

Thirty-Five Degrees in Course At University Encaenia

One Master's Degree and Thirty-four Bachelors'—Fifteen Women in Class of 1927—Douglas Gold Medal Won by R. J. Love of Devon—Twenty-four Arts, Five Law, Three Engineering and Two Forestry.

The announcements made today of the degrees, prizes, medals, honors and distinctions in connection with the University of New Brunswick encaenia on Thursday show that thirty-five degrees in course will be conferred. One is a Master's degree upon R. G. Barbour who was graduated in Electrical Engineering in 1923. The others are bachelors' degrees in Arts, Law and Applied Science.

The Class of 1927 consists of thirty-four members five of whom attended the Law School at Saint John. Fifteen of the class are women. Six members of the class take their degrees with honors. Arts degrees number twenty-three, Law degrees five, Civil Engineering degrees two, Electrical Engineering degrees one, Forestry degrees three.

Among the medallists R. J. Love of Devon is prominent as winner of the Douglas Gold Medal for English Essay. Miss Nettie H. Coy of Fredericton wins the City of Fredericton Medal. It is rather unusual for a woman to win that medal. Since its institution in 1908 Miss Coy is the third woman to win it.

NUMBER OF JOBLESS ON THE DECREASE

Survey Made in England by the Minister of Labor.

**A MILLION
OUT OF WORK**

**The Survey Shows 84,000
Less Than a Year Ago.**

London, May 11—Unemployment is decreasing in England and fewer than one million men are expected to be jobless by the time the Ministry of Labor issues its next report, a survey made public by the Ministry predicted.

Unemployment on May 2 totalled 1,021,000 which was 23,000 less than the week before and 84,000 less than the figure a year ago when the coal strike had just started, the Ministry's report said. The 1926 figure used for comparison did not include minors who had walked out.

MRS. SNYDER COLLAPSES IN HER CELL

New York, May 10—Mrs. Ruth Snyder the steely blonde of the Snyder-Gray murder trial suffered a second collapse in her cell today.

Physicians attended her for nearly an hour after she fainted during what they termed an attack of hysterical epilepsy.

The attack today was the second since Mrs. Snyder heard read last night the verdict that means death in the electric chair. About an hour after the verdict was read she collapsed in her cell although she showed little emotion at the time the verdict was read.

Henry Judd Gray, Mrs. Snyder's corset salesman paramour, who also was found guilty of the murder of her husband, Albert Snyder magazine art editor ate his breakfast in composure this morning. He, like Mrs. Snyder showed no great emotion when the verdict was read.

The doctors describing Mrs. Snyder's attacks today said that such epileptic attacks often precede insanity and that they had no doubt that a frequent recurrence of such attacks as the two she has suffered since the verdict might produce insanity. Both are to be sentenced next Monday, death sentence being mandatory.

NINE PAIRS WEDDED AT SAME TIME

London, May 11—Mass marriage appeals to men, but women do not like it. This was demonstrated in a recent wedding at the Church of St. George-the-Martyr, Southwark, where nine pairs took their marriage vows simultaneously.

J. A. Blankthorn, the parish clerk who was instructed with the job of getting the nine bridegrooms properly placed before the altar and with assorting the veiled brides as they arrived, in discussing the ceremony after it was over, said the bridegrooms liked the crowd, as they said, "A fellow feels like such a fool stuck up at the altar all by himself." But the brides all said they would rather have had a romantic wedding "of their own."

Hydroplanes to Aid In the Search for the Missing Aviators

Wireless Messages Bring No Word of the Fate of Capts. Nungesser and Coli—Naval Tugs are Cruising Northern New England Waters—Report of Anti-American Feeling in Paris Denied.

BOSTON, Mass., May 11—Wireless messages received by local stations during the night brought no word of the fate of Capt. Charles Nungesser and Francois Coli, missing French flyers.

Favored by improved weather conditions, the naval tugs Wandank and Mohave were still cruising northern New England waters in search of the airmen. More than a dozen coast guard craft were cooperating. Meanwhile preparations were made at the navy reserve air station at Squantum for the dispatching of hydroplanes to aid in the search. Two hydroplanes which were to have left the station yesterday were kept from the air by an extraordinarily heavy fog.

No Anti-American Feeling

PARIS, May 11—Official denial of anti-American demonstrations in connection with the failure of Captains Nungesser and Coli to succeed in their effort to fly from Paris to New York was made by the French Foreign Office today.

The Foreign Office took cognizance of reports cabled to the United States that there had been demonstrations here against America and Americans. In an official statement, the Foreign Office said manifestations of popular anger were against the press, because of false news of the fliers success and particularly against the French press.

ARSON CASE BEFORE COURT AT OROMOCTO

Oromocto, May 10—The trial of George B. Hallett, charged with the burning of a house at Three Tree Creek, Sunbury county last fall, opened here today before Judge Slipp. The trial is expected to last until Friday.

Information in this case was laid again Hallett by H. H. McLeann, provincial fire marshal, and the preliminary hearing took place on December 10, last, at Fredericton Junction. Today the grand jury brought in a true bill against Hallett, and also a recommendation that one, Harvey Cook, be tried on the same four charges of indictment.

Daniel Mullin, K. C., solicitor of the N. B. Fire Prevention Board, is prosecuting for the attorney-general, and Charles Robinson, secretary of the N. B. Fire Prevention Board, is representing the fire marshal.

Today the petit jury was sworn in and Mr. Mullin cited the case to the jury when the court adjourned to meet tomorrow morning (Wednesday), at 10 o'clock.

Mr. McNair, of Winslow & McNair, Fredericton, is defending the accused.

SAYS THE LEAGUE HAS NO RIGHT TO INTERFERE

**Sir George Foster Spoke
Twice at Saint John
Yesterday.**

St. John, May 11—That the League of Nations has no more right to interfere with internal strife in China than between the political parties in Canada was the assertion of Sir George E. Foster former Canadian representative at the League in his masterly address upon the League given last evening in St. David's Memorial Hall under the auspices of the Saint John Branch of the League of Nations' Society.

Sir George who has never failed of a rousing welcome in Saint John addressed two meetings here yesterday, speaking also before the Gyro Club at noon when he made a strong plea for active interest in public affairs especially in this year of the diamond jubilee of Confederation.

He has a capacity audience in the Memorial Hall last evening and was warmly and frequently applauded. He gave a vividly impressive picture of the scene at the League Assembly in September 1926, when Germany had formally taken her place and described how he had broken all the laws of such august assemblies by calling for three cheers for Briand after the French representative had delivered his magnificent reply to the address of the German delegate Stressemann which had been a masterpiece in careful preparation.
