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Bolsheviks Now Carrying On a Vengeance Campaign

Action Taken by Britain and Canada in Cutting Off Trade Relations With Russia is Amply Justified — Far Sightedness of British Diplomacy is Now Being Recognized in Europe.

LONDON, June 11—The policy pursued by both Great Britain and Canada in deciding to have nothing more to do officially with the Union of Socialist republics is held in official circles here to have been more than justified by the dawn in Russia of what is apparently a new reign of terror, and the execution of twenty persons accused of anti-soviet activities, carried out by the Reds in a "vengeance campaign" vindicates indirectly such a policy.

Far Sighted Diplomacy

Despatches received in London today indicate that the opinion of almost the whole of Europe has veered emphatically in favor of Britain whose timely action in conjunction with Canada is regarded as still another proof of the farsightedness of British diplomacy which has long realized that Russia has not yet been won back to civilization.

It is pointed out by Government officials here that by their latest manifestation of bloodlust the bolsheviks have outlawed themselves among the nations of the world and must themselves already be regretting the blind madness of such action.

MORE WOOD USED FOR HEAT THAN BUILDING

Washington, June 11—More wood is used every year to heat the houses of the American people than to build them. This fact is borne out by statistics of the United States Department of Agriculture which show that 9,500,000,000 cubic feet of wood is removed from the forests annually for fuel and 8,256,000,000 for lumber.

While fuel and lumber make the greatest demands upon our forests, the American Forest Week Committee, in connection with the national observance of the week, April 24 to 30, calls attention to the other industries which demand enormous quantities of wood. Railroads require about 75 million ties a year to keep up the 250,000 miles of railroad in the United States. Formerly the railroads used 100 million, due to the preservatives used to lengthen the life of the ties. It takes a good-sized tree, about 40 years old, to make ties. Considering the 250,000 miles of railroads, with a tie every two feet, one can get some idea of the enormous number of trees used for this purpose.

Telephone and telegraph companies use a million poles a year and fence posts reach the billion mark.

GETS A JOB ON STAFF OF THE PREMIER

Ottawa, June 10—Prof. Rogers, head of the department of political economy at Acadia University, Wolfville, N. S., has been appointed to the staff of Premier King, as secretary to the president of the Privy Council.

The appointment, so far, is for the summer months, as Prof. Rogers has not terminated his connection with the university.

It was very possible, however, it was said, that he might fill the new position of executive assistant to the prime minister, for which parliament last session appropriated a vote of \$8,000.

SOCIALISM NOT SYNONYMOUS WITH POVERTY

Paris, June 11—Champagne and fine pastries are affecting the socialistic reputation of Fernand Bouisson, president of the Chamber of Deputies.

Bouisson is the richest Socialist in French politics.

The popular idea here that Socialism is synonymous with poverty and that the theory must be visualized by shabbiness, is getting quite a shock.

When Bouisson, who is given a palace by the government, gave his first reception, it was a marvel of rich food, costly drink and elaborate decoration.

All the cabinet ministers were there, including Briand who abhors society's entertainments.

LESS HARMFUL BEVERAGE WAS SUBSTITUTED

Shipment of Alcohol Was Turned Into Water While it Was in Transit.

Montreal, June 10—"Personally, I have a very decided opinion in this case, but it is not necessary or advisable to state it here. We will take it under consideration."

In these words, Chief Commissioner J. T. Brown, of the Royal Customs Commission, reserved decision in the "Todd case," one of those that has commanded the attention of both the parliamentary committee on customs and the Royal Commission. Today, R. L. Calder, K. C., counsel for the commission, submitted to the commissioners that the evidence taken in this case should be sent to the minister of justice with a view to the prosecution of E. N. Todd for conspiracy to defraud the government. Coupled with this submission was another that the government proceed to recover on the bond taken from the Consolidated Distillers of Corbyville in connection with the shipment of alcohol, which evidence has connected with Mr. Todd.

The submissions of counsel were based partly on evidence taken from Walter C. Duncan, who appeared before the commission at Ottawa, and partly on certain telegrams sent by Mr. Todd which are in the record. The story, in brief, is that a number of drums of alcohol were purchased from the Corbyville distillery, presumably for export to St. John's, Nfld. When the drums reached St. John's, they were found to contain water, the alcohol apparently having been run off at some point en route and the water substituted. The chief interest of the government arose from the fact that the alcohol if sold in Canada would have been subject to the excise tax of \$9 a gallon as well as sales tax. The amount involved is large.

VESSEL GOES TO GRAVE AFTER 126 YEARS' TOIL

London, June 11—After 126 years continuously trading between Southampton and Cowes, Isle of Wight, the little wooden ketch, The Bee, has been withdrawn from service and will be filled with cement and sunk in the Medina River. The Bee was one of the oldest vessels in service in the country. She passed between Southampton and Cowes something like 40,000 times. Her total mileage was 566,112 miles, which for a vessel of her size is remarkable.

A REPORT OF A RECORD SWIM UNCONFIRMED

Paris, June 11—Investigation at Calais today failed to discover witnesses of the reported channel swimming feat of Venceslas Spacek, a Czecho-Slovakian, who was said to have swum from Wissant, France, to Dover in record time. The Calais correspondent of the United Press reported by telephone that there was nothing officially about it there.

BOMB THROWER MAY GET THIRTY YEARS IN PRISON

Anarchist Who Tried to Kill Mussolini Now on Trial.

STIFF PENALTY DEMANDED

Accused Liable to Death Sentence Under New Law.

