## The U.S. Delegates Warmly Welcomed At Historic Plymouth

**Ambassador Dawes and High British Officials on Hand When the Steamer George Washington Arrived Early This Morning—Steamer Had a Very Rough Passage.**

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

PLYMOUTH, ENGLAND, January 17—The American delegation to the London naval conference headed by Secretary Stimson, landed on British soil at 8.30 a. m. today to receive an impressive welcome by a delegation including Ambassador Charles G. Dawes and high British officials.

The delegates brought ashore on an official tender from the George Washington which dropped anchor in the harbor shortly after six a. m. after a stormy passage, were manifestly relieved at reaching solid land.

### Naval Salute Fired.

A naval salute from the Plymouth battery was fired for Secretaries Stimson and Adams. A guard of honor composed of Royal Marines from the Plymouth naval station was stationed on the dock when the Americans stepped ashore.

Mayor James Churchward in his official robes and wearing his chains of office welcomed the delegation to England as did also Admiral Sir Hubert Brand, Commander-in-Chief of the Plymouth naval station.

## C.N.R. STEAMER TO BE LAUNCHED AT BIRKENHEAD

**Miss Ishbel MacDonald to Officiate at Ceremony—For Service on the Pacific Coast.**

London, England, Jan. 17—Preparations have been completed for the launching at Birkenhead today of the new Canadian National Steamship "Prince Henry" which will go into service on the Pacific Coast between Vancouver, Prince Rupert and the ports of Alaska. Miss Ishbel MacDonald, daughter of the Prime Minister, will officiate at the long established ceremony with which the steamer will be ushered to the ocean. The "Prince Henry" is the first of the three new steamships which will be added to the Canadian National fleet this year. The other two, the "Prince David" and the "Prince Robert" now in the course of construction, will ply between Vancouver, Victoria and Seattle, one of these will be launched on February 10th, the vessels are in the hands of Messrs. Cammell, Laird and Company, who constructed the five handsome steamships now running in the Canadian National service between Canada and the West Indies.

## WILL TRAVEL ON A BATTLESHIP

Paris, Jan. 17—President Gaston Doumergue will travel on a French battleship when he makes his cruise along the Atlantic coast of Africa next October. He will sail from Brest and land at Casablanca.

## MONCTON MAN AGAIN HEADS THE FEDERATION

Moncton, N. B. Jan. 16—Eugene R. Steeves, of Moncton, was re-elected president of the New Brunswick Federation of Labor at the concluding session of the three-day convention here this afternoon, while James A. Whitebone, president of the Saint John Trade and Labor Council, was elected first vice-president; B. W. Sweatman, Moncton, second vice-president; John Wallace, Chatham, third vice-president; G. R. Melvin, Saint John, who for the past 11 years has been Secretary-Treasurer, was re-elected for his twelfth term of office.

On motion of Joseph Murphy, Saint John, the next annual convention of the Federation will be held in Saint John at a date to be decided upon by the executive, prior to the opening of Legislature. This gives the Legislation Committee more time to work on the various matters to be brought before the Government.

It was announced by President Steeves that the Legislation Committee, later announced as the Executive of the Federation, would meet the Provincial Government in Saint John on January 30 and present to them the program of social and other legislation sought by the Federation.

## BARRYMORE'S \$500,000 YACHT HITS THE WATER

Long Beach, Cal. Jan. 17—John Barrymore's \$500,000 steel yacht, christened "The Infanta," was launched here yesterday. The yacht was named by Mrs. Barrymore, who is Dolores Costello of the films.

Designed primarily for leisurely exploration of the Southern Pacific waters, "The Infanta," will take its place as perhaps the most luxurious of all the craft belonging to members of the motion picture colony.

## NEW PAPER MILL AT DALHOUSIE OPENS FEB. 14

**Will Be New Brunswick's Greatest Industry—A Special Train to Be Run From Saint John via Fredericton For the Opening.**

It is announced that the new paper mill at Dalhousie, lately completed by the Canadian International Paper Company will be officially opened on Friday, February 14th. The plant is the largest in the maritime provinces and one of the largest of its kind in the world. The Canadian International Paper Company, the Provincial Government and the Canadian National Railways are cooperating to make the official opening, what is to be New Brunswick's greatest industrial establishment a gala event.

It is planned to run a special train to Dalhousie from St. John via Fredericton on the night of February 13th, reaching Dalhousie shortly after daylight. It is expected that this train will carry between two and three hundred people. An entire day will be spent at Dalhousie and the return trip will be made on the night of the 14th. It had been planned to have the official opening take place on February 7th, but on account of the disastrous fire which occurred at Dalhousie it had to be delayed for one week.

### Will Be Gala Event

The officials, of the Canadian International Paper Company are making elaborate arrangements for the opening. It is being arranged to furnish every newspaper in the province with a supply of newsprint sufficient for the edition which will contain an account of the opening of the new mill. The newsprint will of course be furnished free of charge.

The new industry at Dalhousie which has been brought into existence largely through the efforts of Premier Baxter, will furnish steady employment for hundreds of men, and will convert the hitherto little town of Dalhousie into one of New Brunswick's greatest industrial centres.

## BATTLED WITH FLAMES IN ZERO WEATHER

Sackatoon, Sask., Jan. 16—Cloaked in ice-crusted coats, firemen halted a downtown conflagration after a three hour early morning battle today. Estimates placed damage at \$100,000.

