

Queen Marie of Roumania Grieved Over King's Death

Collapsed Yesterday and is Now Under the Care of a Physician—Hundreds Pay Homage to Late Ruler—Prince Michael, a Boy of Five Years, is Now Ruler of Twenty Million People.

BUCHAREST, July 21—Stricken with grief at the death of her husband, Queen Marie of Roumania collapsed today and was under surveillance of physicians.

Her breakdown came as hundreds of Roumanians swarmed towards Peliser Castle, Sinia, in a pilgrimage of mourning to view the remains of King Ferdinand, who died yesterday from cancer.

A Boy Ruler

A fair, curly haired boy of five years, today was the nominal ruler of 20,000,000 people in the Kingdom of Roumania.

Exchanging his Indian playthings for a crown, the son of the exiled Prince Carol and of Princess Helen, late yesterday became King Michael I less than sixteen hours after the death of Ferdinand, the child's grandfather.

During the child's minority, a Regency of three members, representing the Court, Church and Judiciary will rule the land at least in name. Actually, the man behind the throne at the present time is Premier Bratianu.

Ferdinand will be buried on Saturday at Curlea De Arges and on Monday the regency will establish headquarters in the Royal Palace to perpetuate the dynasty.

DEMPSEY AND SHARKEY TO MEET TONIGHT

New York, July 20—In what promises to be the most spectacular non-championship fight in the history of the ring, Jack Dempsey will battle Jack Sharkey tomorrow night to decide which is to meet Gene Tunney for the heavyweight championship of the world in September.

At least 75,000 spectators and possibly 80,000, including many notable, will witness Dempsey's effort to defy the inroads of time and outpunch his confident and youthful rival. They will pay nearly \$1,000,000 for the privilege, Tex Rickard estimated today, but with choice ringside tickets in the hands of speculators bringing as high as \$2000 apiece, the outlay for onlookers seemed likely to be nearer \$1,250,000.

Radio microphones at the ringside will carry the word picture of the fight over a hook-up which may enable 15,000,000 to 20,000,000 others to get the details of the battle throughout the country as accurately, if not more so than will the thousands purchased on the fringes of the American League baseball park.

On the eve of this fistic drama, Sharkey ruled a decided favorite among the experts who have analyzed and weighed the chances of the two rivals. On the other hand Dempsey claimed the support of popular opinion in an apparently overwhelming measure, as well as the backing of many close observers.

TO BE ACTING PRIME MINISTER

BOY KING IS ACCLAIMED IN ROUMANIA

Bucharest, July 21—A fair curly-haired boy of five, with chubby cheeks and a turned-up nose, yesterday exchanged an Indian suit, of which he is extremely proud, for a crown.

King Michael I, of Rumania, is an ordinary boy, with an ordinary boy's likes and dislikes. But he has known for some time some of the things demanded of royalty.

"I must act like a prince," he said a year ago, when he gritted his teeth, while surgeons inoculated him when his pet dog contracted rabies. He did not cry then, and he seldom does, though tears welled into his eyes when he found himself this afternoon the centre of a great parliamentary gathering and he was hailed as king.

Michael, the boy, as opposed to Michael the King, is fond of toys. He likes games. He likes to dash about on a child's scooter, and he likes to be photographed, if at all, in his Indian suit. His health is not good enough to suit his family. Once he was compelled to go to Rappallo—it is believed because his lungs were delicate.

Descendant of Victoria.

The new king has been brought up in the Greek orthodox church. Through Queen Marie, his grandmother, he is a great-great-grandson of Queen Victoria, of England; he is a cousin of King Boris of Bulgaria, and a grandson of the late King Constantine of Greece.

His playmates are few because of his royal status, but his aunt, Princess Helena—once mentioned as possible bride for the Prince of Wales—often visits him and unbends from the dignity of her 18 years to play games with him.

An English Funeral in Year 1719 Was Rather Expensive.

WINE AND RUM WERE USED

Barrel of Cider, Butter and Cheese Were Charged Up.

London, July 21—In these days of elaborate and costly funerals an undertaker's bill uncovered here recently may provide interest. The account was presented for the funeral of one, John Middleton, on January 5, 1719. It follows (all spelling correct):—

"Six half gallons of wine, 2s, 2s, 3d.

"Three gallons of rum, 13s, 6d.

"A quarter of a hundred of a sugar and spice, 15s.

"A barrel of cider, 12s.

"Butter and cheese, 17s.

"A holland sheet, 1s, 0s, 6d.

"The coffin and digging the graf, 19s, 6d."

LIQUOR STORES WILL BE OPEN IN NEAR FUTURE

While no announcement has yet been made in regard to the date of the opening of the liquor stores in the province under the Intoxicating Liquor Act of last session it is understood that they will be functioning in the near future with complete stock of goods.

The big warehouse of the Liquor Commission is now a scene of considerable activity. This morning a force of ten girls were set to work in a bonded warehouse attaching wrappers and labels to bottled goods and will be given steady employment. Mr. John Whelan late of the Queen Hotel staff is also employed in the same department. A customs officer is also in attendance. The duty will not be paid on the liquors until they are taken out of bond and shipped out to the various retail stores.

The provincial government was to have met this week to finally pass the regulations but the visit of the governor general made it necessary to postpone the meeting. It will likely be held next week.

Capt. Courtney Has Postponed His Flight Across the Atlantic

Defective Wireless Apparatus is the Cause—Arrived at the Decision After a Second Test Flight Around the Isle of Wight Late Yesterday Afternoon.

LONDON, July 21—The Daily Telegraph said today that Captain Frank T. Courtney, British Commercial Air Pilot, has announced the postponement of his flight to America for several days because of a defective wireless apparatus. He arrived at the decision, the paper said, after a second test flight of the day, late yesterday, around the Isle of Wight.

Two marine experts accompanied him on the last flight and found the wireless set was not functioning, properly. No definite announcement regarding the date when he will start the proposed flight has been made.

DIFFERENCE IN METHOD OF MAKING BEER

But, not so. When they step off the boat here they can expect to do all their riding in the rumble seat of a "fansom kerridge." Motor cars are banned from this island by the Mackinac Island State Park Commission and that's that.

A State carriage is placed at the disposal of each governor, however, so there is no need of their bringing roller-skates. A tour of the island has been planned for Sunday the 24th. It will look like old times with the governors in their glossy toppers seated in the back of barouches and cabriolets and "what-have-you," wending their stately way along the thoroughfare. There's no doubt about it, carriages are vehicles of dignity, but hardly of speed.

LIQUOR SEIZURE.

Miss Dean was looking for her dog when Anderson offered to help her find it. But instead of confining his search to Hollywood, he drove her to Goldfield, Nev., and induced her to marry him.

The annulment is asked on grounds of fraud. The complaint charges that Anderson married Miss Dean to spite his former sweetheart, who had broken her engagement to him but a few hours before he asked Miss Dean to wed him.
