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The Baxter Administration Was Handsomely Sustained

Carried 31 Seats in Yesterday's Election Out of a Total of 48—Saint, John, York, Charlotte, Carleton, Kings, Restigouche, Westmorland, Queens, Sunbury and Moncton Strong for Good Government—Reverses in Northumberland and Albert—The Liquor Problem Put Out of Politics.

Premier Baxter and his government, the most efficient administration this province has had since Confederation, will remain on the job for another five years. Leader Jones who made a gallant fight with obsolete weapons, will enjoy honor and dignity of the bench, while Mr. A. A. Dysart, who fought gallantly in the ranks after being deposed, will resume his old job as House Leader of His Majesty's Loyal Opposition. These are in brief some of the results of one of the most strenuous political campaigns the province has seen in a number of years, which was brought to a close last evening. The government is returned to power with a following of thirty-one members, having lost Northumberland and Albert, thereby increasing the opposition following from eleven to seventeen. The only cabinet minister to suffer defeat was Hon. Lewis Smith, Minister of Agriculture, who with his colleague, C. J. Osman, failed to make the grade in the County of Albert. The government candidates swept the constituencies of Saint John City, Saint John County, Charlotte, York, Carleton, Westmorland, Moncton, Restigouche, Kings, Sunbury and Queens, while the opposition won out in Gloucester, Madawaska, Victoria, Kent, Northumberland and Albert. In three constituencies the government majorities ran into four figures.

The Radio Used

The radio was used last evening for the first time in New Brunswick for broadcasting the result of a provincial election and the service was highly satisfactory. The New Brunswick Telephone Company played an important part in the work of disseminating the news throughout the province. Microphones were installed in the company's office at Saint John and the returns were sent out through the three provincial broadcasting stations. Cleve Stillwell, announced for Station CFNB, handed out the dope to the people of Central New Brunswick. During brief intermissions J. Stewart Neill, from the local station, gave out the returns for the County of York. History was made in this province yesterday in the dissemination of election returns. The result all over the province was known to practically everybody before eight o'clock in the evening.

St. John City

The government candidates, Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, Col. Harrison, and Mayor White, swept all before them in the City of Saint John. Their majorities ran into thousands and their opponents narrowly escaped losing their deposits. The returns follow:

Sunbury County

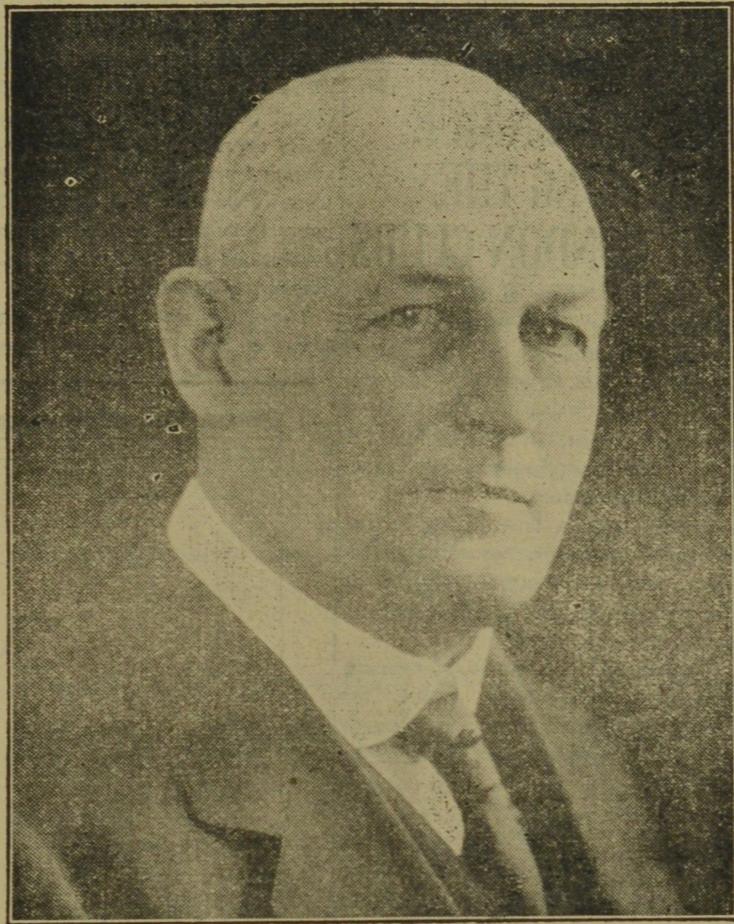

FRANCE WILL HONOR JOFFRE AT CHANTILLY

Chantilly, France, June 20—France will pay belated honors to Marshal Joseph Joffre, hero of the first battle of the Marne, in a two day ceremony beginning here tomorrow.

