## Drive Against Anti-Fascists in Italy Has Been Renewed

Is Coincident With the Recent Celebration of the Drive on Rome—A Score of People Arrested on a Charge of Criminal Actions Against the State.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

ROME, Nov. 7—A drive against anti-fascist elements in Italy was renewed coincident with the celebration of the anniversary of the march on Rome last month, it was announced officially today and about a score of persons have been arrested.

The arrest of a score of persons charged with criminal actions against the State was revealed today by official sources. Officials charged the persons arrested with association with anti-fascists in Paris. The arrests were made on the eve of the anniversary of the Fascist march on Rome.

Paris officials have arrested forty-five Italians, at least fourteen of whom will be deported. The arrests were said to be in connection with communist activities.

## FRANK STANFIELD NEW GOVERNOR OF NOVA SCOTIA

Unshrinkable Underwear Manufacturer to Succeed Hon. J. C. Tory.

Ottawa, Nov. 6—While official announcement has not yet been made, it is learned on good authority that Frank Stanfield, M.L.A., of Truro, N. S., has been appointed Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia.

Mr. Stanfield succeeds Hon. J. C. Tory, whose term expired on October 1. It is understood that the new Lieutenant-Governor will take over the duties of his office about the end of this month.

Was Expected

Halifax, Nov. 6—It has been understood in authoritative circles here for some time that Frank Stanfield, M.L.A. would succeed Hon. J. C. Tory as Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia.

Mr. Stanfield is president and managing director of Stanfield's Limited, Truro, manufacturers of woollen and silk clothing, and a director of many other Nova Scotia industries. He is a member for Colchester of the Legislative Assembly, and has won four elections for the Conservative party in that constituency. Born in 1872, at Truro, he is a brother of Senator John Stanfield.

Vacates Seat

Mr. Stanfield's resignation to accept the Lieutenant-Governorship would make the present standing in the Provincial Legislature 21 Conservatives to 16 Liberals.

## THE CONGRESS OF BRAZIL TO BE DISSOLVED

## SIR HENRY ON THE JOB AT FIFTY NINE

Muskegon, Mich. Nov. 6—Sir Henry W. Thornton, chairman and president of the Canadian National Railways, celebrated his fifty-ninth birthday today "on the job" as usual. Before many men had contemplated breakfast he was away out on the line taking an inspection car over the rails of the new addition to the Pontiac, Michigan belt of the Grand Trunk western lines. In the afternoon he travelled many miles on the eastern shore of Lake Michigan, walking the ties to inspect the new dock under construction at Muskegon for the lake Michigan car ferry fleet of the railway. A new ferry will be launched at the end of November.

## PERTH MAN SHOT HIMSELF BY ACCIDENT

Perth, Victoria Co., Nov. 6—The community has been thrown into gloom by the death of George M. Clark, of Perth, who accidentally shot himself, with fatal results, near his home last night. General sympathy is being extended to his wife and family. The funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

He had been at a turkey shoot in the afternoon. After returning to his service station he and other men had cleaned their rifles. He then started for home. In some unknown manner the gun discharged, the bullet entering just below his jaw, killing him instantly. When the accident occurred he was just a few feet from the front door of his home. It is thought he tripped over something.

## KENMORE CAMPS ON MIRAMICHI HAD GOOD SEASON

Forty American Anglers Enjoyed Fine Sport—One Landed a 25 Pound Salmon—Grilse Leaped Into a Canoe.

Willis Norrad, manager of the Kenmore Sporting Camps, which are located on the Southwest Miramichi River, five miles above Boiestown, who was a visitor to the city this week, says that the angling season of 1930 was the best that he has ever experienced. As every body knows business depression prevented many Americans from taking their usual outing last season, yet Mr. Norrad was called upon to take care of forty of them at his camps, which was about double the number he handled during the previous year. While salmon angling was a new pastime to the great majority of the visitors they enjoyed it very much and went home with their minds made up to return next season. Of the forty visitors which Norrad entertained all but nine made the trip from home by automobile, the others travelling by rail. Mr. Norrad says that experience has taught him the best advertisement for the Kenmore Camps is a pleased customer, and he always puts himself out to see to it that his people have a good time and if there is a run of salmon on he wants to have them connect up with some of the peerless fighters.

