

#### IS A BLOW TO **TUBERCULOSIS**

Paris, June 3-A sensational anproportions of four measures of ice nouncement foreshadowing the freeto one measure of salt. Let stand dom of the world from the scourge of tuberculosis was made at the Academy of Medicine today by Prof. Calmette. Calmette is Assistant Director of the Pasteur Institute and therefore is a man of eminence and discretion and does not want to exaggerate the results of the institute's years of labor in its search for an anti-tuberculosis vaccine.

Nevertheless while stating that experiments cannot be considered decisive until observations have been made over a period of years he said that the results of experiments on consumption cattle and monkeys and on 217 new born babies justify the hope that inoculaton will prevent consumption.

The vaccine used is artificially reduced in strength by 230 successive cultures. Calves treated with it and inoculated eighteen months later with virulent tuberculosis bacilli which would ordinarily kill in eight weeks remained alive and hearty.


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
