Ex-Premier Lloyd George On the Trades' Union Bill

Likens Proposed Legislation to a Barrel of Oil Flung on the Cooling Embers of Industrial Strife—Sees the Beginning of a Ruinous Civil War and Industrial Strife.

(Special to the Daily Mail by the British United Press)

BLACKPOOL, Eng., May 4—"The proposed trades union bill is a barrel of oil flung on the cooling embers of industrial strife" former Lloyd George declared in a speech yesterday.

"We are beginning to engage in one of the most ruinous civil wars imaginable" he said, "not with rifles but by pitting one organization against another. The bill will create the greatest industrial strife Great Britain has ever known".

NOT MUCH PEP IN THE QUEBEC ELECTIONS

Only Four Conservatives Have Been Named in the Quebec District.

Quebec, May 4—"It seems as though the opposition has abandoned the fight in this district," Premier Taschereau stated this morning when interviewed about election prospects. The Prime Minister was questioned regarding his itinerary during the next two weeks. He said that Liberal headquarters in Montreal had decided that he spend the last few days of the campaign in Montreal and he will consequently go there next Monday or Tuesday. Tonight the Premier will address a gathering at Sherbrooke and on Thursday at Three Rivers.

"What about another speech in Quebec City?" Hon. Mr. Taschereau was asked.

"What's the use of campaigning when we have no opponents," he replied. "It is now two weeks since the Legislature dissolved and we have very few Opposition candidates in this district."

"Mr. Sauve said he would have candidates in all divisions by last Tuesday. But we are still waiting. It seems as though the Opposition has abandoned the fight."

Out of 29 districts in the Quebec area, the Conservatives have named only four candidates. In addition, there are two independent candidates and one Labor, Pierre Bertrand. Liberal candidates have been chosen for the whole of the divisions and in one riding, Charlevoix-Saguenay, there are two Liberals, P. Dufour, the retiring member and Edgar Rochette.

CONSCIENCE SHOULD GUIDE IN THIS CASE

Atlanta, Ga., May 4—"Let your conscience be your guide" said Councilman John A. White, Monday in announcing rules for bathing suits to be worn at the Municipal Swimming Pools at Atlanta this summer. The pools open at noon May 23.

"There will be no restrictions, whatever on bathing suits. Bathers may wear one piece suits or anything else that their conscience dictates" said Mr. White.

ST. THOMAS CASE IN CHANCERY ON 26TH. INST.

Concerns the Custody of Children in Kingsclear—Stay in Moore's Mills Church Case.

The Chancery Court Mr. Justice Grimmer sitting, adjourned Tuesday afternoon until the 26th when the case of St. Thomas vs St. Thomas will be argued. That case is from Myshall Settlement Parish of Kingsclear and concerns the custody of children.

Moore's Mills Case.

In the Chancery Court Tuesday, R. B. Hanson, K. C., filed preliminary objection in the suit of The Trustees of the Union Church and Cemetery of Moore's Mills, Parish of St. David's, Charlotte County vs Frank V. Libby et al. He moved that B. L. Moore, James A. Moore and Frederick Love be substituted as plaintiffs instead of the corporation that they be added as plaintiffs and hearing be stayed. Harry M. Groom appeared on the same side.

P. J. Hughes K. C., for the plaintiffs opposed the motion. Court considers.

The action is instituted to oust the defendants from office as trustees into which they were elected some time ago, the plaintiffs claiming that they are the trustees.

IMPRESSED WITH FLOATING UNIVERSITIES

Spanish Paper Thinks They Would Eliminate Radical Ideas of Revolutionists.

Madrid, May 4—Floating universities such as the one which just completed its cruise from the United States offers an excellent means as training ships to eliminate radical ideas of would be revolutionists, the newspaper Aec of Madrid suggested yesterday.

After praising Premier Primo de Riveras handling of the Catalan Separatist movement, which looked to the separation of the province of Catalina from Spain the newspaper advised that young Catalinians be taken aboard such a school ship as the American floating university. There they could be trained in the proper ideas of government and loyalty to Spain and made into promising subjects of the King the newspaper maintained.

MOTOR-BUS BOARD WAS IN SESSION THIS MORNING

Rules and Regulations Adopted — Ministers on Departmental Business Today — Govt. Meeting Tonight.

