U. S. Senator Borah Utters Warning Note Over Russian Trade

Says His Country Will Suffer Vast Economic Loss if Wreckers Have Their Way—Says United States is Approaching the Dole System—Stalin Interview is Cited.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 12—Chairman Borah of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee warned today in an interview with the British United Press that if the "wreckers" of Soviet Russian-American trade relations have their way this country will suffer vast economic loss.

He warned too that the United States was approaching the dole. The senator's shaft was aimed at the treasury, which has just issued trade regulations which he believed are designed to ruin Soviet trade with the United States. His remarks partly were prompted by the interview recently given the British United Press in Moscow by Joseph V. Stalin, the so-called Soviet dictator.

LADY SHIPS INTO DRY DOCK AT HALIFAX

Passenger Traffic With the West Indies Growing and Accommodation Has to be Increased.

(Special to The Daily Mail)

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 12—On the arrival of the Canadian National Steamship Lady Somers here on her first voyage to Halifax from Jamaica, The Bahamas and Bermuda, upon the close of navigation on the St. Lawrence, inaugurating the winter service to and from the port of Halifax, the ship entered drydock to undergo alterations to increase her passenger accommodations.

The Lady Rodney in the same service will likewise have similar alterations made on her arrival here and the work will be continued on both vessels at the local shipyard until completed.

Similarly, the Lady Nelson, Lady Hawkins, and Lady Drake in the service between Canada and Bermuda, the eastern group of the West Indies and Demarara (British Guiana) underwent like alterations in the drydock at Saint John, N. B., their port of arrival, the Lady Drake on her arrival at Saint John Monday next will have the finishing touches put upon the work which has been in progress during the past few voyages.

Owing to the increase in passenger travel with the advent of the Canadian National Steamships into the West Indies service under the Canadian-West Indies trade agreement, it has been found necessary to increase the first class passenger accommodation on these ships.

Marconi On The Air

Signor Marconi, the discoverer of wirelessly telegraphy was heard last night in a brief radio talk. The broadcast came from Rome and was relayed from Cincinnati. He spoke in excellent English and commended the United States for what it was doing to develop radio transmission. Music by Italian opera singers was brought in by the same broadcast and listeners were privileged to listen in to music by the choir of St. Peter's Cathedral.

LEG OF CHILD FOUND IN COAL LADEN CAR

St. John, N. B., Dec. 12—Press and special dispatches last night from Montreal told of the discovery in a carload of coal there, shipped from Saint John, of the severed leg of a boy, six and twelve years of age. One despatch claimed that the severed member was that of a boy.

The gruesome find was made by a coal handler of the Scotch Anthracite Company at the Longue Pointe yard of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company. It has been buried under the coal and escaped detection en route to Montreal.

Montreal police were notified and the find was turned over to the morgue authorities. It had apparently been hacked from the body with an axe or a cleaver and the bone were expected to operate with the Saint John police in investigating the discovery.

DRASTIC ANTI-CHRISTMAS DRIVE IS ON

Moscow, Dec. 12—The Soviet anti-Christmas campaign began today with an announcement by the All-Union Society of Militant Atheists that thousands of professors, teachers, lecturers and students had been mobilized to instruct the public about Christmas and how it is a snare and a delusion. Lecturers are to reveal at meetings of workers and peasants "the attempts of clergymen and priests to utilize the legend of the birth of Christ for counter-revolutionary purposes."

Only moral force will be exerted however, since Joseph Stalin's pronouncement of last spring, the efforts of the more enthusiastic atheists to persecute the religiously inclined by law have somewhat cooled. In that pronouncement Stalin warned the authorities against severe measures in farm collectivization and the anti-religious campaign.

HELPS GARDENER

London, Dec. 12—As a restful form after playing strenuously with three dogs and a black cat, Princess Elizabeth was seen sweeping leaves in company with the palace gardener.

THE PREMIER IN SAINT JOHN THIS AFTERNOON

Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett and Party Back From the Imperial Conference—Leaving for Ottawa at Six O'clock.

