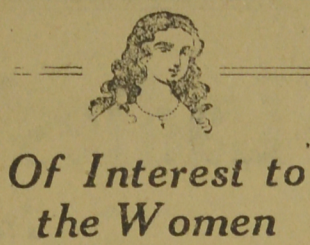

ODD FEATURES IN  
NEW MODES.

PARIS—A fantastic floral earring is being worn at present by some young girls though earrings are not so much in vogue as heretofore. Only one earring is used, and it is in the form of a large basket of flowers.

### STRAWBERRY WHIP.

Crush two cups of prime strawberries add gradually one cup of powdered sugar and one tablespoon of lemon juice. Beat the whites of two eggs until stiff and continue beating while adding slowly the strawberry mixture. Serve cold with boiled custard or whipped cream sweetened and flavored with orange extract.

### STRAWBERRY MOUSSE.

Whip two cups of triple cream add gradually one half cup of powdered sugar, beating constantly. Have ready two cups of mashed strawberries carefully fold prepared berries into cream mixture and add a few grains of salt. Turn into a melon shaped mold, filling mold to overflowing; cover with a buttered paper (buttered side up) adjust the cover and pack in crushed ice and rock salt in the proportions of four measures of ice to one measure of salt. Let stand five or six hours.

## NEW VACCINE IS A BLOW TO TUBERCULOSIS

Paris, June 3—A sensational announcement foreshadowing the freedom of the world from the scourge of tuberculosis was made at the Academy of Medicine today by Prof. Calmette. Calmette is Assistant Director of the Pasteur Institute and therefore is a man of eminence and discretion and does not want to exaggerate the results of the institute's years of labor in its search for an anti-tuberculosis vaccine.

Nevertheless while stating that experiments cannot be considered decisive until observations have been made over a period of years he said that the results of experiments on consumption cattle and monkeys and on 217 new born babies justify the hope that inoculation will prevent consumption.

The vaccine used is artificially reduced in strength by 230 successive cultures. Calves treated with it and inoculated eighteen months later with virulent tuberculosis bacilli which would ordinarily kill in eight weeks remained alive and hearty.

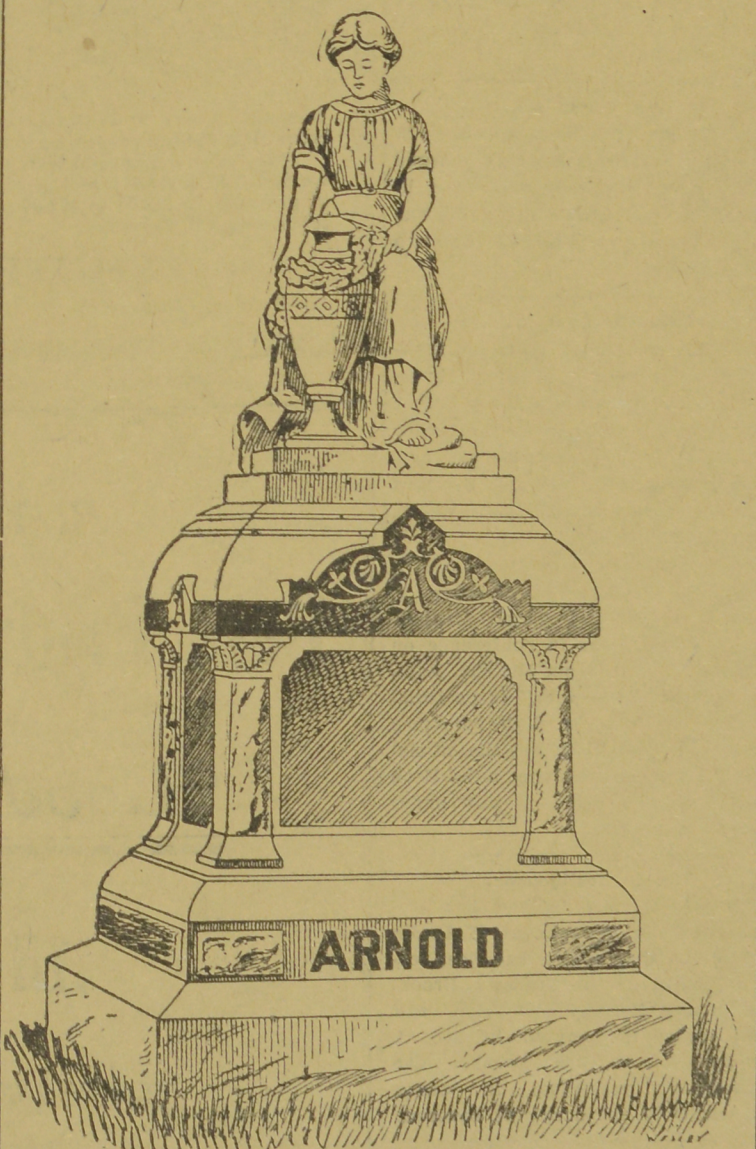
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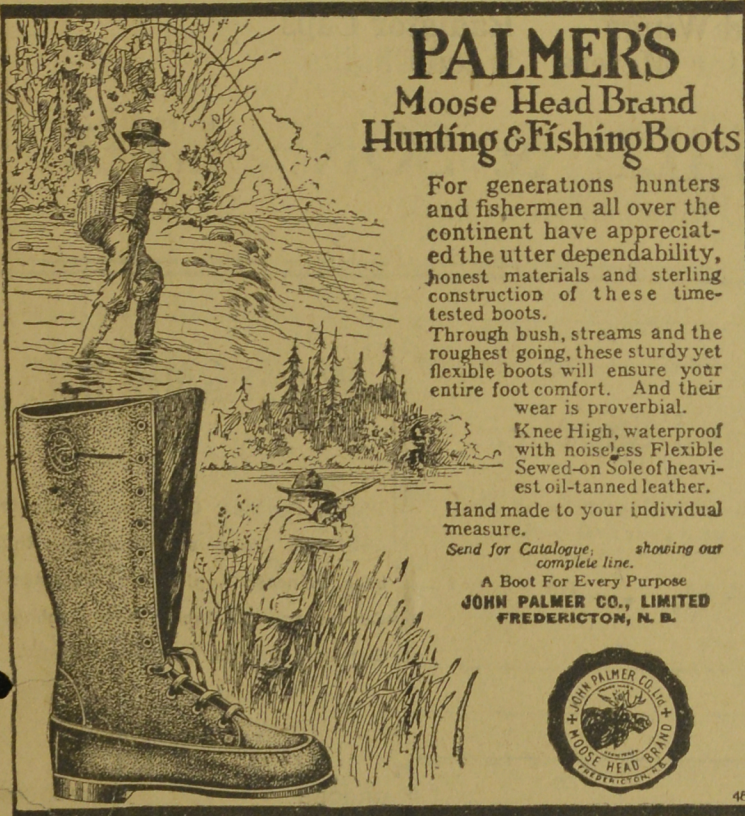

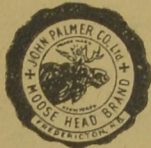
