A Daring Outbreak On a Chicago Street Early This Morning

Gangsters Open Fire on an Auto Containing a Police Lieutenant in State Street—Was Escorting a Gang Leader Back to Safe Territory—Street Car Motorman Was Killed.

CHICAGO, July 2—State Street, of this city, one of the world's most brilliantly lighted thoroughfares, was marked early today as the battle ground of one of the Chicago underworld's most daring outbreaks.

Under the glare of a thousand candle power lamps on a corner only one block from the post office, well dressed gangsters opened fire upon an automobile in which a police lieutenant was escorting a notorious gang leader and three of his followers back to "Safe Territory". In the exchange of shots between the lieutenant and the gangsters a street car motorman was killed, another bystander wounded, home-going theatre crowds hid behind lamp posts and metal refuse boxes and the three gangsters who were the original targets in the outbreak fled.

SUCCESSOR TO GHANDI GETS 6 MONTHS PEN

Allahabad, India, July 2—Sentences of six months simple imprisonment were imposed on Pandit Motilal Nehru and Sayad Mahmud by a court here yesterday on charges growing out of their participation in the Indian passive resistance campaign.

Nehru, fourth in succession to Mahatma Gandhi as leader of the campaign, was president of the all-Indian congress, of which Mahmud was secretary. They were arrested here Monday.

17 ARGENTINE LABORERS ON FOOD STRIKE

Cordoba, Argentina, July 2—Seventeen laborers who were arrested during the recent tramway strike here, were on a hunger strike in jail today. The laborers declared the hunger strike in an effort to gain their liberty. Local labor organizations were refused a permit by police to hold a mass meeting last night in protest against detention of the laborers.

Many persons left the city for different parts of the province by motor and held picnics. A big attraction was the political picnic at Woodstock which drew thousands from all over.

A BARN WAS SET ON FIRE BY LIGHTNING

Woodstock, July 1—Alex Bell, of Ladesville, lost a large barn and some of his livestock this evening when lightning struck the building and set it on fire. His house was saved after a hard battle. The lightning struck the barn during a sharp electrical storm and the structure was quickly a mass of flames. The fire spread so quickly that two horses, two calves and a large number of poultry were lost.

The wind was blowing directly toward the house, which was only about 50 feet away from the barn, and for a time it looked as if the dwelling would catch. Fortunately, the Lakeville Catholic Church was holding a picnic in the vicinity and the picnickers came to the assistance of Mr. Bell. They formed a bucket brigade and poured water over the house until the frame of the barn fell and put an end to the menace.

RHINELAND IS RETURNED TO GERMANY

Paris, June 30—The Rhineland was returned to Germany today 11 years and 2 days after the signing of the peace treaty at Versailles.

With the departure of General Gaullumaut, commander in chief of the French arm of occupation, the Rhineland officially and completely went back to Germany from French control, in compliance with another provision of the Young plan of reparations and liquidating still further the debts of the war.

Late James C. Hughes

The funeral of the late James C. Hughes, aged 69 years, who died yesterday at his home at Barker's Point was held this afternoon from the late home. Rev. D. C. Kaine of Devon officiated at the service and interment was made in the Sunnyside cemetery. The late Mr. Hughes had lived the greater part of his life at Barker's Point and was very well known. He is survived by his wife, three brothers, William, Willard, and Bevan and two sisters, Mrs. William Sturgeon, of Portland, Me., and Mrs. William Rickard, of Barker's Point.

Injured in Auto Crash

Miss Della Young, aged 19 years, of Brookline, Mass., was injured on the holiday in an auto crash seven miles from here on the Woodstock Road and was taken to the Victoria Hospital, where today her condition is as well as can be expected. In an accident at the corner of Queen and Shore streets yesterday afternoon, slight injuries were sustained by Fred Coulter, when his car was struck by an oil truck from Saint John. Court action is pending.

C. N. R. LINES WERE WELL PATRONIZED

Moncton, July 2—Rail travel over the lines of the Canadian National Railways in the Maritimes was exceptionally heavy for the holiday. A heavy movement of passengers to Prince Edward Island from New England points was a noticeable feature. The fast all sleeping car train, The Acadian, which went into service between Montreal and Maritime Province points for the season on Monday from Halifax to Montreal and Sunday from Montreal to Halifax was well patronized, while the Ocean Limited, operating between the same points, was particularly heavy, it being necessary to run the train from Montreal in two sections. From now on until the close of the season a heavy passenger movement is expected to Maritime Province points.

Still in Scotland

With word received from Scotland that the wife of the late Ian Milne, who was drowned on Thursday of last week, was still in Scotland, arrangements are being made for the burial of Milne, probably on Sunday. It is expected that the St. Andrew's Society will bear the expenses of burial of the deceased. Expectations were that Mrs. Milne was on her way to join her husband, but this was disproved when the Provincial Police here got in touch with the relatives in Scotland.

Store Break

James Prince of Hampton, was arrested yesterday on a warrant charging him with having broken into a store at French Lake owned by Edward Prince, stealing \$300 in cash. He was taken to the Sunbury County lockup at Burton to await trial.

Car Sideswiped

A slight accident occurred this morning at Sheffield, when the Purty Ice Cream truck of this city sideswiped another car doing some damage. Both cars were able to continue under their own power. There was no one injured in the accident.