The ceremony will be featured by the inauguration by President Gaston Doumergue tomorrow of a life-sized statue of the old soldier, erected outside the hotel where he made his headquarters during those early days of the war when he was defending Paris.

MUSSOLINI SAYS HE IS THE VERY DOVE OF PEACE

Rome, June 20—Italy is hard at work, and wishes to live in peace with all her neighbors, Premier Mussolini told 100 school teachers representing 21 nations who were presented to him yesterday.

"Tell your countrymen when you return to your various nations, that Italy resides to live at peace with all her neighbors," Mussolini said. "Tell them what you have seen that the people are busy at their labors."

Indian Viceroy Clamps Rioters Under Ordinance

Anti-Tax Agitators Are Harassed in Madras—Heavy Sentences Authorized—Two Mohammedans Stabbed at Dacca As Commission Acts—Situation Grows Tense.

MADRAS, India, June 20—The government strengthened its drive against anti-tax agitators today upon advice from the Viceroy.

The Viceroy empowered the governor of Madras to apply to part or all of the state the ordinance punishing by fines or prison sentences, persons found guilty of instigating farmers to refuse to pay land taxes or official dues. Advice from Dacca, which has been the scene of various disorders in the independence movement, said unidentified men stabbed and killed two Mohammedans at the hour when a commission was sitting to enquire into recent disturbances. The situation was tense there.

MAY ADOPT NEW PROTECTION ON BRITISH WHEAT

London, June 20—The suggestion that the importation of flour into Britain from any source, foreign country or Dominion should be prohibited in return for which British millers would agree to take first British wheat, then Dominion wheat and lastly foreign wheat in order to satisfy the home demand is being strongly supported by the millers themselves.

Guy Savory, President of the National Association of British and Irish Millers has endorsed the plan.

POLICE AND AGITATORS IN A CLASH

Bombay, India, June 20—Sixteen persons were injured two seriously when police and a crowd of natives demonstrators clashed today in front of the White Way Shop, and English store which has been the scene of recent disturbances.

A procession of 4,000 students was charged by police with staves and dispersed.

IMPORTANT PROPOSALS CONSIDERED

London, June 20—Proposals which amounted practically to creation of a new Dominion with an area of almost 700,000 square miles were made today in a government memorandum proposing appointment of a high commissioner for the African colonies of Kenya, Tanganyika and Uganda. The colonies have a population of about 10,000,000.

THE BROWNLEE GOVERNMENT WAS SUSTAINED

The Farmer's Administration in Alberta Given a New Mandate to Carry On.

Calgary, Alta., June 19—United Farmers of Alberta strode into power in Alberta nine years ago under the guidance of Hon. Herbert Greenfield, tonight marched to a third term in administration of the province.

Followers of Premier J. E. Brownlee, who held 43 out of 60 seats in the last Assembly, were certain of re-election with counts still proceeding in many constituencies. It seemed probable, however, that the Farmer Party majority would be slightly reduced.

At 11 o'clock, Mountain Standard Time, the standing of the elected parties was as follows:

F. A. (Government), 30; Liberal, 4; Conservative, 2; Independent, 1; Labor, 2; undecided, 24; total, 63.

At dissolution, the Farmer group held 43 of 60 seats in the Alberta Assembly. Liberals and Conservative, forming the opposition, numbered seven and four respectively. The remaining half dozen were Laborites, linked with the U. F. A. party by a rough entente. In the next house the membership will be swelled by three to sixty three.

Brownlee Gets Seat

The Premier leader of the Farmers, an Edmonton lawyer, pointed to the record of his government in asking return to office. Premier J. E. Brownlee, who was attorney-general in the Greenfield Government and has been first minister since 1926, is already elected by acclamation in Ponoka.

A SEVERE COLD KEEPS LIPTON FROM REGATTA
