FRANCE AFTER SUPREMACY IN AIR

CANADIAN EXHIBIT IS VERY GOOD

Exhibition at Wembley Has Already Caught Popular Fancy — The Crowds Throng Canadian Building and Praise it Highly.

MORE THAN 100,000 AT THE OPENING

London, April 25.—The Canadian building at the British Empire exhibition at Wembley was one of the main centres of attraction at the opening, and the building and all its exhibits was highly praised by the more than 100,000 visitors who attended the opening ceremonies.

Buildings Thronged.
Immediately after the formal opening ceremonies in the stadium had been completed, crowds thronged the corridors of Canada's building, expressing their delight at the exhibition and especially at the panoramic views of scenery. With the exception of the Gold Coast and the West Indies it was the only building in the big show that was really ready.

"Canada The Best."
After dark the Canadian building again stood out, owing to the flood lighting system which strikingly illuminated the white dignity of the structure. Everywhere was heard the comment "Canada has the best." Undoubtedly it will retain the popularity it gained on the opening day and this is probably the best Canadian advertisement ever seen in Great Britain.

LEADER OF TAMMANY HALL DIED TODAY

New York, April 25.—Charles F. Murphy, the leader of Tammany Hall died at 2.20 a. m. today. Murphy's death occurred at 305 East 17th street Manhattan.

Mr. Murphy succeeded the late Richard Croker some years ago as boss of Tammany Hall, generally recognized as the greatest political organization in the world. He was an active political leader and his death will be deplored by a large circle of friends.

TITLE OF DUKE OF SAGAN NOT EASY TO SELL

Paris, April 25.—Anna Gould's son, Charles Maurice Howard Talleyrand de Perigold, has about abandoned hope of selling the ancient title of Duke of Sagan, which has been on the market since 1911.

The Duke during the war renounced all rights for himself, but the family has decided not to abandon their claims for the fifteen-year-old youth. German agents for three years have been offering the Chateauship of the Silesian Duchy for the mere bagatelle of \$100,000, but the only offer coming so far is from a Swiss merchant, but as he accumulated his wealth by dealing with the Allies the German Government, which has the final say, has refused to approve it. Unless it is sold before September, one of the three private hotels will be sold to pay back taxes so that the family can resume ducal rights.

CHURCH UNION BILL AT OTTAWA UP NEXT WEEK

PETITIONS ARE POURING IN

The Real Fight Likely to Take Place on Preamble of the Bill.

Montreal, April 25.—An Ottawa special to the Star says:

The Private Bills Committee of the Commons will meet next Friday to fix a date when the Church Union Bill will come up on its merits. The date now in view is the 30th but the parties will be consulted about it. Meanwhile petitions are flooding in. All these which came first were against the Bill but latterly there are many in support of it and an intimation that more are to come.

In official circles the amendment adopted by the Ontario Legislature resulting in the Bill being withdrawn vitally changed its whole aspect and purpose. The fairer course to all concerned, as some argue, would be either to pass the Bill slightly amended or kill it rather than change the whole underlying principle.

The real fight will be on the preamble. It declares that the Presbyterian Church has "petitioned" for the Bill. Opponents of union declare the church has not petitioned for it. If the latter is established to the committee's satisfaction, then the preamble will not be proven, and the Bill may fail. If the preamble, or principle, is adopted, the form of amendment to protect the minority will be considered. There will be two suggestions—one to adopt an amendment similar to that passed by the committee at Toronto, and the other to approve the union on the broad lines but to give the commission wider authority, in respecting the rights of dissenting congregations.

FIREMEN HEARD ADDRESSES FROM OFFICERS

There was a meeting of the fire department Thursday night for the purpose of settling the usual business which is to be closed at the end of the official year. In addition there were addresses by Chief H. C. Rutter and Assistant Chief W. M. Clark. Both made reference to the changes which had been made in the Department in connection with the reorganization by which Roy U. Smith has been appointed chief by the city council. The members of the fire department were advised by letter to remain with the department and to support the new chief in every way possible.

Chief Rutter is severing his connection with the Department with the present month. Assistant Chief Clark has not tendered his resignation and Ald. Harry A. Smith, chairman of the fire department stated this afternoon that he had heard nothing from the assistant chief in regard to severing connection with the department.

