Aviators Are Somewhere Between Paris and New York

Their Exploits are Attracting the Attention of the People of Four Continents—Nungresser and Coli Were Due in New York at 12.19 p. m. — Aviators Who Started Out From West Africa on Thursday are Still Missing.

NEW YORK, May 9—Here's where and who's who with respect to aviators whose stories today are attracting the attention of four continents.

Captain Charles Nungresser and Captain Francois Coli are somewhere between Paris and New York. They left Paris at 5.10 a. m. yesterday and were due here at 12.19 p. m. today.

Captain Saint Romana, Pilot Mountyeres and Mechanic Petit, who left West Africa en route to Brazil Thursday, still were missing today. Francisco de Pineado, Italian four continent flyer left Quincy, Mass., today for Philadelphia.

Clarence Chamberlain and Lloyd Bertaud waited on Long Island for conditions favorable for a flight in the Bellanca Columbia monoplane from New York to Paris.

NATIONALISTS ARE ACTIVE NEAR NANKING

Artillery is Bombarding Batteries on Northern Shore.

RIVER BOATS FIRED UPON

Native Troops are to Begin an Offensive.

Hong Kong, May 9—Nationalist and Northern China artillery is still intermittently active in the neighborhood of Nanking and Chin Kiang, a message from that city said today.

Nationalist guns on Silver Island bombarded northern shore batteries at Chin Kiang after the northerners had opened fire.

Guns on the north bank of the Yangtze river at Nanking fired on four Chinese river boats.

A detachment of 600 moderate native troops supporters of Marshall Chiang Kai-Sheks Nanking government immediately would begin an offensive against extremist elements in the area.

Snow and Wind Storm Swept Over Some Western States

Transportation Facilities are Reported to Have Been Badly Crippled — Storm Took on Cyclonic Proportions — Telegraph and Telephone Wires are Down — Roads are Blocked With Snow in some sections.

DENVER, Colo., May 9—Efforts were being made today to re-effect communication and transportation facilities in the eastern rocky mountain region which was crippled by a snow and wind storm of near cyclonic proportions.

Telegraph and telephone wires in Eastern Colorado, western Kansas and Western Nebraska were still down early this morning.

Roads in some sections were blocked with snow and it was impossible to determine the extent of damage to crops and property. No loss of life was reported. Relief was promised today with the new prediction of clear skies and rising temperatures.

DUKE OF YORK OPENS NEW BUILDINGS

Australia's Capital Now Established at Canberra — Ceremony is Broadcasted.

Canberra, Australia, May 9—The culmination of the Royal tour came today when the Duke of York formally opened the new temporary parliament building at noon in the new federal capital. Their ceremonies were elaborate and picturesque. The Duchess of York was present, and a huge assemblage had gathered from all parts of Australasia. Lord Stonehaven, Governor-General, and the Prime Minister Stanley M. Bruce, were in attendance, and 2,000,000 people listened by radio to descriptions of the affair broadcast throughout the Dominion.

Dame Melba sang the National Anthem; troops paraded and aeroplanes droned over head.

In the course of his speech the Duke of York said: "Today marks the end of one epoch and the beginning of another, and our thoughts turn instinctively to what the future may have in store. One's own life would hardly be worth living without its dream of better things and the life of a nation without such dreams for a better and larger future would be poor indeed."

In behalf of the King, the Duke conferred various honors on Premier Bruce and others connected with the function.

TWO LIVES LOST IN FIRE AT HARRISBURG

Harrisburg, Pa., May 8—Two lives are believed to have been lost in the fire which last night destroyed the State printing plant on Cameron street here. Seven men have been taken to the hospitals.

Unofficial reports were that a floor caved in on a group of firemen. Efforts were being made to find the body of Bernard B. Goodyear and another man named Sadler.

J. L. L. Kuhn, the owner of the plant, today estimated the loss at \$1,500,000.

Rotarian Convention.

The Maritime Rotarian Convention opens at Saint John on Tuesday with a large number of delegates present. On account of the ease with which Saint John can be reached from this city the Fredericton Rotary Club will be largely represented.

TRAGEDY IN A HOSPITAL AT MONTREAL

Dr. Brown Shot Dr. Puddicombe in the Neck and Then Suicided.

Montreal, May 8—The shooting of Dr. J. F. Puddicombe, Ottawa, in the neck and arm by Dr. Frank Brown, of Vancouver, B. C., who turned the pistol on himself and committed suicide, took place in the room of Dr. Puddicombe, in the Royal Victoria Hospital here, tonight.

The tragedy took place about 9 o'clock. Dr. Brown, who had been employed at Quebec with the Bishop Construction Company, had been visiting Montreal and called on Dr. Puddicombe, who is an interne of the Royal Victoria Hospital. No cause has been assigned for the shooting.

Dr. Brown went to the hospital and, according to the police, entered Dr. Puddicombe's bedroom. What passed between the two is not known, but shortly afterwards Dr. Puddicombe staggered from the room crying, "Frank Brown shot me. He's in my room. He shot himself, too."

Turns Pistol on Self.

According to the report tonight, Dr. Brown, on entering the room, locked the door. He drew out a revolver and fired four times at Dr. Puddicombe. Two shots took effect, one in the neck and the other in the arm. Thereupon Brown turned the revolver on himself and sent a bullet through his temple.

Dr. Puddicombe staggered to the door, unlocked it and cried for help. Dr. W. G. Webster, the admittance officer, ran to his assistance and entered the room, where he saw the body of Dr. Brown stretched on the floor with a bullet through his right temple. A .32 calibre revolver was lying beside him.