Forty below weather prevailed while a photo studio, a jewelry store, a hat cleaning establishment and a real estate office were burned down. The Bank of Nova Scotia building was slightly damaged.

## VIGOROUS ACTION WAS TAKEN

**Berlin Authorities Prohibit Political Demonstrations.**

Berlin, Jan. 17—Claiming that an article on the first page of the Rote Fahne, communist newspaper "incited to treason," the Berlin police today confiscated the entire edition. The incident followed vigorous action by the Prussian authorities who have issued a decree indefinitely prohibiting any political demonstration by the public owing to recent clashes between Communist workers and police.

## DOAKTOWN MAN FACES BIGAMY CHARGE IN MAINE

Skowhegan, Me., Jan. 16—Chester E. Doak, of Doaktown, N. B., who yesterday pleaded guilty and was held for cause for the grand jury in Connecticut with a charge of bigamy, declared this afternoon that he would not make any attempt to fight the case in higher court, but would make an effort to secure a divorce from the wife he is alleged to have deserted in New Brunswick and to marry his alleged bigamous bride here.

### Wife's Complaint.

Doak was arrested following a complaint made by the Doaktown wife, Maude Sullivan Doak, who alleges that her husband left her destitute at the time of desertion, July 17 of last year. Doak, according to the authorities married Miss Florence A. Young of Concord, N. H., in this city. Miss Young as she must legally be known, was one of the most prominent young women of the New Hampshire city, a member of a very highly respected Concord family.

Doak created somewhat of a surprise locally by entering a plea of guilty in the Somerset municipal court. His arrest here had also created a distinct sensation inasmuch as he and his alleged bigamous bride were well known throughout the section.

## G. P. BURCHILL WAS ELECTED PRESIDENT

Ottawa, Jan. 16—G. P. Burchill, of South Nelson, N. B., was elected President of the Canadian Lumbermen's Association at the closing business session of the twenty-second convention held here today. He succeeds E. R. Bremner, of Ottawa. A. C. Manbert, Toronto, was elected first vice-president; John S. Gillies, Braeside, Ont., second vice-president; R. G. Cameron, Ottawa, secretary-treasurer, and Robert L. Sargent, Ottawa, was appointed secretary-manager.

The directors elected to fill the places of those whose three-year terms expired were: E. R. Bremner, Ottawa; W. C. Laidlaw, Toronto, for Quebec; Brigg F. White, Montreal; A. J. Pierce, Quebec; David Champoux, Quebec, all for Quebec; J. W. Brandley, Chatham, N. B., and C. D. McNab, Waldo, B. C.

All those except Mr. Laidlaw were directors for the past term who were re-elected. Mr. Laidlaw succeeds Dan McLachlan.

## Failure to Reach Settlement May Cause a Rupture

**Hungarian Reparations Discussed at Non-German Conference at the Hague—Jugo Slavia, Czecho Slovakia and Roumania Delegates Want a Settlement Made With Hungary.**

THE HAGUE, January 17—Failure to reach a settlement on terms of the Hungarian reparations payments today threatened to disrupt the non-German negotiations at the second conference.

The delegates of Jugo Slavia, Czecho Slovakia, and Roumania informed the six principal powers that they would refuse to sign the Young reparations plan unless a settlement with Hungary was reached at the present conference.

### Will Ask Questions.

Paris, January 17—Deputy Edouard Herriot announced that he will introduce interpellations in the Chamber of Deputies regarding Premier Andre Tardieu's statements at the Hague concerning France's engagements under the Hague treaty.

## WOMAN FOUND STRANGLER IN MONTREAL HOTEL

Montreal, Jan. 16—Lucienne Daigault, 24, was found strangled to death in Room 13 of a St. Lawrence Boulevard hotel here, this afternoon and police were searching tonight for an unidentified man with whom the girl entered the room last night. The two had registered as the hotel last night under the name of "Mr. and Mrs. John Tran," giving an address in the city which was discovered to be of a garage which they were not known.

Discovery of the body was made by a maid who knocked at the room door this afternoon, while going about her work. There was no answer but the door was open and the maid entered. The body of the girl was lying on the bed, the face covered by a pillow. The maid removed the pillow to find the girl's face covered with blood and a towel drawn tightly about her neck.

Dr. W. Derome, medico-legal expert examined the body and stated that death had been due to a strangulation the blood having resulted from that cause also.

## SPUD MARKET REPUTED TO BE RATHER QUIET

Hartland, Jan. 16—Dealers are finding the potato market rather quiet, with light demand from consuming centres and trading in fair volume. Offerings by farmers are fairly moderate and they are showing a tendency to hold for higher prices later on. Prices paid today to farmers were: Green Mountains, \$2.60 to \$2.65, and Irish Cobblers, \$2.40 to \$2.45 per barrel of 165 pounds, this price being general, with little variation along both railroads.

### IN AROOSTOOK

Presque Isle, Me., Jan. 16—The Aroostook potato market showed but little change today, with the market quiet and not much trading. Growers still hold back anything like heavy offerings at the present local buyers' price, which hold from \$3.50 to \$3.65 a barrel with a few going lots at a little more. The weather was somewhat colder today.