Saint John, N. B., Dec. 12—Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime Minister of Canada will arrive in Saint John this afternoon at 3.30 o'clock, on board the Canadian Pacific liner Duchess of Atholl, according to wireless messages received from the liner. Accompanied by Miss Mildred Bennett, the Prime Minister who is returning to Canada from the Imperial Conference in London, will board a private car attached to the special C. P. R. boat train and will leave West Saint John about 6 p.m. for Ottawa, where he will arrive tomorrow about noon.

Hon. Maurice Dupre, solicitor general of Canada who is also returning on board the duchess of Atholl from the Imperial Conference will leave Saint John almost immediately for Quebec, accompanied by Mrs. Dupre. Other members of the Canadian delegation who are returning on the Atholl are W. D. Herridge, K.C., D.S.O. Miss M. Miller and L. Francoeur.

E. C. Miville, secretary to the Governor General is also on board, as well as A. E. Griffin C.B.E.S.J.C., of Vancouver and G. E. Percy, A. C. Jamieson and Henry Hurst of Montreal.

POLICEMAN SHOT BY THUGS IN TORONTO

Toronto, Dec. 11—Pursuing a car stolen at London, Ontario, tonight, Motorcycle Officer Roy McQuillen, of Toronto, was shot and killed by the occupants who abandoned the car and fled into the bush in north-western outskirts of the city. The two occupants of the car are described as a tall man and a short one.

York Township, Provincial and City police immediately formed a posse and are believed to have the men surrounded.

A description of the stolen car and its license number has been flashed throughout the province.

McQuillen and another motorcycle officer were on patrol in York Township, when they spotted the stolen car. They gave chase and when close enough ordered the fugitives to stop. The driver of the car responded by stepping on the gas.

About a mile down the road the fugitives stopped and the two occupants stepped out. The two officers sped toward them in the belief that the men were ready to surrender. But as McQuillen who was in the lead, approached, one of the thugs opened fire and the policeman fell to the ground mortally wounded.

APPROVES THE NAVAL TREATY

EMERGENCY LEGISLATION GOING AHEAD

Relief Bills Will Likely be Enacted Within a Few Days.

A Joint Conference for Adjustment of Difficulties.

Washington, D. C. Dec. 12—The emergency drought and unemployment relief bills are getting prompt action in congress and it appeared today that they would be enacted into law within a few days.

The unemployment measure passed the senate late yesterday and went to a joint senate and house conference for adjustment of the differences in the two bills. The senate added \$5,000,000 to the \$110,000,000 passed by the House.

GUNMEN MADE BIG HAUL OF JEWELLRY

Wife of a New York Publisher Was Robbed of \$100,000 Worth

New York, N. Y., Dec. 12—Mrs. C. F. Zittel, wife of the publisher of Zittel's weekly, theatrical and sporting paper was forced to give jewelry estimated to be worth \$100,000 to two gunmen who gained admittance to her apartment in the guise of furniture handlers, making a delivery according to a report to police headquarters today.

The bandits, one of whom carried two guns, ushered Mrs. Zittel and several servants into a room of her apartment at 110 Riverside Drive and directed her to open a safe, the report said.

SCHOONER WAS ABANDONED IN MID OCEAN

New York Dec. 12—Seven members of the crew of the schooner Amy G. McKean, were picked up at sea in a lifeboat during the night by the Swedish steamer Strassa the latter informed the Chatham Mass Station of the radio marine corporation today.

The schooner was bound from Queenstown, Ireland for Halifax, N. S., the Strassa's message said. The McKean's crew abandoned the vessel which had become flooded, after setting fire to it.

PRODUCTION OF WHEAT LESS

London, Dec. 12—Britain's wheat production for 1930 was 21,404,000 hundredweight, a reduction of approximately 4,000,000 CWT compared with 1929, according to a ministry of Agriculture report.