Both the principals in the tragedy were young men and graduates of McGill University. Prior to being appointed to a position with the Bishop Construction Company, Dr. Brown had been houseman at the Royal Victoria Hospital.

Spoke at Normal School.

Dr. W. S. Carter, Chief Supt. of Education, this morning delivered his customary address to the students of the Provincial Normal School in view of the fact that the school year is nearing its close. Dr. Carter as a man who had gone through all the stages in the educational system of the Province has a wide experience and he drew upon it to give the teachers-to-be some advice in regard to their profession.

LIGHT MOTOR TRAFFIC TODAY ON ALL ROADS

Three Stretches are Exceptions and are Still Closed — Trucks and Buses Barred Until 15th.

Today the highways of the Province are open to light motor traffic with the exception of a few stretches on which local conditions are such that a delay must be made in opening. Motor-trucks and motor busses however are not on the roads at all and cannot go on legally until next Sunday the 15th.

The stretches of highway still closed because of frost-holes or other reasons are the Shediac Road, the Portage Road between Newcastle and Bathurst and the Sussex Monton Road.

PRINCE MIGHT SOON HAVE NEWS FOR FRIENDS

London, May 8—The Prince of Wales simply will not down as a source of matrimonial rumors.

Denials notwithstanding, Londoners still indulge in discussing the most definite rumors yet made as to the Prince's likely choice of a bride. The Infanta Beatrice, daughter of the king and queen of Spain, who have been entertaining the prince, is the other person mentioned in London's persistent rumors.

Before the Prince left for Madrid he told his friends at a bachelor dinner here, that he might have some news for them when he returned to England.

CAT COULD NOT SAVE HIM THIS TIME

Haverhill, Mass., May 9—When Irving Flanders was overcome by gas a year ago his pet cat saved his life by mowing and scratching until aid came.

The accident was duplicated Sunday but the same cat mewed and scratched in vain. Flanders was dead when found in his room. The cat was unconscious but was revived.

M. A. QUIGLEY U. N. B. GRADUATE DEAD IN KANSAS

Word Received Here on Sunday — Married Miss Annie Sharkey of Fredericton — Native of Newcastle.

Word was received here on Sunday of the death at Atchison, Kansas, of Michael Aloysius Quigley, a graduate of the University of New Brunswick and a native of Newcastle. Very Rev. Dean Carney announced the death at St. Dunstan's Church Sunday morning.

The deceased was graduated Bachelor of Arts by the University of New Brunswick in 1884 and immediately afterwards left for the United States where he resided since. In Atchison, Kansas, he was in business as a wholesale grocer with the Simms firm. He visited New Brunswick occasionally and was here five years ago.

As an undergraduate of U. N. B. he was prominent in athletics and is remembered by many of the older residents on that account. He was well known as a football player as well as a track athlete.

Miss Annie Sharkey of this city was married to him and survives him living at Atchison. Other surviving relatives are a son and daughter and two grandsons.

The son is Thomas E. Quigley who at present is a university student in Kansas, and Mrs. Edward L. Dunbar, whose husband is on the legal staff of the Missouri Pacific Railway. Two sisters survive in Newcastle.

INTERNATIONAL PAPER COMPANY MAY ISSUE STOCK

Montreal, May 9—The directors of the International Paper Co., it is understood are considering issuing another 500,000 shares of common stock to the present shareholders at around \$30 a share. The company has outstanding now some 500,000 common shares from an authorized issue of 750,000 shares.

It is thought that the weakness in the stock was in anticipation of the new offering. The decline indicates that investors naturally foresee that such an issue would reduce the amount of earnings applicable to each share of stock outstanding.

SKYSCRAPERS ARE THIEVES OF SUNSHINE

Washington, May 9—Skyscrapers are "thieves of fresh air and sunshine." Major Henry Curran, New York City Club counsel, told the fifteenth annual meeting of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce today. He advised other cities to take a lesson from what he pictured as the horrors of New York's skyline by enacting zoning laws, decentralizing the working population and providing a general level for buildings.

Skyscrapers, he said, convert American cities into "lively bowls of human spaghetti."

New York, he added, had become a "city of shadows," and the situation has grown so bad that "it is past all decency and comfort for men and women to try to get about."

SETTLEMENT OF BORDER TROUBLE LIKELY SOON

Washington, May 8—The negotiations between the Canadian Legation and the Departments of State and Labor over the new border ruling of the United States enter on their third week with every prospect of early settlement.

While no official announcement has been made by either side, it is freely predicted by observers here that the restrictions on the Canadian residents working in the United States will be stood off until the whole subject of border crossing privileges of nationals of both countries has been discussed in a conference between representatives of the Canadian and United States governments.

This is the proposal of Hon. Vincent Massey, Canadian minister here, who followed up the announcement of the new restrictions two weeks ago with a note to the Department of State drawing attention to the reciprocal nature of the agreement whereby residents along the border cross and recross in the course of their daily business and suggesting that before new regulations cancelling any of these privileges be announced the matter should be discussed by the two governments. This note has not been officially answered.

ESCAPED FROM BELFAST JAIL

Belfast, May 9—Four convicts, of whom three were murderers, overpowered and gagged the prison warden today and escaped over the walls with bed clothes. The men motored away in the direction of the Free State boundary.

Mother's Day Observed.

There was a general observance of Mother's Day in Fredericton and vicinity yesterday. The white and tinted flowers were observable everywhere. In a number of the churches special reference to the day was made and some sermons were preached upon it. The radio programs which were received from American stations featured the day.

Fire in Devon.

The Devon Fire Department was called out to extinguish a fire at the home of Stanley Chase, North Devon, Sunday afternoon. The fire was quite serious and it was sometime before it was completely under control. The interior of the house was considerably damaged.