The Provincial Motor Bus Board which has charge of administration and regulation of motor-bus traffic in the province was in session here this morning. Present were J. McM. Trueman T. C. Burpee, F. X. LeBlanc, B. H. Kinghorn and G. Earle Logan.

The Board considered rules and regulations which had been prepared by a committee composed of Messrs. Burpee and Kinghorn. In general they followed the rules and regulations in force in other provinces and states making alterations where New Brunswick conditions made them necessary.

A maximum speed of twenty-five miles an hour is stated. The maximum capacity of a bus operating in the Province is twenty-one the Highway Act governing that. Other regulations provide that a bus must accept a fare unless objectionable through intoxication or profane or indecent language. A driver cannot be required to work longer than ten hours in sixteen consecutive hours. The regulations in their entirety are lengthy.

Ministers are Busy.

Premier Baxter motored back to Saint John last night and returned by motor also this morning making the run in two and a half hours although the road was not extra good. Today he attended to the business of the Attorney General's Office. H. Lewis Smith, Minister of Agriculture and Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works, also are at work.

Tonight the Provincial Government will meet in regular monthly session. A. W. Crawford, Federal Director of Technical Education is to appear with W. K. Tibert, Provincial Vocational Director.

CAT WHICH BIT A CHILD HAD RABBIES

Feline Was Sent to Harvard Laboratory For Examination.

WAS FOUND TO BE AFFECTED

Boy Was Playing With the Cat When it Bit Him.

Salem, Mass., May 24—A cat which bit three year old John Moxan, last week was afflicted with rabbies, according to a report from the Harvard University Laboratory, to which the animal was submitted for examination. This is the first case of its kind reported in this section. The child's condition is not reported to be serious. He was playing with the cat when it bit him.

THE PORT OF ST. JOHN WILL BE NATIONALIZED

Ratepayers Vote Almost Unanimously in Favor of the Project.

Saint John, May 4—Saint John yesterday almost unanimously went on record as favorable to harbor nationalization, polling 7,106 votes in favor of turning the port facilities over to the Government and 191 against the proposition.

It was a clean-cut decision on the part of the citizens in adopting the plan that is expected to cut the city's bonded debt by one-third and relieve the ratepayers of the cost of the upkeep and development of the harbor. Speaking to The Telegraph-Journal after the result of the vote was known Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, Premier of New Brunswick, and His Worship Mayor W. W. White, both expressed their approval of the splendid response on the part of the citizens in favoring this national development.

"It is something that should have been done long ago and I am glad that it has been done at last," Premier Baxter said.

"It was a wonderful vote," said Mayor White, "considering that it was merely a plebiscite. The people are to be congratulated on showing the rest of Canada that they are determined to have nationalization. It is only the first step and with such a mandate of the people backing them the Commission should experience little difficulty. The Government can now carry out the recommendation of the Duncan Report, which said: 'Development ahead of trade.'"

The total vote cast was 1,000 more than that polled in the last civic election and proved conclusively that seriousness with which the people of the city regarded the opportunity. The last plebiscite held in the city, on the Vocational School matter, drew 5,104 voters to the polls, over 2,000 less than those voting yesterday. The vote was easily counted, the returns coming in regularly starting shortly after 7 o'clock. The indication given by the first return was not departed from by any of the other results. Kings, Queens and Dukes wards all had polled unanimously in favor and all the others gave overwhelming majorities.

The Harbor Board.

The names of Ex-Mayor R. T. Hayes and William E. Scully, ex-M. P. P. are mentioned in connection with places on the commission shortly to be appointed to administer Saint John harbor.

A Note Sent by Great Britain to the U. S. in Regard to War Debts

Announcement Made in London on an Authoritative Source—May Have Had Reference to Correspondence Between Secretary Mellon and President of Princeton University.

LONDON, May 4—Great Britain has sent a note to the United States regarding war debts, it was said authoritatively today. Speculation here suggested that the note may have had a reference to the recent correspondence between Secretary of the Treasury Andrew Mellon, and President John Grier Bibben, of Princeton University in which the secretary defended administration debts policies against the criticism of members of the Princeton faculty.

Mr. Ink who had fished on the Saint John River last season is warm in his praises of New Brunswick fishing. Mr. Gammiter is a prominent railroad man.
