A Horrible Tale of Butchery is Told by Changsha Refugees

Arrivals at Hankow Tell How the City was Plundered by Chinese Brigands—Wealthy Citizens Were Hunted Down, Robbed and Slain—Many Bodies Left in the Streets.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

Hankow, China, Aug. 2—Refugees from the stricken city of Changsha which was plundered by a horde of Chinese outlaws, arrived in Hankow in great numbers today.

Persons of wealth and position were the special objects of the brigands' fury, eye witnesses said. Members of the government, bankers and merchants were hunted down and slain wherever found, their heads were severed from their bodies and strung up outside of buildings and residences.

Many of the bodies were left in the streets after they had been stripped of valuables. Houses were in ruins or flames everywhere. Witnesses reported that anyone so indiscreet as to wear expensive or foreign clothes was the target of abuse. From the increasing numbers of refugees seeking safety here it was believed many had escaped from the city.

WOMAN KILLED IN AUTO CRASH AT MARS HILL

Was Returning With Her Husband and a Party of Friends from the St. John Races.

Mars Hill, Me., Aug. 2—Mrs. W. H. Wright, of Fort Fairfield, Me., was fatally injured and died in the Fort Fairfield Hospital three hours after an automobile party returning from the horse races in Saint John crashed into a small culvert a quarter of a mile north of Mars Hill, Thursday night.

W. H. Wright, husband of the dead woman and owner of the car in which they and three friends were travelling was driving the machine at the time of the accident.

All of the occupants of the car were taken to the Fort Fairfield Hospital, where it was found that Mr. Wright, who had horses in the Saint John races, had a broken leg, while Harry Shaw of Caribou, Me., who had driven from Saint John to Mars Hill, where he was relieved by Mr. Wright, was badly cut and bruised, and his wife suffered a broken arm. Mr. Shaw's sister, Miss Helen Shaw, escaped with minor injuries.

SOUTH CHINA IS IN STATE OF ANARCHY

Washington, D. C., August 2—Official despatches from China indicated today that virtual anarchy reigns in the southern half of the republic. Officials, it was reliably learned, fear the nationalist regime will be unable to restore order for some time. Officials who surveyed the district from the South China sea to the Yangtse River at Wuchang found that with the exception of some interior towns in the control of war lords, there was responsible government in the area.

AMERICAN GIVES \$10,000,000

London, August 2—The Daily Herald, government organ, says that Edward Harkness, of New York, American philanthropist has offered £2,000,000 (about \$10,000,000) for the endowment of social and educational work in Great Britain. The gift is to be administered by a board of public men. Invitations to serve on it have been sent among others, to former Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin, Sir Joseph Stamp, the great financial expert, and to John Buchan, novelist and member of Parliament.

ARIZONA DESERT PRODUCES SWEETS

Coolidge, Ariz., Aug. 2—The giant Aahuaro and organ pipe cacti and the smaller organ pipe or pitahaya cactus of Arizona used for centuries by Indians for sirups, conserves and dried food. They bear fruit even after three years of extreme drought.

GOES UP 14,600 FEET IN GLIDER

Oakland, Cal., Aug. 2—F. Myrten Johnson soared to a height of 14,600 feet in a two cylinder, 30-horse-power airplane yesterday, setting what is believed to be an altitude record for power gliders. The plane's sealed instruments were sent to Washing, D. C. for official recording.

LIEUTENANT OF GHANDI IS UNDER ARREST

Taken Into Custody With Eleven Other Leaders

SQUATTED IN THE STREETS

Forty Women Volunteers Arrested, Will Be Released

Bombay, India, August 2—Vallabhai Patel, one of Mahatma Gandhi's chief lieutenants in the Indian passive resistance campaign and eleven other campaign leaders were arrested here today as police scattered a group of volunteers who had squatted in the streets all night.

Fifty volunteers were known to be injured when police charged the squatters after taking the leaders in custody. Unconfirmed reports said 150 were hurt. The police also arrested forty women volunteers, but were expected to release them after a few hours.

Rumors Regarding Leadership of Old Country Parties

Attempt to Induce Beaverbrook and Rothermere to Abandon Their Personal Campaign Against Mr. Baldwin Has Failed—Further Efforts Will Be Made to End the Deadlock.

LONDON, Aug. 2—Although members of Parliament have dispersed for the holiday recess all are agitated by rumors regarding the future leadership of both the Conservative and Labor parties.

Apparently Right Hon. Neville Chamberlain's attempt to get Lord Rothermere and Lord Beaverbrook to abandon their personal campaign against Right Hon. Stanley Baldwin has failed. Mr. Baldwin refuses to meet either of the press dictators and the Conservatives are angry at Lord Beaverbrook for continuing to ask the subscribers to Tory funds to divert their money to his campaign for free trade within the Empire. Meanwhile it is obvious that Mr. Baldwin cannot fight both the newspaper barons and further efforts will certainly be made to end the deadlock. Mr. Baldwin's position as leader of the Conservative party will remain precarious until Mr. Chamberlain reports some progress in his negotiations.

GREEN N. B. MAN WAS RELIEVED OF SUM OF \$350

Montreal, August 2—Colin Olsen, who comes from New Brunswick, met a casual acquaintance yesterday morning and as a result of placing too much confidence in the stranger, he is out of pocket \$350, he told the police of No. 3 station.

Olsen who is stopping at 1066 Osborne street was in Montreal less than two hours when he parted with his money. The casual friend met him near the Windsor station at 11 o'clock in the morning. They chatted for a while and when Olsen was invited for a walk he accepted. He was troubled with a headache, and decided to go into a drug store to buy some aspirin tablets.

His new found friend became anxious on his behalf and after telling him it was dangerous to go alone in the big city especially with money in his pockets. Olsen decided to be guided by the stranger and took his advice which was "Better let me hold your money for you."

Olsen bought the aspirin tablets and came out of the drug store to look for his casual acquaintance. Then he got another headache for his friend and the \$350 had vanished.

THE SUMMER CAMP CRAZE HITS SWEDEN

Stockholm, Aug. 2—The summer camp, as it is known in America, is rapidly becoming very popular in Sweden, more and more people preferring to spend their vacation in a tent or cabin beside a lake or stream, in the mountain or at the seaside.

The Swedish Tourist Association has issued a booklet, entitled, "Swedish Camps," which gives the location of 133 various places of this description, the majority of which are located in central and southern Sweden. The publication is issued free to all members of the Association, which plans to enlarge and revise each year.

OLIVE OIL AS LUBRICANT

Madrid, Aug. 2—Manuel Pinal, a member of the Seville municipal council today, motored from that city to Madrid, using olive oil as the only lubricant of his car. The experimenter said he consumed one litre (about a quart) of the oil with excellent results. Olive producers have asked the government to support experiments which they hope will result in extensive use of olive oil for lubrication now accomplished by mineral oils as a measure toward solving the problem of olive over-production.

Another Fast One

It is possible that a hen competing in the New Brunswick Egg Laying Contest at the Fredericton Experimental Station, may cross the 300 egg mark. It is bird No. 9, owned by A. T. Reed, Rollingdam, Charlotte County. Up to the end of July it had produced 234 eggs and if this rate is kept up for the next three months its total will be 316.
