Anglican Bishops In Secret Conclave At Lambeth, England

Three Hundred and Ten Are Gathered at Lambeth Palace—Will Pronounce Upon Matters of Great Importance, Including Sacramental Marriage, Remarriage of Divorced Persons.

LONDON, July 10—Three hundred and ten Anglican bishops now sitting in secret conclave at Lambeth at Lambeth Palace will be asked to pronounce on matters never before discussed at such a conference.

They will be asked to declare that sacramental marriage is indissoluble and that remarriage of divorced persons, the innocent as well as the guilty parties, shall be forbidden in churches.

They will also be invited to denounce birth control as sinful as emphatically as Roman Catholics denounced it in the past. (Bishop Richardson of this city is attending the Lambeth Conference).

MAY REMAIN IN PROVINCE UNTIL FRIDAY

Saint Andrews, N. B., July 9—Her Excellency Lady Willingdon tonight attended a dance in the pavilion of the Algonquin Hotel here. She arrived about 9.30 P. M., with a party including Lord and Lady Shaughnessy, Hon. Marguerite Shaughnessy, E. C. Mieville, of Lord Willingdon's secretarial staff and Captain R. J. Streatfield, Aide De Camp to the Governor General.

It is expected that Lady Willingdon will extend her stay here until Friday night next. Although the chief reason for her visit, the official opening of the new Boy Scout Gymnasium and the presentation of the honorary medal of merit to Miss A. Van Horne, it past now, taken place this afternoon. No definite programme has been arranged for Lady Willingdon during the rest of her stay here and it is anticipated that she will occupy her time chiefly with swimming, golfing and tennis.

CANADIAN BOYS MADE A GOOD SHOWING

Manchester, England, July 9—A team of three boys from Canada who have made the judging of livestock their hobby, were today awarded third place in the quest for the gold challenge cup of the international dairy cow judging competition held by the Royal Agricultural Show here. An English team, composed of two girls and a boy, won first place and an all-boy team from the United States came second.

The winning English team was composed of Josephine Armstrong, 18, of Northumberland; Elsie Tidy, 17, Sussex, and Arthur Culley, 16, Buckinghamshire. The Canadian team was chosen at the Royal Winter Fair, which was held in Toronto last autumn, and the represented 5,000 boys and girls of the juvenile livestock clubs of Canada. Canada's team consisted of Clifford Bladwick, Barrie, Ont.; Cedric Kirkpatrick, Warrill, N. B., and Gordon Campbell, of Stewiacke, N. S.

HON. P. J. VENIOT CHOSEN IN GLOUCESTER

Caraquet, July 9—At a Liberal convention held at Caraquet today, Hon. Dr. P. J. Veniot, postmaster general, was unanimously selected as the standard bearer of the party in the County of Gloucester. John G. Robichaud, of Shippegan, was chairman, and J. A. Allain, secretary.

Called upon to speak, Hon. Dr. Veniot arose amid prolonged applause. The other speakers were: J. A. Doucet, M. L. A., of Bathurst; S. R. Leger, M. L. A., of Caraquet; Hon. O. Turgeon, and A. Blanchard, of Pokemouche.

Lake George, N. Y., July 10—The Siamese minister to the United States is to talk with his King tomorrow. It will be the largest telephone call ever, 12,000 miles.

CO-OPERATIVE SYSTEM WITH WHEAT POOL

R. M. Elliott, manager of the Canadian Livestock Producers, Maritime Section, speaking yesterday at the annual Field Day sponsored by the agricultural society at Havelock, outlined the new co-operative purchase system inaugurated between New Brunswick livestock men and the Western wheat pool. By this system provincial farmers can purchase feed at greatly reduced rates, buying direct from the producers and eliminating the profits of the "middleman." An attempt is being made to influence the New Brunswick farmer in this project. Experiments to-date have been highly successful. Other speakers were E. M. Taylor, who emphasized the efficacy of pasture fertilization, Mr. McLaurin of the Department of Agriculture and representatives of the Federal department. Competition and judging was postponed due to unfavourable weather conditions.

NO FALSE AIRS FOR PRINCESS

London, July 10—King George and his only granddaughter, small Princess Elizabeth, are daily seen in Windsor Park, the latter on the chubby Shetland pony, which was her birthday gift from the King. The duke and duchess have departed for their own home, but at the request of the sovereign Princess Elizabeth remains until the rudiments of riding are fully perfected. She is just 4' and rides very well.

Like all of present-day royalty this potential heir of the British throne is being reared in the simplest way. She has a trained nurse and a governess, but she has been taught to wait on herself and to think for herself after the prevailing methods introduced by pedagogues. She has her lessons daily in the pictorial way, but no effort is made to force her intelligence nor to teach her to read and figure.

The calamities which fell upon the Romanoffs has inspired British royalty to rear their children in a plain, practical and self-supporting manner. Princess Mary Lascelles, only daughter of the King, is an expert accountant and takes entire charges of the finances of her husband's estate. She knows both stenography and typing and if she had to face the world she would not be compelled to wash dishes or cook, as so many Russian princesses have.

LILA LEE ILL FROM OVERWORK

Hollywood, Cal., July 9—Lila Lee, prominent film star, has been compelled to take a complete rest in Arizona because of overwork during the past year and a half, her friends revealed today.

While Miss Lee suffered no serious illness, it was said, she had been advised by physicians to abandon her work for the present. Serious consequences might ensue from her disobedience, doctors said.