Low Fire Loss

Fire Chief, Harry Mersereau of Sydney, N. S., reports the fire loss of that city so far this year to be less than \$14,000, which is a remarkably good showing. Chief Mersereau is a native of Sunbury County and a brother of the Hon. D. W. Mersereau, Minister of Agriculture.

Hindu and Moslem Delegates Have Reached Deadlock

Separate Electorates is the Fundamental Question to be Determined—Party of Fifteen Invited to Spend the Weekend with Premier MacDonald at His Country Home.

LONDON, Dec. 12—Premier Ramsay MacDonald has invited fifteen Hindu and Moslem delegates to the Indian Round Table Conference to spend the week end at his country estate, Chesuers, it was understood today.

The conference has reached a deadlock on the fundamental question of joint or separate electorates for Hindus and Moslems, and it was believed that the Premier would follow his custom instituted during the London Naval Conference of inviting delegates to consider their more difficult problems in the quiet atmosphere of the countryside.

ST. JOHN HAS A NEW CHIEF OF POLICE

St. John, Dec. 12—Appointment of Lieutenant Colonel Edward M. Slader a Chief of Police for Saint John, was made yesterday morning by the Common Council at a special meeting. Lt.-Col. Slader succeeds the late Joseph Scott.

In moving that Lt.-Col. Slader be named to fill the vacancy, caused by the lamented death of Joseph Scott, Commissioner R. G. McInerney, said that he felt the time had come when, in the interests of the force and of the city, a man outside the force should be selected for the appointment. The recommendation of the committee of the whole that Lt.-Col. Slader be appointed was unanimously adopted. The new Chief enters upon his duties at once, it was stated.

FORMER PRIEST SENTENCED TO PENITENTIARY

Yarmouth, N. S., Dec. 11—County Court Judge Grierson, of Weymouth, concluded court today and passed sentences on Rev. Jose C. Rees, former parish priest at Quinlan, Yarmouth County, George Nelson and Cecil Tasco. The first named was before Judge Grierson for trial some weeks ago, charged with gross indecency, and was found guilty. On that time, he appealed the decision to the full Bench at Halifax, where Judge Grierson's decision was sustained. He was sentenced to three years at Dorchester penitentiary.

CONSTABLES OF LONDON TO BAR YODELERS

London, Dec. 12—Sturdy constables here are to be the judges of when a Christmas carol ceases to be music and becomes a pennyjerker. In announcing no special instructions would be issued regarding singing of carols, Scotland Yard officials said all care would be taken to see that citizens would not be annoyed by pre-Christmas yodels.

MRS. M.V. PADDOCK PASSES AWAY AT SAINT JOHN

Sister of John Black of This City Succumbs at the Ripe Old Age of Eighty-six Years.

Saint John, N. B., December 12—Many friends in Fredericton and elsewhere throughout New Brunswick will learn with sorrow of the death of Mrs. Harriet M. A. Paddock, widow of the late M. V. Paddock, which occurred at Miss Craig's private hospital at an early hour this morning.

The late Mrs. Paddock, who was in her 86th year, had lived in Saint John for many years her husband having been one of the city's leading druggists, as well as provincial analyst at the time of his death almost eight years ago. Since then Mrs. Paddock had spent much of her time in Fredericton with relatives and in Boston, where she and Mr. Paddock had spent winter vacations enjoying art and music which they both loved so well.

Brother Called In

Mrs. Paddock was the last surviving daughter of the late Rev. John Black, former Rector of St. Peter's Church, Kingsclear York County, and had been especially active despite her age until about a year ago. For some months past she had been in hospitals and heart failure was the immediate cause of death this morning. Her brother, John Black, had been with her through much of her illness. Mrs. Paddock will be remembered by many for her thoughtful generosity, for her interest in charities had been marked, and she had been an active member of the Mission Church of St. John the Baptist. She is survived by two brothers, William A. Black, of Vancouver, and John Black, of Fredericton. One of her nephews is Hon. George Black, Speaker of the Canadian House of Commons. The funeral will take place from the Mission Church on Sunday afternoon with service at 3.30 o'clock and interment will be at Fernhill Cemetery here.