At last night's meeting of the fire Department there was a general expression of regret by the firemen that Chief Rutter was leaving the Department and also that Assistant Chief Clark had been overlooked in the appointment of the new chief.

Considering the Matter.

Assistant Chief Clark stated this afternoon that he had been asked by Mayor Phillips and several aldermen to remain as an officer for a time at least and he has the matter under consideration. He has considered resignation several times because of interference of duties with his private business.

France Endeavoring To Demonstrate the Supremacy of the Air

Lieut. Doisy Completed a Successful Non Stop Flight to Bucharest — Will Try a Flight to Japan in Record Time — Encountered Severe Storm on the Flight From Paris — Secrecy was Maintained.

PARIS, April 25.—Lieut. Pelletier Doisy, who flew a French military plane from Villa Coublay airdrome here at noon Thursday, successfully completed a non-stop flight to Bucharest, it was officially admitted today. The flight is the first leg of a series of 1,400 mile jumps destined to take the airplane to Japan in world's record time and demonstrate France's supremacy in the air.

The air ministry which now confirms executive United Press despatches regarding what was to have been a secret long distance flight attempt, reports that Lieut. Doisy arrived at Bucharest at 5 p. m. yesterday having made the flight to the Roumanian capital, a distance of more than 1,300 miles in a little over eleven hours. It was the first Paris-Bucharest non-stop flight.

WEATHERED SEVERE STORM

When over Bavaria the airman encountered terrific rain-storms but weathered them. On his way to Japan Doisy plans to make the briefest halts. He will attempt to stop while flying having his mechanic pilot the machine. The plane, a specially built military Breguet, took off from Villa Coublay secretly. When the United Press reported its departure and plans for the Japan flight the air ministry at first disclaimed knowledge of the attempt.

TO CONTINUE FLIGHT

Today however after it was learned that Doisy successfully had completed his first lap, the ministry officially announced his success. The Breguet carries enough gasoline to permit successive jumps of 1,400 miles. The second stop probably will be at Aleppo, thence Doisy will fly to Bagdad, Bender Abbas and follow the usual route across India to Rango, to Hong Kong, Shanghai, Peking, Seoul and Tokio, without special preparations having been made anywhere. It is being carried out with typical French spirit of dash and disregard for danger. Lieut. Doisy carries no spare parts, but has bananas, rum, cocoa cola, chocolate and biscuit. The flight is not an around-the-world effort, as it is planned to end it at Japan.

EX PREMIER WANTS BRITISH CITIZENSHIP

London, April 25.—Count Michael Karolyi, once Prime Minister of Hungary, wants to become a British subject. The Count, who is somewhat radical in his views, has been living with his wife and child in London since he found it advisable to quit his own country. He has decided to settle permanently in Canada after obtaining his citizenship.

"I want my family to grow up in the free untrammelled British atmosphere," he said.

Egg Laying Contest.

The birds taking part in the New Brunswick Egg Laying Contest at the Experimental Station produced 351 eggs last week. The leading pen of the week is owned by George Wood of Carter's Point and produced 54 eggs. W. E. B. Tait's pen was second with 53 and John Moore's held third place with 52. Following is the standing of the highest pens: Harry Patterson, Hoyt, 859; William Mitchell, Doaktown, 812; W. E. B. Tait, Dorchester 790.

STEAMSHIP HAS PRIVATE BREWERY

London, April 25.—A private brewery is en route to the United States according to dispatches from Plymouth. When the North German Lloyd liner Columbus touched there on her maiden voyage to America shipping men reported she carried a complete brewery for the benefit of thirsty passengers.

The Columbus sailed from Bremen on Tuesday.

Aperture Sights.

All persons interested in rifle shooting in the province will welcome the news that the Government has authorized the use of aperture sights and that the first delivery of the new sights are expected to be received from the manufacturer about the first of June and will be distributed to the various districts at once. As soon as the supply arrives they will be distributed to the Militia units and rifle associations so that they can be used for practice before the annual prize meet at Sussex.

