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French Communist Thinks Revolution Will Succeed

Deputy Doriot, Just Back From China, Addresses a Mass Meeting of His Fellows—Threatened With Arrest for Engaging in Anti-French Propaganda in the Far East—Predicts Union With Russia.

(Special to the Daily Mail by the British United Press)

PARIS, June 18—China's revolution is certain to succeed deputy Jacques Doriot, of the French Chamber of Deputies told a communist mass meeting which he addressed last night on return from China. Doriot is alleged by the French government to have engaged in anti-French propaganda in the Far East and his arrest, despite parliamentary immunity, awaits on a decision of the court of appeals. Doriot's appearance before the mass meeting was his first in public since returning to France.

The communists cheered Doriot whose appearance in Paris was something of a mystery since the government apparently did not know how he had reentered France.

China's revolutionary army is growing stronger every day as officers and men are better trained, he said. He predicted that revolutionary China eventually would unite with Soviet Russia.

THE P. E. ISLAND CAMPAIGN NOW IN FULL SWING

Polling is Set for Monday, June 15th—Prohibition is the Principal Issue.

Charlottetown, P. E. I. June 18—With nominations taking place today and polling day set for Saturday, June 25 the provincial general election campaign is in full swing in Prince Edward Island the battle being waged between the two old time parties, Liberals and Conservatives and the traditional system of holding joint meetings prevailing. The people will elect fifteen Assemblymen there is practically universal suffrage, the only limitation being the matter of age. Women will vote on an equality with men. For Councillors the voter (or his wife or her husband as the case may be) must possess property to the value of \$325.

The main issue is the liquor problem. Premier J. D. Stewart's policy on this question is to institute a system of Government control similar to that in Ontario and now being inaugurated in New Brunswick. A. C. Saunders leader of the Liberal forces advocates prohibition with amendments to the Act which will make it more workable; reduction in the cost of liquors sold for medicinal purposes and reduction in the fees charged by physicians for issuing prescriptions and more rigorous enforcement of the Act as well as closer cooperation with the Federal Government in the prevention of smuggling.

THE ATTEMPT TO BREAK THE CHAMBERLIN RECORD FAILED

LONDON, June 18—Flight Lieut. Carr and MacKworth of the Royal Air Force, who left Cranwell today on an attempt to break the non-stop distance record now held by Clarence Chamberlin in his monoplane Columbia were forced down at Martlesham, in Suffolk. It was Carr's second failure in an attempt to set a record. He left England for the Orient the day Charles Lindbergh left New York for Paris but was forced down in the Persian Gulf after travelling about 250 miles less than Lindbergh's distance which later was exceeded by Chamberlin.

FLARE LIGHTS AGAIN SEEN IN QUEBEC

The Price Company Reports and Will Send Out an Airplane.

Chicoutimi, Que., June 17—In spite of the statement issued last night by Price Brothers & Company to the effect that the "distress signals" seen in St. Germain township and which should be associated in the popular mind with the missing French aviators, Nungesser and Goll were undeniable the lights of the power house at Chateaux Aux Galets 35 miles east of St. Germain, there continued to come reports that lights were still being seen on the Peribonka River in a different general direction from St. Germain as Chateaux Aux Galets.

Tonight the Price Company received reports from their fire observation tower at Ferland that watchmen had seen lights in the direction of Peribonka. These lights were repeated four times between 8 o'clock and 10, according to the company report. Those on the tower on the Shippaw saw the lights of the Chateaux Aux Galets this evening but were prevented by the mountains from seeing those observed from Ferland on the Peribonka.

Plane Will Scout.

Tomorrow an aeroplane of the Fairchild Aerial Survey Company of Grandmère will arrive at Chicoutimi, from Roberval and will scout the area over the Peribonka.

The Price Company will send men with fuses to Chateaux Aux Galets in order to verify whether the lights given out by the power house there are similar to lights that could be made by fuses. These men will make their signals when the power house closes down temporarily for a space over the week-end.

Meantime George Rousseau the trapper of Bagotville adhered to his story that he heard an aeroplane over the Saguenay River on May 9 and his report has been sent to Premier Taschereau for such action as the Quebec provincial government might see fit.

UPHEAVAL IN HALIFAX CITY COUNCIL

Halifax, N. S. June 17—The seldom placid surface of civic officialdom in Halifax was stormy today following the upheaval in the City Council last night when Mayor J. B. Kenny, serving his second term as chief magistrate of Halifax, dramatically resigned while presiding over a Council meeting and left the City Hall.

His resignation, which was precipitated when the Council by a vote of 12 to 5 refused to support his policy in regard to the construction of a \$95,000 infectious diseases hospital, was preceded by the resignation of Alderman Robert Daw, who took that action in order that he might accept the appointment of Chief Inspector under the Nova Scotia Temperance Act. Civic elections will be held on July 13.

TO DEBATE ON PROHIBITION

Halifax, June 18—If present plans hold good W. P. Buckley will leave the city over the week end to participate in joint debates in Prince Edward Island during the last week of the election campaign on the Island Temperance Act. It is understood that Mr. Buckley is paying his own expenses. While in the Island he will debate with Rev. H. R. Grant and Mrs. P. H. Newcombe.

CHANG IS NOW A POWERFUL MILITARIST

His Inauguration as Generalissimo Took Place Today.

**IS THE COCK
OF THE NORTH**

Reception held for Members of the Diplomatic Corps.

