#### Court Adjourned





A slump in the price of chickens and lamb featured the week-end market this morning. Lamb by the L.nd quarter sold as low as 18 ants while chickens went off to 35 cents. Butter sold at 33 cents per pound and eggs at 35 cents. Potatoes were down to \$1.75 per harrel and turnips to \$1. Beets sold at 20 cents per peck, carrots at 25 cents, and fresh pork at 26 and 18 cents. Other prices were about the same as last week.
