Another Imperial Conference May be Held at Ottawa Soon

The Heads of the Various Dominions Before Separating in London Today Adopted a Resolution to That Effect—Want Further Consideration of the Economic Problems.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)
LONDON, Nov. 14—The British Imperial Conference ended today without any definite solution for the empire's pressing economic problems. The heads of the Dominions passed a resolution to summon another conference, in Ottawa within a year to discuss the economic situation further.

Reports of last minute attempt to save the conference were published by the Morning Post today. The Conservative newspaper said that Chancellor of the Exchequer Philip Snowden had promised the delegates to continue existing imperial preferences, which would constitute a complete reversal of the Labor Government's free trade policy.

SEVEN KILLED IN RIOTING AT HAVANA, CUBA

Havana, Cuba, Nov. 14—A threat of further rioting hung over the Cuban capital today despite the heavily-armed militia and police patrols which guarded the city. A 13 year old boy, Jose Lima, was killed by a stray bullet and an unidentified man was seriously wounded when police in the Cayo Hueso section of the city late last night. This fatality brought the unofficial estimate of the death toll in yesterday's riots to seven.

THE GERMAN CABINET GETS A SET BACK

Berlin, Nov. 14—The cabinet of Chancellor Heinrich Brüning was defeated today for the first time since the Reichstag elections when the budget committee passed a communist motion involving aid for the poor. The Reichstag is not in session.

FORD WILL HONOR 30'000 OLD AUTOS

Detroit, Nov. 14—More than 30,000 old automobiles have been taken off the country's highways since the first of the year through the salvaging plan of the Ford Motor Company. Old cars taken in by Ford dealers on new cars are purchased by the Ford company. At the River Rouge plant they are stripped of everything that can be used and the rest is thrown into the open hearth fires in the steel mill, where the frame, motor and other steel parts are melted down. Cars of every description and make go into the salvage pile.

BANDITS SLAY 2000 AND TAKE 500 PRISONERS

London, Nov. 14—An exchange telegraph dispatch from Hong Kong today said that the communist bandits raiding Hsinyu in eastern Kiangsi Province, had killed 2,000 persons. In addition to the casualties reported, the despatch said, that 5,000 persons had been taken as prisoners and more than 2,000 houses had been destroyed with damage estimated at \$4,000,000.

PREMIER OF JAPAN HAD A CLOSE CALL

Tokyo, Nov. 14—Premier Yuko Hamaguchi narrowly escaped with his life early today when an assassin shot him at the railway station here at 8.57 a.m. The Premier was shot while awaiting a train to take him to the grand military manoeuvres. The bullet entered his thigh, inflicting a serious wound. The assassin was identified as Tomoe Sakyo. Seized by police, he gave his age as 28 and his home as Nagasaki, in the extreme southern end of Japan. Nagasaki is on the Island of Kyushu. Premier Hamaguchi, in severe pain, was removed from the Tokyo station platform to the station master's office. Emergency treatment was administered.

FLYING BOAT SETS OUT FROM SOUTHAMPTON

Calshot Eng. Nov. 14—Continuing on its way to Lisbon and the start of a trans-atlantic flight to New York the giant Dornier flying boat DO-X left Southampton water for Bordeaux France today. Fog delayed the start of the flight after eleven passengers had come aboard at 9.30 a.m. The ship carried a crew of twelve.

HOT STOVE STOLEN BY COOL CUSTOMERS

Hammond, Ind., Nov. 13—It was a warm day yesterday, but it cooled off during the night while Mr. and Mrs. Chester Malloy were taking in a cinema. Malloy didn't worry about that, as he recalled that he had banked the fire in the living room stove before leaving. "It's a good thing," he said returning home, "that we left a fire." But when he entered the living room the hot stove was gone. So, too, were all the rest of their household furnishings. The police today were looking for burglars with a moving van and a hot stove turned cool.

WILL LEAVE "APPLE SAUCE" TO HIS AIDE

Oklahoma City, Nov. 14—W. H. (Alfalfa Bill) Murray, Governor-elect of Oklahoma, today designated Lt. Gov.-elect Robert Burns for the task of ceremonial speech-making and "dishing out the 'apple sauce' for the administration." Murray said that hereafter the public should fall on Burns for "funeral orations, public dedications and children's christenings, together with functions demanding the services of an orator." "I find I have too much to attend to be making speeches," Murray said.

WILL ELECT S. A. GENERALS IN THE FUTURE

London, Nov. 13—The international meeting of Commissioners of the Salvation Army today decided that the Generals of the Army shall be elected to that office and that no General shall here after appoint his successor. A second decision was "that no General shall have the power to nominate his successor, but this shall not prevent him from giving any advice to the electing body if requested by a majority to do so."

PATH TO HELL TO BE PAINFUL

Detroit, Nov. 14—"Don Juan" went to "hell" at the Little Theatre here recently, but more suddenly and painfully than the author of "The Last Night of Don Juan" had intended. The stage direction called for Don Juan to be led fearfully down the steps to "hell." The property man had neglected to fasten the steps securely. The pathway to hell collapsed. DISARMAMENT COMMISSION IN COMPROMISE

A Motion Committing League to Direct Limitation

VON BERNSTORFF SPONSORED IT Many Delegates Favor Limitation Through Budget Cuts

Geneva, Nov. 14—The League of Nations preparatory disarmament commission comprises today on a system of indirect and budgetary limitation of war materials after rejecting motions committing the League to direct limitation as desired by the United States, Italy, Russia and others. A motion for direct limitation was submitted by Count Von Bernstorff of Germany in an effort to break the deadlock between nations desiring direct limitation and about an equal number favoring limitation through reduction of war budgets. It was defeated.

