Vagabonds of the Air Off Start for Constantinople

Set Out From Munich This Morning in Their Monoplane "The Pride of Detroit"—Hope to Make the Flight in Twelve Hours—On Third Leg of Flight Around the World.

(Special to the Daily Mail by the British United Press)

Munich, Germany, Aug. 30—The self-styled vagabonds of the air, William S. Brock and Edward F. Schlee, resumed their 1001 hour jog around the world at 6.36 a.m. today when they left in their monoplane "The Pride of Detroit" for Constantinople.

They left Munich with the intention of flying to the Turkish Capital without a stop and hoped to cover the 1100 miles in twelve hours.

Today's journey is the third leg of their flight around the world. Brock and Schlee started from Harbor Grace, Newfoundland Saturday morning, arrived at Croydon, England, Sunday, left there yesterday morning and arrived at Munich yesterday at 4 p. m.

Levine May Start Tomorrow

London, Aug. 30—Charles A. Levine and a pilot expected to be named today, probably Captain Walter R. C. Hinchliffe may start tomorrow in the Bellanca monoplane Columbia on a non-stop flight to Long Island, Levine told newspapermen today. He added, however, that the date was still indefinite.

GHOST WAS IN LEAGUE WITH FARMER'S WIFE

Bellefonte, Pa., Aug. 30—Two officers slept two nights in a "haunted house" before they laid the "ghost" which for years is said to have tried to force W. J. Walker from his farm here so that his wife could secure control.

The "ghost" and two accomplices are under bond for hearing as a result of a confession obtained, state police say, from Gurney Smull, the farm hand "ghost" who says he was hired by his employer's wife.

Walker, on the verge of nervous collapse, appealed to Sheriff Taylor and state motor patrol corporal Miller for protection several days ago. The two spent two nights in the farm house. The first night the sheets were snatched from their beds as they slept and a white clad figure vanished among the outbuildings as they watched from their window. Next day warnings to all occupants to flee were found daubed about the interior of the house in a red fluid resembling blood.

Because farm hand and "ghost" were of the same stature the patrolman's suspicions were aroused. Close questioning of the man resulted in a signed confession he said. Mrs. Walker and Miss Velma Miller a summer boarded were arrested shortly afterward.

WAR VETERAN WILL PILOT LEVINE ACROSS

Croydon Air Port, Aug. 30—Charles A. Levine announced today that he had selected Captain R. G. Hinchliffe to pilot the Bellanca Monoplane, Columbia on its return flight across the Atlantic to New York.

Hinchliffe lost an eye in an air fight during the war. He is one of Britain's foremost fliers. Weather permitting Levine said he and Hinchliffe would start soon for New York from Cranwell flying-field.

LEVINE HAS ADJUSTED HIS DIFFICULTIES

Paris Aug. 30—Chas. A. Levine's business difficulties with French aviators were amicably adjusted today, the United Press was informed. Charles Lockwood of New York who acted as spokesman for the American owner of the Bellanca Monoplane, Columbia made the statement.

Mrs. Levine said Lockwood met Maurice Drouhin and his mechanic Mathis and paid them 80,000 and 10,000 francs respectively.

THE BRITISH DELEGATES OFF FOR GENEVA

London, Aug. 30—The British delegation to the League of Nations meeting which is to convene next week at Geneva left today without Viscount Cecil of Chelwood who has resigned from the Baldwin Government.

Included in the Delegation were Sir Austen Chamberlain, the foreign secretary, the Earl of Onslow, Sir Edward Young and Sir Cecil Hurst.

16 SALLIES TO MAKE LEGION'S DOUGHNUTS

New York, Aug. 30—With the strains of "Over There" and the cheers of a shipload of American Legion members forming their bon voyage greeting, 16 khaki-clad "dough girls" of the Salvation Army were bound for Paris today to make again the dough that made them famous.

Headed by Capt. Helen Pudviance the "Sallies" sailed on Cunard liner Lancastria yesterday with 750 legionnaires bound for the legion convention in Paris. Camdr. Evangeline Booth of the Salvation Army will sail with her personal staff on Sept. 10.