Didn't Get Away

A True Fish Story

One of the best fish stories of the season emanates from Kenmore Camps, and it differs from most fish stories because it is true. Mr. Norrad, while out in a canoe in the morning with an American, made a few casts and succeeded in hooking a grilse. The fish fought hard and after fouling the line made a get-away taking the fly and fifty feet of line along with it. In the afternoon of the same day Mr. Norrad while canoeing near the same spot with his American friend, saw a grilse jump a few yards away. He paddled over close to the spot and as he did so the fish made another jump and this time landed plump into the canoe. It proved to be the same fish that had taken the fly and line in the morning, and Mr. Norrad is confident that its object in leaping into the canoe was to restore his property.

## OIL TANKER GOES AGROUND IN THE PACIFIC

Crew of 45 Men Trying Hard to Salvage Her

A ROUGH SEA PREVAILS

Largest Tanker on the Pacific is Apparently Doomed

Pigeon Point, Calif., Nov. 7—The oil tanker Tamiahua was aground six miles north of here today while forty-five crew members defied a pounding sea in an apparently futile attempt to save the vessel.

A dense fog blanketed the rocky section of the coast, fifty five miles south of San Francisco.

The lack of visibility handicapped ships cruising the coast in the hope of saving the tanker, one of the largest on the Pacific. While there was said to be little danger of losing the crew members, it appeared that the tanker was doomed.

COURT ADJOURNED

Mr. Justice Crockett Adjourns Court To December 8 For Judgment—Decree in Coull Vs. Coull Yesterday Afternoon—Longest Docket.

The New Brunswick Divorce Court was adjourned by Mr. Justice Crockett yesterday afternoon and judgment will be handed out on December 8th. The final decree of divorce was handed out in the case of William W. Coull vs. Margaret Coull, divorce being granted on regular statutory grounds.

## Democrats Will Make Scientific Tariff Revision

This Will Be the Keynote of Their Legislative Program in the Event of Their Securing Control of the Next Campaign—Liberal Farm Relief Legislation is Also on Program.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 7—"Scientific" revision of the Hawley-Smoot tariff bill will be the keynote of the Democratic Legislative program if the party assumes control of the House next year for the first time since 1918, leaders indicated today.

Liberal farm relief legislation, embodying the equalization fee or debenture also will be a cardinal point in the Democratic program. Party leaders were not in agreement on just what form proposed legislation should take. The new Congress will not begin to function until December 1st, 1931.

The York-Sunbury Teachers' Institute began its final session this afternoon in the local high school, with rapid progress being made, and with indications of this year's Institute one of the most successful ever held.

Important Matters

This morning's program was featured by a number of addresses by teachers on many interesting subjects. Miss Alice E. Murchie, of North Lake school read a paper on "General Methods of Teaching." In it the teacher stressed the following points in regard to assignment of lesson: (1) Teaching and explanation with definite plan of lesson assigned; (2) Teacher must know educational ground must have in mind the immediate as well as the ultimate goal.

Dr. A. S. McFarlane, principal of the High School, here, in his address before the Institute, emphasized the necessity of a definite plan of making known to the student, the lesson to be taught next day. The pupil said the principal, should thus be shown definitely what he has to prepare at home for recitation for the following day. When this is done the parent will not be complaining that he or she is doing the teaching and not the teacher.

Inspector Fox

Inspector Fox, another of this morning's speakers, stressed the difficulties of putting the suggestions into working plans in the country school and help all grades at work at some time but many grades might be grouped for a well organized lesson in certain topics such as history and others.

Other speakers today were Principal Hughes of St. Dunstan's school, Inspector Titus, Miss Mary Granen.

## JURY DISAGREED IN ARSON CASE AT DORCHESTER

Dorchester, Nov. 6—After four hours deliberation, the jury in the trial of Claire Price, of Montreal, formerly of Moncton, charged with arson in the burning of the Price Bros. mill at Moncton, failed to reach an agreement in the Supreme Court here today, and Mr. Justice Byrne discharged the jury and remanded Price to jail facing another trial.

When court resumed this morning Rene Richard, of Sackville, Crown prosecutor, addressed the jury for an hour and reviewed the case for the Crown. He told the jury that although all evidence against the accused was of a circumstantial nature he believed the Crown had welded together link after link in a chain of evidence which was in his opinion strongly against the accused.

In a poll of the jury it was shown that nine favored acquittal, while three held for a conviction.

Mr. Richard moved that Nelson Price, brother of Clair, who is also charged with arson, be arraigned. Following the reading of the charge, Nelson pleaded not guilty and the empanelling of a jury was commenced.