LADY BUXTON WON OUT IN BY-ELECTION

Laborite Elected in North Norfolk by Small Majority

BEAVERBROOK DISAPPOINTED

Had Conducted an Intensive Campaign for Conservatives

Cromer, July 10—Lady Buxton, wife of the former cabinet minister won the North Norfolk by election today for the Labor party. The election was made necessary by the elevation of her husband to the peerage by 14,812 votes against 14,642 for the Conservative, T. A. Cook. The victory was a keen disappointment for Lord Beaverbrook, the publisher and leader of empire free trade movement, who had personally conducted an intensive tour of the district in behalf of Cook.

FOUL PLAY FEARED IN DISAPPEARANCE

Attleboro, Mass., July 9—James Dobson, colored aged 56, who came here 15 years ago from Saint John, N. B., is reported to the police as missing for three weeks.

He left his house, at 28 Leroy street, to visit in Pawtucket, R. L., and the police are seeking a companion for questioning.

Dobson was employed as a janitor and caretaker. Foul play is suspected in his disappearance.

WAITRESS WINGS EARNED BY TIPS

Valley Stream, N. Y., July 10—Beulah Unruh of Betterton, Md., is a flying waitress. Having passed tests, she has received a limited commercial air pilot's license. For instruction she saved 13,000 tips averaging a dime.

100,000 MILES FOR A DEGREE

Middletown, N. Y., July 10—In four years Grant Rice has traveled some 100,000 miles to earn a law school degree. He delivered mail morning over a forty-mile route, then went to New York for classes and back, a round trip of 134 miles.

FRANCE SLAPS TAX ON BOARD

Paris, July 10—France has found a profitable method of getting rid of advertising billboards cluttering the public highways.

A new government tax forces every advertiser to pay a stiff sum for every square foot of paper pasted on the bill boards. The tax starts at about \$24 per 39 inches square, \$48 for those under 12 feet square, and \$116 for those over 24 feet square. The tax is paid on each sign, not merely on the original copy.

A Harmless Bomb Discovered in a New York Subway

The Find Made Following the Receipt of a Threatening Letter by the United Press—Writer of Letter Announced that the End of the World Was Near.

NEW YORK, July 10—Shortly after the United Press received a letter announcing that Grand Central terminal was to be blown up, a section of galvanized pipe stuffed with a black substance was found late yesterday in the subway, beneath the station.

Detectives, who said the bomb apparently was harmless, expressed the opinion that a crank had written the letter and dropped the pipe on the tracks. The letter was signed "Karna" and announced that the end of the world was near and threatened to destroy New York, beginning with the Grand Central terminal.

NORTH SHORE MEMBER WAS TURNED DOWN

St. Quentin, July 9—The Liberal nomination for Restigouche-Madawaska was tendered to Harry McEvoy, of Dalhousie, North Shore representative for the Sydney Lumber Company, today at St. Quentin, where a large number of delegates convened to select their candidate for the forthcoming Federal election. Two names were placed in nomination, those of Mr. McEvoy, and S. Blanchard, M. P., of Dalhousie, who, following the balloting and announcement as to the successful candidate, moved the nomination be made unanimous. The motion was carried. In the election of 1926 Mr. Blanchard carried the Liberal standard to victory in this constituency with a majority of more than 2,000 votes.

HON. R. ROGERS RUNNING FOR WINNIPEG SEAT

Winnipeg, July 10—Unemployment will be cured by keeping out the steel that comes from the United States, promised Hon. Robert Rogers, Conservative candidate for Winnipeg South, in opening his campaign last night. He asserted he would support Hon. R. B. Bennett, Conservative leader, fully in his scheme for finding relief for unemployment before next Christmas.

\$138,929 LOST IN FOREST OUTBREAKS

Prince Albert, Sask., July 9—Loss from northern Saskatchewan's 1930 forest fires, halted by recent rains, is estimated by Dominion forestry officials as \$138,929 in 195 of 255 fires reported.

About 21,000,000 board feet of saw timber went up in smoke in addition to 100,000 cords of fuel and pulpwood. Settlers caused 91 of the fires; campers and travelers 43 and 34 were of incendiary origin, officials estimated.

J. M. SCOVIL WILL RUN IN CHARLOTTE CO.

St. Andrews, July 9—At the Liberal convention held in the Elite Hall here his afternoon, J. W. Scovill, of St. Stephen, was nominated as candidate for Charlotte. On the platform were Senator Foster, Hon. W. F. Todd, ex-Lieutenant Governor, Dan P. Gilmor, Mr. Scovill, Dr. J. F. Worell, Ernest Shaw, Leroy Hill and Dr. C. C. Alexander. Two delegates attending from St. George were Daniel Maheson, aged 86, and A. C. Kennedy, aged 82. Nominations were from the floor instead of by committee.

Hon. Mr. Todd said he had fought in battles for Liberalism and that his love for the Liberal party was strong. He felt that he still could do good work for the party, that all his interest was for the advancement of Liberalism. Their record shows that they can govern wisely and well, he said. He then spoke of the Dunning budget. He asked them not to listen to the unemployment cry of the Conservative party, since it was world-wide and no government could right it.

162 KILLED AS MINE EXPLODES

Neurode, Silesia, July 10—The total dead in a mine explosion here yesterday was placed at 162 when 81 bodies had been taken from the mine shortly before noon today.

Mine officials said they believed 81 other men still were entombed in the recesses of the wrecked mine. Earlier reports were that only 65 were trapped.

SUSPENDED FROM STOCK EXCHANGE

New York, July 10—James S. McGean, floor member of Sutro and Co., one of the largest commission houses in the country, was suspended today from the New York Exchange for three years, according to an announcement from the rostrum of the Exchange.