VISCOUNT CECIL HAS RESIGNED FROM CABINET

Thinks He Will be Able to Do Better Work for Disarmament Outside.

London, Aug. 29—Viscount Cecil's resignation of his cabinet post, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster was announced definitely tonight. It will take effect immediately although the chancellor will carry on until his successor is appointed.

His resignation means that Lord Cecil will not go to Geneva for the coming meeting of the League of Nations assembly. Who will take his place is not yet known.

Failure of Conference.
Explaining his step tonight Lord Cecil said: "The reasons for my action are to be found in the general history of the disarmament question, culminating in the failure of the Geneva conference. I feel I shall be able to do better work in the cause of disarmament outside the cabinet than in, therefore I shall not go to Geneva as a British delegate."

"It is of course possible that I may go to Geneva in the future as the representative of Great Britain without being a member of the government. But of that I cannot speak."

Then alluding to the failure of the tri-partite conference, he added: "I think success might have been achieved without any sacrifice of British interests. I was out of sympathy with the instructions I received."

Premier Baldwin in reply wrote: "It is not, I think on the broad policy of peace and disarmament that our differences so far as there are differences, arise so much as on the means whereby that policy can most effectively be forwarded."

"Even here there was a large measure of agreement as regards the work of the preparatory committee. You presided over the sub-committee which prepared the British case and practically drafted your own instructions and in your absence your place as chairman was taken by a colleague whom you certainly will not accuse of lukewarmness in the cause."

"As regards the recent conference of the three powers, I entered into no details at this stage since you refrain from doing so though here again I think you exaggerate whatever difference existed between the government and yourself; but this much I say, I can take no blame for its failure either to myself or my colleagues who after my departure and up to the very moment when a telegram from the delegation at Geneva informed them that the conference had ended were still working for such a compromise as might yet obtain the twin objects of the limitation of armaments and national security which the conference was summoned to achieve."

"As to the future I refuse to share your pessimism."

PROHIBITION TAKES BIG TOLL OF DEATHS IN U.S.

Two Hundred Casualties Since the Dry Law Was Enacted.

STATISTICS MADE PUBLIC

Fifty Four Dry Agents Were Killed by Law Breakers.

Washington, Aug. 30—The war between bootleggers and government prohibition officers has resulted in more than 200 deaths since enactment of the dry act, treasury statistics show today.

Fifty four prohibition agents have been killed in line duty by moonshiners, rum runners and other dry law violators. Six coast guardsmen have been killed by liquor smugglers and 100 other members of the dry navy have lost their lives by fire, drowning and explosions aboard small pursuit craft engaged in combating the wet buccaneers.

SIX STARTED TODAY TO SWIM THE CHANNEL

Four Women and Two Men Set Out Last Night From Cape Griz Nez—Two Women Quit.

Paris, Aug. 30—Four women and two men started last night and today to swim the English channel from Cape Griz Nez. Latest reports stated two of the women and men were still in the water. Miss Hilda Harding, British started at 9.22 P. M. and quit 5.10 a. m. Miss Edith Benson Danish, who who started with Miss Harding abandoned her effort at 2 A. M.

Miss Mona McLellan, British started at 10.10 p. m. Miss Ivy Hawke, British started at 5.25 a. m. today. Rene Boria, Swiss, started at 5.30 a. m. today. Dr. Scharff a 65 year old German, started at 5.55 today. Miss McLellan was approximately half way across at 2. a. m.

BRITISH SHIPS FIRED UPON BY CHINESE

Calls Lord Cecil's Resignation a Moral Blow at Government

Some Caustic Comment by the Manchester Guardian—Liberals and Laborites are Rejoicing—The Baldwin Government Not Unduly Perturbed Over the Incident.

London, Aug. 30—The Liberals and Labor the former particularly, are rejoicing at the resignation of Viscount Cecil from the Cabinet, which the Manchester Guardian calls "A moral blow at the government of the greatest severity", and "a most disabbling blow".

The Government, however, is not unduly perturbed, although the acidity of Premier Baldwin's reply to Cecil's letter on the subject of his resignation reveals that he thought the time and circumstances most inappropriate for such a step.
