Will Not Submit Chinese Question to the League

British Government Not Likely to Take This Course But May Keep the League Informed on All Developments. Italian Cruiser Will Depart Today for the Far East With Landing Parties on Board.

LONDON, Feb. 9—Britain will not submit the Chinese question to the League of Nations, the United Press was authoritatively informed today but the government was considering the advisability of keeping the League informed of all developments.

Italy Will Send Cruiser

Rome, Feb. 9—The Italian cruiser San Giorgio, the United Press was authoritatively informed today will depart for China this month with landing parties aboard.

Members of Premier Mussolini's personal army, the Fascist militia, may have an opportunity for active service in China, if it becomes necessary to land Italian army parties there. A detachment of militia would be included in the cruiser's passengers.

Mussolini recently assumed direct command of the militia which has as its principal objective the protection of Il Duce and the perpetuation of his rule.

N. S. SENATOR IS DIVORCED BY WIFE

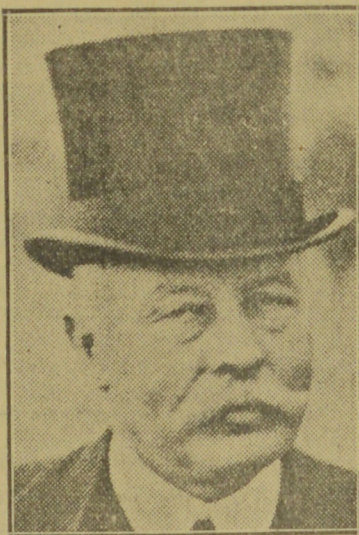
Cruel and Abusive Treatment Alleged — \$10,000 a Year Alimony to be Paid.

MANY DEATHS FROM STORM IN NORTHERN JAPAN

The Death Toll Reported to Have Reached Forty-five.

COLLAPSE OF A TEMPLE

Railway Passengers Marooned and Suffered From Cold.

Tokio, Feb. 9—Heavy snows in Northern Japan have caused at least thirty-five deaths, dispatches said today.

The head priest and four others were crushed when the temple at Fukui collapsed under the weight of the snow on the roof.

Trains were marooned in the heavy drifts and five hundred passengers were imprisoned, suffering intensely from cold and hunger.

MANY AUTOS ARE OWNED IN MONCTON

Moncton, Feb. 8—Moncton had 1,601 passenger automobiles in 1926 as compared with 1,301 in 1925 according to figures in the office of the city assessor. In addition to these in 1926 there were 125 trucks and 10 buses making a total of 1,736 motor vehicles.

When the suburbs with their 160 are counted in, however the total number of cars using the city streets the greater part of the time is almost 1,900. The increase in Gungnissville, Sunny Brae, Lewisville and Humphrey's classed as suburbs was only 13 in the last year, according to the figures.

McPherson died in Boston from pneumonia yesterday and today another brother Lanchlan 45 passed away.

Says U. S. is Trying to Divert Attention from The Mexican Trouble

Democratic Congressman Predicts That Mexico's Offer to Arbitrate Will be Rejected—Says William Randolph Hearst is the Main Agitator for a War with Mexico.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 9—By sending naval forces to China, the administration is attempting to divert attention from Mexico and Nicaragua, representative Huddleston, Alabama, Democrat, declared in the House yesterday.

He predicted that Mexico's offer to arbitrate would be rejected, and named William Randolph Hearst, newspaper publisher, as one of the main agitators for war with Mexico.

"Hearst owns over a million acres of land in Mexico", he said. "It has been Hearst the great property owner, the selfish Hearst, and the non-combatant who has clamored for war".

REBELS HOLD THEIR GROUND AT LISBON

London, Feb. 9—There has been no British casualties resulting from revolutionary street fighting in Lisbon up to midnight on Tuesday, private messages received here from Lisbon said.

"The situation still is uncertain", a message said. "The rebels are still holding important positions and firing is continuing."

PROVINCE OF N. B. RECEIVES 99.68 FOR TWENTY YEAR BONDS; EQUAL TO PRICE PAID ONTARIO

The Province of New Brunswick is in sound financial condition and that condition is appreciated by the financial market for the bid of 99.68 for \$640,000 in twenty-year bonds made by the Dominion Bank, Toronto and Bell, Guinlock & Co., accepted yesterday, was equal to what Ontario received for her issue of \$24,000,000 a short time ago.

The interest-rate is 4 3/4 percent. Two bids were invited on ten-year and twenty-year terms. The successful bidder also was highest of eleven for the ten-year term. It was considered more advantageous to accept the bid for the twenty-year issue. The interest yield at the figure 99.68 will be 4.77 per cent.