Rome, June 11—Thirty years in prison for the young anarchist Lucetti who hurled a bomb at Premier Mussolini in Rome was demanded as punishment today by Advocate General Nosedo, prosecuting Lucetti before the special court created to try such offenders.

Nosedo asked that Lucetti's alleged accomplices Sorio and Vatteroni be sentenced to 20 and 18 years in prison respectively.

Lucetti's attempt of Mussolini's life was made before the law providing new penalties was passed. Under the old statute, maximum punishment would be thirty years in prison. The new penalty would be death.

WILL NOT SHARE IN NEW YORK STATE BONUS

Allies Who Were Discharged During Great War For Good of Service are Cut Out.

Albany N. Y. June 11—More than 400 persons discharged from the army during the world war for the "good of the service" because they were enemy aliens will not be permitted to share in the \$45,000,000 bonus set up by the New York State for its world war veterans. This became known today through an opinion of the third appellate department confirming a similar ruling by the Attorney General.

The action was brought by Peter Norylev of Rochester an Australian who has since become a citizen who contended that he was honorably discharged from the service and was entitled to the bonus.

The state did not assert he was discharged but that his discharge could not be constructed as honorable because of the endorsement "for the good of the service."

The state will save approximately \$50,000 by the rule.

Parisians Engage in A Mad Whirl of Dancing and Drinking

The Annual Quatz Arts Ball Took Place Today — Dancers Wore Little Except Yellow and Green Paint—Americans Admitted That the Ball Surpassed Their Most Optimistic Expectations.

PARIS, June 11—As dawn broke in Paris today, two score beauties of impeccable lines and matchless complexion stood unrobed while 3,000 shrieking, dancing people, sought to elect the winner of the annual Quatz Arts Ball. The few hundred Americans present admitted the ball surpassed even their most optimistic expectations.

It is an orgy, when only once a year thousands of persons almost nude except for freshly painted coats of canary yellow or green, engage in a mad whirl of dancing and drinking.

Parisians turned their heads as nearly naked dancers paraded the streets and rode the subways in the direction of Wagram Hall, but thousands blocked the streets for blocks around to get a glimpse of the artists.

The ball ended at six a. m. with the traditional stroll down the Champs Elysees and a bath in the fountains of the Place De La Concord.

MRS. J. E. OWENS WAS ELECTED VICE PRESIDENT

Montreal, June 10—Mrs. J. E. Dugan, of Edmonton, Alberta, was elected president of the Catholic Women's League of Canada at the closing session of the convention of that organization here today.

Other officers elected were: First vice-president, Mrs. A. W. Robertson, of Montreal; second vice-president, Mrs. M. J. Lyons, Ottawa; third vice-president, Mrs. John Owens, Saint John, N. B., honorary secretary, Mrs. W. J. MacIntyre, Charlottetown, P. E. I.; honorary treasurer, Mrs. Donald Fraser, Chatham, N. B.

Reports of the organization in eastern Canada, and of the Winnipeg and Toronto sub-divisions were read and various minor amendments in the constitution adopted.

Calgary, Alberta, was chosen as the venue for the next convention.

GEM THEFTS ARE BARED

New York June 11—Arthur Gibson confessed "gentleman burglar" has promised to lead police to secret hiding places where he says a horde of jewels stolen from Long Island homes and valued at \$1,000,000 are secreted.

The cache is the accumulation of 15 robberies which have baffled metropolitan police for the past three years, Gibson said.

Questioned for more than six hours Gibson told how he and his associates had planned and executed thefts in wealthy homes in Long Island, Westchester and New Jersey. Yesterday he pleaded guilty to robbing the home of Jesse L. Livermore of \$83,000 in jewelry.

Explaining the methods of his exploits Gibson said his chief aids were "the society columns of a morning newspaper and moonless nights."

"We treated everybody nicely" Gibson said. "A show of a gun was all that was needed to keep them quiet in the first place and after that it was courtesy and tact. It certainly is remarkable what one can do with people by the use of a little tact."

Gibson's confession led to the arrest of Morris Frank a Bronx barber who Gibson said was the "fence" through whom he and his pal "Boston Billy" Williams disposed of the stolen jewels. Frank is being held and the police are seeking Williams.

FIRST RESULTS OF ELECTION IN IRELAND

Dublin, June 10—First returns in yesterday's general elections for the Dail Eireann were received tonight from County Monaghan, resulting in the return of one government candidate, a candidate of the Fianna Fail party representing the supporters of Eamon De Valera, and a Protestant independent candidate.

As a result of the first count, none of the eight candidates for the three seats obtained the required number of votes—7,600—but under the proportional representation system used in the elections, three seats were filled.

Ernest Blythe, regarded as the most doubtful of all the government candidates, will, by virtue of the transferred vote from Duffy, the other government candidate, head the poll and will be accompanied to the Dail by Dr. McCarvill, the Fianna Fail nominee, and Mr. Taslette, the Protestant independent candidate. The total poll was 31,432 out of 39,160 on the register.

COURT HOUSE MARKET WAS REALITY TODAY

Two large week-end markets were held in the city this morning one at Phoenix Square and the other at the Court House Square. The teams surrounded both the city hall and the County Court House and buyers were plentiful at both places. There were not as many buyers, however at the lower market as at the upper one and the prices in consequence differed slightly. They differed very little however from those of last week. Prices ranged as follows:—

The Phoenix Square market had the largest number of patrons and about half of the paid lots were occupied. At one time there were about twenty-five teams and autos at the Court House. It has been suggested that as a means of stimulating business at the Court House the farmers who go there should do something in the way of price cutting.
