton Loses in the Afternoon 1 to 0, but Comes Back Strong in the Evening Winning 5 to 0 — Lefty Fallon Looks Good on Mound for Locals—Big Crowds Attended Opening Games.

Fredericton saw its first ball games of the season at the Trotting Park Monday under rather unfavorable weather conditions, when the Fredericton team and the G. W. V. A. outfit of St. John broke even in a double header. The Vets captured the afternoon game by a score of 1 to 0 and Fredericton came back strong in the evening winning 5 to 0. The Fredericton team is now complete, with the exception of Freeman who is expected here this week, and while the organization is not as strong in hitting as yet as it might be, early improvement is looked for and the team is expected to round into the form that brought Fredericton out on top of the league last year. Both games yesterday were played in intensely cold weather, much more appropriate for football than for baseball, and with rain threatening, but holding off all afternoon. A good sized crowd witnessed the afternoon game, which was officially opened by the throwing of the first ball by W. E. Farrell, president of the Fredericton club, to the President of the League, W. S. Hooper. At the evening game the crowd was not so large but a goodly number were in attendance.

The Afternoon Game.

Promptly at 2:30 the opening game commenced, Jimmy McCourt being announced as pitcher for Fredericton and Carruthers for the War Vets. The diamond was in poor condition due to recent heavy rains despite attempts at improvement and play was not as fast as it might have been. Carruthers on the mound for the Vets, put up a first class performance and came within an ace of pitching a no-run no-hit game. Carruthers is from Grand Falls but has played in the West. Two scratchy hits by Mills and McCourt were the only hits made by Fredericton, while the Vets drove out seven of McCourt's offerings for base hits. The only run of the game was scored in the seventh inning when Bonnell drove out a long hit for two bases and scored on another double by Carruthers.

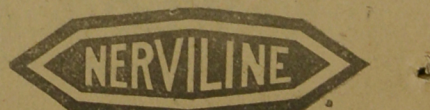
