Hon. Mr. Murdock Had No Inside Information on Position of Home Bank

Deputy Speaker G. N. Gordon Tells of His Conversation with Minister of Labor—Told Him He Thought the Bank Was a Lame Duck—Premier King and Deputy Minister of Finance Also Testify.

Ottawa, June 11—G. N. Gordon, Deputy Speaker of the House of Commons, gave the committee on Privileges and Elections a review of his conversation with Hon. James Murdock, Minister of Labor, in regard to the condition of the Home Bank.

"I intimated to him that it was a lame duck and would be the next to go," said Mr. Gordon, in answer to questions by W. M. German, Liberal member for Welland.

The conversation had taken place in the office of the Minister of Labor on August 9, six days before Mr. Murdock withdrew four thousand dollars from the Bank.

"Did you have any information on which to base your statement?" asked Mr. German.

Mr. Gordon replied that he had nothing special. He knew that the stock of the bank had been away down for some time. He had also talked with lawyers and others who were in a position to know something about the condition of the bank and had gathered the impression that the Home Bank was not in good shape.

No Inside Information.

"We were talking over the work of the session" Mr. Gordon said in explaining how the discussion arose, "and I said I thought it would have been wise for the Government to have brought in some measure of bank inspection. I said that the Home Bank might have to be taken over."

"Your opinion was not founded on any inside information?" asked R. B. Hanson, Conservative member for York-Sunbury.

"I won't say that" was the reply.

"Why?" Mr. Gordon replied that he had been in conversation with H. J. Daly, former president of the Home Bank some time before, and Mr. Daly had told him that it was extremely difficult for smaller institutions to get on.

"Did he say the bank would fail?"

"No."

"And the failure came as a shock to you?" pursued Mr. Hanson.

"Well, I thought it was coming" replied Mr. Gordon.

"Did you know that Mr. Murdock had a deposit in the Home Bank?" he was asked.

Mr. Gordon replied that he had not known this at the time. He was asked if he had mentioned the matter to anyone else and replied that he thought he had told the Prime Minister that the Home Bank was in bad condition. He said that the bank had been talked about among those who knew about a year before its failure.

Mr. Gordon's testimony was preceded by evidence from officials of the Home Bank and the Royal Bank of Canada in regard to the withdrawal and deposit of the money by Mr. Murdock. Premier MacKenzie King was the first witness. E. Guss Porter, member for West Hastings, who made the charges against Mr. Murdock, read the evidence given by the Prime Minister before the McKewen Royal Commission in regard to the visit of J. F. M. Stewart, director of the Home Bank, to Ottawa.

Mr. King stated that the evidence as read by Mr. Porter was correct. He considered the situation of sufficient importance to discuss it with his colleagues.

J. C. Saunders, Deputy Minister of Finance, also gave evidence in regard to Mr. Stewart's visit. He stated that no one was present during the conference at the Prime Minister's house besides Mr. King, Hon. George P. Graham, Hon. J. A. Robb, Mr. Stewart and himself.

In answer to Mr. German, Mr. Saunders said that Mr. Stewart had not asked for a deposit while he was at the conference. Mr. Stewart's request had been for temporary assistance of any kind. The Prime Minister had given a most emphatic refusal.

All the evidence is now in, and argument will be opened on Thursday.

But in his eyes there is an air of command, backed by the force of a portly frame, which enables Billy to do what he will with the sheep and lambs which come within his ken, and even influences calves to keep a straight path. In the busy season he saves the salaries of five men; in ordinary times he does the work of two or three.

He was three months old when he arrived at the Canadian Pacific Stock Yards, Montreal, but he took to the work at once. He followed the heels of the men, and while other animals tried at the work had to be coaxed to labor by rewards of cake and biscuits, Billy needed no such spur, but in three months time would glance at the sheep comfortably, start off at a cheerful trot and without hesitation the doomed animals would surround him and happily ascend the winding runway to the abattoir nearby. Then at a command he would go back and coax any stragglers, till he had all at hand ready to be slaughtered.

Now to look at Billy, it might seem that he did this work in all innocence, and that he was quite unaware that he had led his charges to any harm; but that would be doing an injustice to Billy's mighty intellect. He leads the flock right to the edge of the platform where they are killed, but then he carefully edges to the wall, keeping as far as possible from the danger point till he reaches the only spot of safety, then he slides back from the helpless sheep, wriggles out and goes back for another lot.

His treachery does not weigh on his spirits, he is utterly complacent and self-satisfied, impatient to be on the job.
