Premier Bennett is Not Seeking Closer Trade Relations

Premier Gives Out an Interview in France in Which He Emphatically Denies a Report—Has Had No Conversations With French Statesmen.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)
PARIS, Nov. 25—Prime Minister R. B. Bennett emphatically denied having held any official conversations with French statesmen regarding trade between Canada and France when he was interviewed by newspaper men this morning.
“I have spoken informally to several French men, but only to exchange greetings,” he said. “Canada raises more wheat than we can eat and sells surplus to whoever will buy. Trade with France is already covered by existing treaties” he said.

Avoided Critical Vote.
London, Nov. 25—The Labor Government apparently avoided another critical vote in the House of Commons today by consenting to postponement of the petition of the school attendance bill until Sept. 1932.
The bill originally was to be effective on April 1, 1931. It provides for compulsory attendance of children over a wider span of years than previously.

CHARLOTTE CO. MAN WAS SHOT IN THE WOODS

St. Stephen, Nov. 24—Thomas Robinson, 65, of Basswood Ridge, Charlotte county, lies in a critical condition in the Chipman Memorial Hospital here following an accidental shooting this afternoon at De Wolfe Corner, 12 miles from St. Stephen. According to the late report from the hospital, no hope is held for his recovery.
The bullet, which entered Robinson's neck, was fired from a gun in the hands of a companion, Allan McGowan, of De Wolfe Corner, who had been hunting with him. A report which reached here shortly after the accident stated that McGowan had heard a noise in the bushes nearby, where he was standing and thinking Robinson some distance away, fired. The bullet, a .38-55, entered the left side of Robinson's neck and came out under his left shoulder.
McGowan immediately ran for assistance. Residents nearby made a temporary stretcher and Robinson was carried to the roadside, a mile away. Dr. E. O. Thomas of St. Stephen was summoned and arrived at De Wolfe Corner about 15 minutes after the shooting. He at once ordered the removal of the injured man to the hospital. A truck owned by the N. B. Telephone Co., Ltd., which happened to be passing, brought Robinson here. Dr. Thomas pronounced Robinson's condition as serious.

WANTS HEN'S LEGS STAMPED ON THE EGGS

Douglas, Isle of Man, Nov. 25—There has been a bit of disquietude among dairy interests because of the suggestion, that the Manx emblem be stamped on island eggs. The emblem consists of three legs with a Latin motto meaning:
Throw me any way you will
Upon my legs you'll find me still.

SPECIAL LICENSE FOR DEER IN PENNSYLVANIA

Harrisburg, Nov. 25—The State Game Commission announced that there are still special licenses for hunters who desire to shoot antlerless deer from November 27th to 29th in all of the twenty three open counties except Monroe. All licenses for the special season in that county have been sold.
The special licenses cost \$2 and can be obtained by any hunter having a regular license this year, and application must be made to the commission here and not to the county treasurers.
The killing of an antlerless deer during the three-day period does not prevent a hunter from killing one buck during the regular deer season, December 1 to 15.

Another Offer
Would be hangmen seem to be plentiful in New Brunswick. Sheriff J. B. Hawthorne, received a letter from a Moncton man, who wants the job of hanging Harvey Dunlop, 54-year-old man, sentenced to hang on December 17 for the murder of Erbon Dickenson on May 24th last at Campbell Settlement. This is the second offer the Sheriff has received, the other being from an Indian named Sacobie of French Village. Sheriff Hawthorne threw both missives into the waste basket, he stated yesterday. He didn't even bother to see who the writer of the last missive was, he said yesterday. No word has been received yet in answer to the petition sent to the Department of Justice at Ottawa to have Dunlop's sentence commuted to life imprisonment. Recommendation of mercy had been given by the jury and later a petition signed by people in the province, was sent to the Department asking clemency.

WILL PLAY GAME FOR BENEFIT OF FOUNDLINGS

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 25—Twenty-five babies, found during the last three months on doorsteps, in alleys and ash cans, will benefit from a charity football game to be played here on Nov. 30 between De Paul University and St. Johns College of Brooklyn. The babies are cared for in St. Vincent's Infant Asylum, which in fifty years has provided for 38,000 foundlings.

AN AVIATRIX WINS TRIBESMEN WITH DANCING

Bagdad, Nov. 25—When the Hon. Mrs. Victor Bruce's plane made a forced landing in Iraq on her recent flight to Tokio, Baluchi tribesmen surrounded her and began dancing in an unfriendly manner while waving sticks. Putting on her best smile she tried to show no fear by shaking hands with them, and they eventually subsided.
“The natives were particularly interested in my alarm clock, which I had to wind up many times to please them. Then the chief tribesman, Shahmorad-bin-Salla by name, danced and made a gesture which told me pretty plainly that they expected me to do the same. Of course, I obliged them.”
After spending three days with them she started for Jask, 40 miles away, escorted by the tribesmen.

FOX BREEDERS FROM P. E. I. BIG WINNERS

Toronto, Nov. 24—Prince Edward Island made a clean sweep of Canadian fox championships at The Royal Winter Fair here.
In the list of results announced today after three days of judging, the combined entries of R. S. Humphrey and W. A. MacArthur, of Kensington and John A. Lea and P. G. Clarke, of Summerside, carried off all national awards, the grand champion adult fox going to Humphrey, and to Lea, the grand champion fox born this year.