Peking, June 18—Marshall Chang Tso-Lin, most powerful militarist of China was inaugurated today as civil and military dictator in the north with headquarters at Peking. The inauguration took place at the Presidential Palace, Chang, who now possesses the title of Generalissimo subsequently received John W. A. McMurray the United States Minister and other members of the diplomatic corps at the Foreign Office.

THE FIREWORKS FOR JUBILEE HAVE ARRIVED

What looks like a fast record for transportation has been accomplished in connection with the shipment of the large Fireworks display ordered for the Provincial Celebration of the Diamond Jubilee of Confederation in Fredericton on July 1st.

The shipment left Hamilton, Ont., by Canadian Pacific Railway freight and in five days reached this city. The entire display is now housed in the fireworks building at the Fredericton Exhibition where under the direction of F. L. Cooper, Chairman of the Amusement Committee of the Fredericton Exhibition, the set pieces are being assembled by those who have been engaged to take charge of firing the display from barges anchored on the St. John River in front of the Parliament Buildings on the evening of Dominion Day.

Included in the programme are a number of exceptional set pieces appropriate for the Diamond Jubilee Celebration, including a portrait of Sir John A. Macdonald and a portrait of Sir Leonard Tilley which will be shown in fireworks.

There will also be portraits shown of His Majesty the King, H. R. H. the Prince of Wales the Emblems and other set pieces which have been expressly made by the T. W. Hand Firework Company for Diamond Jubilee Celebrations throughout Canada.

THE LIBRARY COMMITTEE HELD MEETING

There was a meeting this morning of the Library Committee of the Legislature which was appointed some time ago to investigate the legislative library and suggest changes. The committee carried on a lengthy discussion. Mr. Evans was appointed chairman of the purchasing committee with Mrs. J. L. Neville as secretary. Those present were Mr. Evans, Dr. C. C. Jones, Dr. H. H. Hagerman and Mrs. J. L. Neville.

A list of proposed purchases was made out for further revision and there was a suggestion that the library be moved from the present building to a new one and possibly amalgamated with other libraries. The matter was discussed at some length but no decision was arrived at. The meeting adjourned after some discussion to meet sometime in July.

Mayor of Buffalo Gives an Important Ruling in Pop Case

Declares the Proprietor of a Soft Drinkery Cannot Sell Soda Water to an Addict if His Wife Protests—Says the Wishes of Women Must be Respected.

BUFFALO, N. Y., June 18—A man may not take several glasses of soda pop in Buffalo if his wife protests. Mayor Frank X. Schawab Friday ruled in the case of Paul Olah Jolah, proprietor of a soft drinkery. Charged with selling drinks to an addict in the face of his wife's expressed wishes, Olah claimed he could sell all he wanted.

"No," said the Mayor "he can't. I won't stand for it. If a wife asks a soft drink proprietor to quit selling drinks to her husband he must stop at once or I'll have his license torn from his wall. The wishes of women must be respected." Olah was placed on thirty day's probation.

DAUGHTER OF HON. W. H. STEEVES STILL LIVING

As before stated in these columns New Brunswick is able to boast but two sons of Fathers of Confederation—Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, of Saint John, President of the Executive Council, and Mr. P. Campbell Johnson of Moncton. Mr. Tilley is a son of Sir Leonard Tilley, who was the chief of the Fathers of Confederation in New Brunswick, and Mr. Johnson is a son of Hon. John M. Johnson, a native of Chatham and a former Attorney General of the province. Yesterday reference was made in these columns to Hon. W. H. Steeves, another New Brunswick Father of Confederation. It has since been learned that he has a daughter, Miss Carolina Steeves, residing in England. Two Nova Scotians, Mr. W. A. Henry of Halifax and Mr. W. J. Tupper of Winnipeg are sons of Fathers of Confederation. Mr. R. H. Simonds of this city is a nephew of Sir Charles Tupper on his wife's side.

CAMP SUSSEX WILL OPEN ON TUESDAY NEXT

The Military camp at Sussex opens on Tuesday next and quite a number of men are to attend from the city. The advance party will leave on Monday and the others will follow on Tuesday night.

Twenty-one men will go in the York Regiment "A" Company and twenty-one in each of the other companies. The Dragoons will march from Fredericton to Sussex while the Infantry will go by car and train.

The training will continue until the 30th of June when camp will break up and the units will return to participate in the Jubilee celebration.

WOMAN TO ATTEMPT NON-STOP FLIGHT OVER ATLANTIC IN JULY

NEY YORK, N. Y., June 18—Mme. Lutha Phillips, pioneer aviatrix and holder of the world's altitude record for women, will attempt a non-stop flight from Roosevelt Field to London and Rome in July, according to Capt. George H. Maines, her representative. Mme. Phillips who is known in Europe as Galanchikoff, established a world altitude record for women in Russia Nov. 22, 1912. Later she established a women's record of six and one half hours for sustained flight. In 1911 when a student in Russia she learned to fly a Farman plane. Anthony Folker had just built his first military plane, and was seeking financial backing in Russia. She piloted his first Folker. During the war Mme. Phillips flew for the red cross on the Russian front carrying medicinal supplies. No announcement has been made as to the type of plane she intends using on her trans-Atlantic flight.

BUDDHA'S IMAGE IS NOW COMPLETED

Tokio, June 18—An image of Buddha the largest in the world has been completed at Ueno on the outskirts of Nagoya.

The statue is of reinforced concrete and is nine feet higher than the famous great Buddha of Nara which is visited by most of the American tourists coming to Japan. The new Buddha is sixty feet high with the face measuring twenty-four feet from the tip of the chin to the top of the head.

The image required three years to build and cost about 150,000 yen.
