Application for New Trial Denied by Supreme Court

The Only Hope for Sacco and Vanzetti, Condemned Anarchists, Now Lies in an Eleventh Hour Appeal to the United States Supreme Court—Will Go to the Electric Chair on Tuesday Unless a Stay is Granted.

Boston, Mass., Aug. 19—The Supreme Court today denied the application of attorneys for Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti for a new trial. In a decision reached after only forty-eight hours deliberation, the full bench overruled exceptions from Justice Geo. A. Sanderson's denial of a writ of error and from trial Judge Webster Thayer's denial of motion for a new trial, revocation of sentence and stay of execution.
As a result, the two anarchists who have escaped the electric chair for seven years, will be put to death early Tuesday unless an eleventh hour appeal to the United States Supreme Court succeeds.

Threat of Reprisals

Paris, Aug. 20—The communist newspaper L'Humanite today published a threat of reprisals against American legionnaires in Paris if Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti are executed. The first contingent of 500 legionnaires arrived in Paris Thursday to attend the convention of the legion which will take place next month. Several thousand of legionnaires will be in Paris for the convention.

RESCUE FLIGHT MAY HAVE ENDED IN A TRAGEDY

Capt. Erwins Monoplane Took a Plunge When 690 Miles Out in the Pacific.

San Francisco, Aug. 20—Fear that Capt. William P. Erwin's brave gesture to find the missing Dole flight aviators has ended in tragedy today sent warships soaring to where his monoplane "The Spirit of Dallas" had last been reported.
Dawn found the U. S. S. Lavette steaming at full speed to where sputtering radio signals had dramatically told of two tail spins into which the monoplane had plunged while 690 miles out at sea on an attempted rescue flight from Oakland to Honolulu.

THIRTY-SEVEN STEVEDORES WERE DROWNED

Manilla, Aug. 19—Thirty-seven stevedores were drowned here yesterday when the launch Sladen of the Atlantic Gulf Pacific Company was struck by a typhoon just outside the breakwater here and capsized. Fifty-one men swam to the breakwater and were rescued.

JAPS ORDER 300 PLANES

DEPUTY JINKS WILL JOIN THE INDEPENDENTS

London, Aug. 20—A daily telegraph dispatch today from Dublin said that John Jinks has resigned his membership in the National League party. The resignation was accepted by the party leader, Capt. Redmond. It is probable that Jinks will join the independent party. Jinks voted with the government on Tuesday, saving it from defeat.

THE NEW POLICE BEGIN DRILL IN THE ARMOURY

Captain Salt's provincial policemen who will be on duty when the new liquor law comes into force on September 6 are spending the time until that date in preparing themselves for the performance of their duties of enforcing the liquor law. For the past two mornings eight of the nine members who have so far been enlisted in the force, have been drilling in the Armoury under their instructor, John Annett. The other man is doing office work. The first of next week Annett will start giving instructions in motor-cycling the machines for which have been stored for some time in a city garage.

MR. MAHONEY IS IMPROVED

Moncton, Aug. 19—In a statement issued at the City Hospital tonight it was announced that Fred B. Mahoney, who was crushed between two freight cars at Calhoun's Mills on Wednesday afternoon, shows some improvement and it is expected that he will recover. Mr. Mahoney is a son of the late P. J. Mahoney of Melrose, former Minister of Public Works for New Brunswick.

FIRST FIELD DAY AT FREDERICTON EXPER. STATION

Excursion From Charlotte County Was Promoted by St. Stephen-Milltown Rotary Club.

Charlotte county farmers yesterday made the acquaintance of the Dominion Experimental Station in this city, and of its staff. The occasion was the first field day of the station during the present summer, and the excursion from Charlotte county was one promoted by the St. Stephen-Milltown Rotary Club on the invitation of Supt. C. F. Bailey, of the Experimental Station, himself Rotary president in Fredericton.
One experiment which was of extreme interest to the visitors, who numbered about ninety, was the use of fish meal as feed for swine. Nine pens are being fed and the results compared with those of 1926. Charlotte county produces fish scraps in immense quantities which at present go largely to the United States fertilizer factories, coming back in the form of fertilizer for use on New Brunswick lands. Fish meal also is being fed poultry in place of meat scraps at the station.
The Charlotte county party arrived at 10 o'clock by motor. Immediately after their arrival they were conducted over the farm and shown the experimental work being done.

Inspect Plots.

Tobacco and corn plots were inspected and a demonstration in dusting potatoes given. The coming crops being raised to show costs were examined, also the strawberry and raspberry plots. Alfalfa breeding was inspected, the object of the experiment being to evolve a variety of that important fodder plant which will be suitable to New Brunswick. Oats, wheat, barley and buckwheat were seen in the cereal plots. Variety tests on clover seed also were inspected.

In the afternoon the live stock and poultry received attention, the party leaving on their return at five o'clock.
The guests of the station sat down to luncheon in the New Brunswick Agricultural school building at noon. Supt. Bailey presiding. He delivered a short address of welcome. Lloyd Hill and Holmes Maxwell spoke on behalf of the visiting Charlotte county farmers. D. J. McLeod, Dominion Plant Pathologist, spoke on his work, particularly in regard to seed potato stock certification. Rev. Mr. Wright St. Stephen Rotary president, also spoke. The chief address was delivered by E. S. Archibald, of Ottawa, director of experimental farms. Mr. Archibald gave on historical sketch of the development of experimental farms, and cited instances of valuable results accomplished through their operation. He referred in particular to the value of the Fredericton experimental station to New Brunswick.

SOME SPEED ON ROLLER SKATES

LITTLE CHANCE OF FINDING THE MISSING FLIERS

Fifty-two Naval Vessels are Keeping Up the Search.

HOPE STILL PREVAILS

Airplanes and Passenger Ships Assisting in the Search.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 20—Officials here today believed there is little chance of finding alive five Dole flight aviators lost in the Pacific in the "Miss Doran" and "Golden Eagle."

A despatch hope still prevailed however, the navy's forty-two ships search, augmented by airplanes and passenger ships will continue at least until Tuesday next.

Bye Election in Irish Free State to be Held On Wednesday Next

Political Excitement is Now at a Fever Pitch—The Government is Confident of Winning Both Elections—Success of Cosgrave Party Would Ensure a Majority of One in the Dail.

London, Aug. 20—Political ferment has reached fever pitch throughout the Irish Free State and the result of the two by elections necessitated by the murder of O'Higgins and the death of Countess Markievitch, which will be held on Wednesday is awaited with the most intense interest. The government is confident of winning both elections, which would require a majority of one in the Dail whatever the future attitude of John Jinks might be. Jinks, a member of the National League group saved the Cosgrave administration from defeat the other day by not turning up to vote against it with his party which resulted in a tie.

WILL PROTEST EXECUTION OF ANARCHISTS
