

WILL BRING DOWN BUDGET ON WEDNESDAY

The Debate is Likely To Be Protracted One—First Evening Session On Wednesday—Will Go To Dalhousie.

The Legislature, which adjourned on Friday last, after concluding the debate on the address will resume work at three o'clock tomorrow afternoon when the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer, Hon. A. J. Leger, will bring down the budget. He will likely be followed by Hon. J. E. Michaud, the financial critic of the opposition. The House will have its first night sitting of the session tomorrow evening. The debate which is likely to be a protracted one will be continued on Thursday and probably all of next week.

The members of the House along with a number of invited guests, will leave here on Thursday evening by special train for Dalhousie to attend the formal opening of the new paper mill of the New Brunswick International Company. The House when it adjourns on Thursday evening will likely stand adjourned until the following Tuesday.

Most of the members of the government and Legislature who spent the week-end at their homes are expected to return to the city this evening.