SPUD MARKET CONTINUES RATHER DULL

Hartland, Carleton Co., Nov. 13—Today's potato market showed no improvement, with little wire inquiry and demand confined to a very few cars for Ontario and Quebec trade. Haulings were very light. Farmers are not bringing out any stock at the present prices .65 to 70 cents for Green Mountains and 60 cents for Irish Cobbles, Canada grade one. Presque Isle, Me., Nov. 13, Although there appeared slightly more enquiry in the Aroostook potato market today, with increasing interest, trading was light, an cash price at growers held \$150 a barrel, cash, warehouse delivery, with a few sales a little higher.

OPERA MARTHA TO BE PUT ON SUNDAY NIGHT

Moncton, N. B. Nov. 14—The popular Opera "Martha" by Flotow and the Scherzo an finale from the magnificent Beethoven fifth symphony will be featured during the Canadian National all-Canada symphony hour, Sunday afternoon November 16th commencing at 6 p.m. A.S.T. and to be broadcast in the Maritimes through stations, CNRH Halifax, CNRA Moncton, CFBO St. John. As on Previous Sunday, Nineteen Stations including WWJ Detroit, will be included in the hookup.

DELEGATIONS TO MEET THE MINISTER OF RAILWAYS HERE

Hon. Dr. R. J. Manion, Minister of Railways and Canals, during his brief stay here tomorrow afternoon, will receive delegations from the City Council and Board of Trade, who will urge improvements in transportation facilities here. The Minister will arrive from St. John by special train at five o'clock and plans to remain here half an hour. He will be accompanied by V. E. Smart, Deputy Minister of Railways, W. V. Appleton, General Manager of the Atlantic division, A. F. Stewart, Chief Engineer and others. From this city the Minister will proceed to McGivney Junction and on to Montreal by the Transcontinental.

French Chamber Gave the Cabinet Confidence Vote

The Government Won Out in a Bitter Fight for Life by a Vote of 323 to 270—Revision of Versailles Treaty Will Mean War Says Premier Tardieu.

PARIS, Nov. 14—Premier Andre Tardieu sounded a grave warning early today during what threatened to be an all night session of the Chamber of Deputies. "The day that a project to revise the Treaty of Versailles is posed with any chance of success before an international conference" he said, "it will mean war and, worse still revolution a few months afterward."

Government Won Out. The government won a bitter fight for its life early today in the Chamber of Deputies. After a stormy session the Chamber by 323 to 270 voted confidence in the cabinet of Premier Andre Tardieu on its foreign policy and the crisis seemed past for the time.

MACDONALD GOES TO THE PEN FOR TWO YEARS

Pictou, N. S. Nov. 13—William J. McDonald, who yesterday refused to give evidence in the murder trial of James Stewart, was sentenced this morning by Mr. Justice Paton to two years in Dorchester penitentiary and fined \$500 for contempt of court. Stewart's trial on a charge of having murdered John Dryden, of which McDonald had been acquitted previously, came to a sudden end when McDonald, on whom the Crown's case hinged, refused to answer questions. Stewart was freed, the jury returning a verdict without leaving the box.

LIGHTHOUSE KEEPER MUST BE ENGINEER

Washington, Nov. 13—The old time lighthouse keeper, kerosene lamp-tending hero of many a saga of the sea, is vanishing before the swift march of the "machine age." When the fog in, the modern engineer-keepers turn to heavy oil engines to compress the air for powerful sirens or diaphones. Automatic timing devices control the blowing of the fog signals, including the radio beacon. The switchboards, code machines and synchronizing locks by means of which the radio signals are automatically controlled require additional attention.

IT'S PRONOUNCED DOUGH-ICKS BY COMMANDER

Alternheim, Switzerland, Nov. 14—About this flying boat, the DO-X—those are really in the know do not pronounce it "dee-oh-ex." The official German pronunciation, for the benefit of radio announcers and others, is "Doughicks." That is what the big ship's commander and crew call her.

BUTTER AND EGG PRICES DROP IN CHICAGO

Chicago, Nov. 13—Butter and egg future delivery contracts collapsed amid an almost frantic rush of selling on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange today, reached in the history of the Exchange. Distress selling was attributed to a lack of funds to carry the commodities in the face of weak markets. Unfavorable news continued, along with market opinions expressed by brokers that prices had not yet reached the bottom.

SCOTS GIVE ROADS NON-SKID SURFACE

London, Nov. 14—The fame of Scottish roads and their remarkable non-skid surfaces has spread all over the world. Recently experts from Warsaw and other parts of Europe have been making examinations, particularly of the roads in Midlothian. William Ellacott, the road surveyor for Midlothian, explained recently to the London Daily Mail why the roads were always in such good condition. "The whole secret of the process is a special mixture of bitumen and a very large gravel of about three-quarter inch. We do not flood our roads with tar as they do in many places. Another factor is that the county owns its own quarries of Whinston and they are the most up-to-date in the country. Everything is done by direct labor. The cost is from 2½ to 3½ pence (5 to 7 cents,) a square yard, according to the distance the material has to be transported. "The treatment not only produces a non-skid surface, but prevents waving and the developments of pot holes. Even when it rains there is virtually no danger of skidding on the wet surface when treated by this process."