CLEVELAND-ST. LOUIS DEAL ON THE FIRE

Cleveland, Nov. 25—Just as soon as the last football cheers have died away, one can expect to hear that the Cleveland Indians and St. Louis Browns have pulled off one of the biggest trades of the off season. According to the lowdown from the Cleveland headquarters, Lou Fonseca, hard hitting and sweet singing first baseman; Bibb Falk, one time hard hitting outfielder, but not much of a singer, and a large bundle of spinach will become the property of the St. Louis Browns for Sammy Gray, plain bit-bitten pitcher from the Texas plains and Dick Ferrell, handsome young catcher and brother of Willy Wes, the Cleveland ace. TROOPS PATROL THE STREETS OF LIMA PERU

Political Situation of the Nation in Uncertain Condition

GUARDS ON THE BOLIVAR HOTEL

Refugees from American Copper Mine are Housed There

Lima, Peru, Nov. 25—Troops were stationed in Lima's streets today to quell possible further disturbances due to the uncertainty of the nation's political situation.
Guards were placed at the Bolivar Hotel at the request of American Ambassador Fred M. Dearing to protect several hundred refugees from the American owned Cerro De Pasco Copper Mines. The refugees have been quartered at the hotel since they evacuated the mining region after riots of native Indian miners.

CLUB MEMBERS ARE BACK FROM WINTER FAIR

Moncton, N. B., Nov. 24—The members of the Maritime cattle and swine clubs, who went to the Royal Winter Fair, Toronto, to compete for the Canadian championship in both classes, the latter represented by the trophy donated by W. D. Robb, vice-president of the C. N. R., and the former by the trophy presented by Dr. W. J. Black, C. N. R. director of colonization and agriculture, returned to the Maritimes this morning, dispersing here for their various homes.
While they were not successful in capturing the team contests, individually they took the highest score, Warren MacKenzie, of West River, N. S., carrying off the honors in this competition, with Mary McEachern, of Argyle Shore, P. E. I., third. Douglas Ferris, of Barrie, Ontario, was second and should it be decided to send a team from Canada to compete in the international cattle judging contest the coming summer, as was done last year, these three will comprise the team.
“We had a wonderful trip and sure did enjoy ourselves,” Warren MacKenzie said on his arrival here. “There was lots to see at the Fair and we all tried hard to win the team competitions. The scoring was very close.”

COW CLIMBS STAIRS AND ENTERS HOME

Mulligan executed a swift broad-jump landed right in the middle of his bed. The rest of the family ducked under the covers.
It took six able bodied men with rope and tackle to get Delphine, who had climbed 21 steps from her stall in the Mulligan barn, back to bed again.

Death Penalty is Demanded for 8 Alleged Plotters

All of Soviet Russia Are United in Demanding That Engineers Who Are on Trial Be Given the Death Penalty—Crowds Parade Streets of Industrial Cities.

MOSCOW, Nov. 25—All of Soviet Russia united today in a vast demonstration demanding the death penalty for eight engineers who went on trial here charged with plotting an interventionist war against the communist government.
As the eight defendants were led to the improvised court room in a former noble's ball room, millions of men, women and children in the industrial cities of Russia marched in great parades, singing wildly and shouting demands for infliction of the death sentence on the counter revolutionaries. They also raised cries against France, Britain and other European countries, accused of plotting a co-operative war against the Soviet and they demanded preparadness for “a defensive war.”

GRAVE TENSION ON GERMAN FRONTIER

Berlin, Nov. 25—The foreign office decided today to appeal to the League of Nations in behalf of the German minority population in Polish Silesia.
Recent charges of terrorism and attacks on Germans in Poland have resulted in grave tension along the German-Polish frontier.

NON POLITICAL BANQUET FOR HON. MR. MANION

Montreal, Nov. 25—At the banquet being tendered Hon. R. J. Manion, Minister of Railways and Canals by the citizens of Montreal under the auspices of St. Patrick's Society, the speakers in addition to the guest of honor, will be Senator W. L. McDougald, who will propose the toast of the evening, M. A. Phelan, K. C., who will speak on “Canada” and Senator P. E. Blondin, who will respond to it.
The dinner will be at the Windsor Hotel on December 9, and an office has been opened in room 36, where reservations may be made. Already over 300 tickets have been sold. The tribute to the Minister is non-political and subscribers represent all classes of citizens.

BRIDGE CRASH IN GERMANY

Berlin, Nov. 25—Seven workmen were killed and another badly injured yesterday in the collapse of a bridge, under construction at a steel works at Klein Leipsis.

Another Service Station

CARS DERAILED AT BRONSON ON THE C. N. R.

Moncton, Nov. 24—The transcontinental division of the Canadian National Railways was blocked for traffic tonight at Bronson, a point 50 miles north of Moncton, through the derailment of 12 cars attached to north-bound fast freight No. 473, which left Moncton at 3 o'clock this afternoon. The cause of the run-off was unknown. An investigation will be made.
Little damage resulted from the derailment, either to roadbed or rolling stock, according to C. N. R. headquarters, and it is expected the line will be clear for traffic early tomorrow. The wrecking auxiliary equipment and crew went to Bronson immediately after the run-off. None of the train crew was injured.

WOMEN CALLED THE WORST PERJURERS

London, Nov. 25—Women are worse perjurers than men, but both are pretty bad, according to Justice McCarty, widely known as the “bachelor judge” of the High Court and famed for his epigrammatic utterances from the bench.
“Perjury can never be more rife than it is now,” he said. “It is committed in some degree in most of the civil and criminal cases before the courts. The most self-possessed perjurers are murderers, but nothing can exceed the audacious reliance upon their sex which is so frequently displayed by women. If perjury could be stopped, trials in a large majority of all kinds of cases would be incredibly short.”

FLOOD DAMAGE NOT OVER YET