C.N.R. RADIO TO HELP SAVE THE FORESTS

WILL ASSIST IN CAMPAIGN

Prominent Men to Speak Next Week from the Broadcasting Stations

Montreal, April 25.—Following the promise given to foresters at a meeting in Montreal several weeks ago, the Canadian National Railways have placed at the disposal of the forestry associations all their radio broadcasting facilities during "Save the Forest Week," April 27 to May 3.

During this week the radio broadcasting stations of the Canadian National Railways in Montreal, Ottawa, Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Calgary, Regina and Edmonton will be utilized entirely to further the campaign for the preservation of the forest resources of the Dominion.

Mr. W. H. Kilby, chief for forest protection, Canadian National Railways has co-operated closely with the government and other forestry departments and such prominent men as Sir Lomer Gouin, Hon. Charles Stewart, Minister of the Interior, J. W. Daffoe, editor Winnipeg Free Press; Hon. C. W. Hamilton of the Saskatchewan government, Hon. George Howardley of the Alberta government, Dr. Walter Murray of the Saskatchewan government and other men intimately concerned with the conservation of the forests will speak from these stations.

This is the first time in the history of Canada that the radio has been used on such a widespread scale to support a campaign of national importance.

The welfare of the Canadian National Railway is closely identified with the preservation and economical development of all Canada's natural resources and one of the objects in view when the radio programmes of the National system were decided upon, was the assisting in such campaigns as "Save the Forest Week."

COLD WEATHER KEEPS RIVER AT LOW LEVEL

Rise is Slow — Ice Ran Last Night but Has Wasted Much—Drives Progress.

There was a fairly heavy run of ice past this city last night but the ice has wasted away to such an extent that the run is not amounting to much. The jams reported above this city are gradually breaking away. The rise in the St. John River continues slowly the cold weather keeping the water back.

The stream driving on the smaller streams is progressing steadily. The water generally is reported at good height. On the Nashwaak crews of the Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Co. are at work and S. Douglass Co. also is driving on branches.

Fraser Companies Limited are at work on the Nashwaak where there is quite a quantity of lumber. On other streams in this section drives for that company and other firms are in safe waters or are coming along satisfactorily.

The St. John River Log Driving Company is gathering equipment together preparatory to the winding up of the company.

DOUG AND MARY MADE A BIG HIT

London Admirers Crowded Around the Noted Film Stars at the American Legions Ball on Thursday Evening.

ARE OBJECTS OF MUCH INTEREST

London, April 25.—When Doug and Mary danced at the American Legions Ball Thursday night, a cordon of stalwart London Bobbies with locked hands had to fox trot in a ring around them to keep back a press of eager admirers of the American stars of the screen.

Outside in the pouring rain, held in check by mounted police in glistening slickers, thousands of Londoners stood for hours to catch a fleeting glimpse of the Fairbanks' film family as Doug and Mary dashed under a canopy to their limousine upon leaving. It was the first appearance of the movie stars at night in the British capital.

They are going to Paris next Tuesday but not by airplane as Fairbanks wished. "A fortune teller told Mary that airplanes are dangerous for me," he explained. "She's the boss. She laid down the law—no airplaning."

JAP THOUGHT PERUVIAN WAS AN AMERICAN

Kobe, Japan, April 25.—An unidentified Japanese mistook the Peruvian consul here for a North American and attacked him with a knife attempting to take the life of the consul. The assailant was arrested but liberated when the official refused to prosecute the case.

LLOYD GEORGE ASSAILS LABOR GOVERNMENT

Llanduno, Wales, April 25.—David Lloyd George delivered an attack on Premier MacDonald in the course of a speech here Thursday. "MacDonald says he will remain in office three or four years and will carry out Labor, not Liberal or Conservative ideas" said the former Premier. "He must know that such talk is rumbustious. Labor ideas are over throwing the theory of private enterprise and private property and substituting therefore national enterprise and communal property."

DISCORDANT PEALS FROM A CHURCH BELL

Weimar, April 25.—Completion recently of Germany's largest church bell has brought about much discord in certain political circles. The Monarchists insist upon calling it the "Kaiser's bell," while the Republicans have given it the name of "The Bell of the Rhine."

The bell was cast here or the famous Cathedral of Cologne, but there have been repeated delays in shipment, according to German authorities, because it was feared it might be confiscated by the French.
