Bodies of Andree and Companions Back on Their Native Soil

Had Been Concealed by the Snow and Ice of the Arctic for 33 Years—Escorted to the Swedish Hospital by a Detachment of Soldiers—Will Be Transported to Sweden.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

TROMSOE, Norway, Sept. 2—The bodies of Solomon Auguste Andree and his companions were borne back to Scandinavian soil today after thirty-three years in which they were concealed by the vast snow and ice fields of the Arctic.

The bodies, one of which was so nearly obliterated by the long sleep in the north that experts expressed some doubt concerning it, were brought ashore from the Sealer Brattvaag in a coffin-like wooden box covered with a black cloth.

A detachment of Norwegian soldiers escorted the strange procession from the polar regions to the city hospital, where a committee of Swedish and Norwegian physicians examined the bodies and began preparing them for transportation to Sweden, the homeland of the three men who were long hidden behind the mysteries of the Arctic.

NEW SERGEANT IN CHARGE OF LOCAL DISTRICT

Sgt. D. P. Guptill, formerly of Saint John District Takes Over Office Here—Inspector Bird to Other Part of Province.

Sergeant D. P. Guptill, formerly in charge of the Saint John district of the New Brunswick Provincial Police, and stationed at St. Stephen, has been transferred to the Fredericton district, and commenced his duties here today. He is replacing Sergeant John Bird, who recently was promoted to Inspector. Inspector Bird will have no special district, but will take charge in various parts of the province.

A number of other transfers, mostly of minor nature, were made recently in Provincial Police circles.

No arrests have yet been made in the recent Bathurst liquor seizure, though police are on a sharp lookout for suspects, according to information this morning from headquarters here.

The seizure was one of contraband liquor and was made over the past weekend at McLeod's Siding, near Bathurst. A total of 150 gallons of rum, 125 gallons of alcohol, and 18 bottles of assorted liquors were found in an old fish shed. The seizure is the second large one within a week.

PLANE LANDS AT THE JUNCTION

Fredericton Jct., N. B. Sept. 1—Thomas Carr, of St. Thomas, Ont., owner of a De Havilland Moth plane, and Captain Charles Roy of Sydney, N. S., pilot enroute to Sydney N. S. via Saint John, were forced down by a fog and made a good landing on Frank Alexandr's farm at Fredericton Junction at 7.30 p. m. tonight. A large crowd gathered to look at the plane before it was covered for the night.

N. B. WINS MORE HONORS AT THE TORONTO FAIR

Toronto, Aug. 29—Championships were awarded today in the females of the four famous breeds of dairy cattle, the Holstein divisional honors going to New Brunswick, while the Jersey, Guernsey and Ayrshire were won by Ontario exhibitors.

M. L. McCarthy, of Lonsdale Farm, Sussex, N. B., took both grand and senior championships for females with Temple Farm Bell. The junior champion female and reserve were also awarded to Mr. McCarthy with Lonsdale Netherlands Dekol 2nd, and Lonsdale Hartog Star.

Josephine Abbecker Helbon took the reserve in both the senior and grand champion female Holstein for William Jones & Sons, Mount Elgin, Ont.

FRENCH FLIERS ARE MAKING GOOD PROGRESS

Paris, Sept. 1—Far out over the Atlantic Ocean tonight, winging toward America Captain Dieudonne Coste and his flying companion Maurice Bellonte in the famous Question Mark, sped along the lower edge of the Great Circle.

The valiant Frenchmen more with them as they raced through the darkness the hopes of millions of French people who prayed for their success and believed that they would complete without disaster the westward voyage upon which Coli and Nungesser went to their untold fate.

Jayakar, representatives of Mahatma Gandhi. It was understood that Gandhi's delegates who left this morning for Bombay enroute to Poona carried a letter which would announce to Gandhi that their peace negotiations had been without any tangible result.

Old Classmates of Rothesay Collegiate school, which Ronald attended before leaving for Northwestern College, Boston, to take up the study of law, as well as old public school friends were in attendance. Expressions of condolence from all over the province and the eastern states were sent to Mr. and Mrs. P. A. Guthrie, at their home in Charlotte street among them being one from Mayor Jas. Curley of Boston.

The beautiful and numerous floral tributes received were tribute to the respect and regard in which the deceased was held. The pall bearers were made up of former Rothesay classmates and local friends. They were Donald Douglas, William Richards, Joseph Peters, Bill Schofield, Charles Stevenson, Robertson Emerson, Dave Pickard, and Charles Kilburn.

Prayers were held at the house at 1.40 o'clock and services at St. Anne's Parish church at two o'clock by Rev. A. F. Bate, and interment was made in the cemetery at Forest Hill.

WEATHER FINE ALONG COAST OF NEWFOUNDLAND

Scarcely Any Fear for the Safety of French Fliers

WINDS ARE WESTERLY

Some Fog Reported to the East of the Ancient Colony

St. John's, Nfld., Aug. 2—Clear weather and conditions ideal for navigation along the Newfoundland coast favored the French aviators Dieudonne Coste and Maurice Bellonte today as they approached the Continent on their flight from Paris.

There was scarcely any fear for the safety of the fliers. Steamers west of Cape Race reported moderate westerly winds and not enough fog to confuse the airmen. The steamer Far North about 75 miles west of Cape Race on the southern coast of Newfoundland, reported clear weather overhead although there was some fog to the east.

Dodging the Fog

Paris, Sept. 2—The airplane Question Mark bearing Captain Dieudonne Coste and Maurice Bellonte swiftly toward the North American coast swerved sharply to the south today to avoid fog.

The noted French airmen, however, apparently were sailing smoothly along their scientifically laid course from Paris to New York as they neared the mainland. With good luck it appeared they would succeed, in the difficult and often fatal, westward jump across the Atlantic.

CLARENCE BURTT DIED AS RESULT OF ACCIDENT

Clarence Burtt, aged 54, a resident of Burtt's Corner, died in the Victoria Hospital on Saturday night as the result of injuries sustained on Thursday, when he was knocked down and dragged about 20 rods by a pair of angry horses, out of control. The accident occurred on Thursday afternoon, while Mr. Burtt was at work in the fields.

Deceased is survived by his wife, Lottie, and seven children. The funeral was held this afternoon from the late home at which a large number of sorrowful friends gathered to pay a last tribute to the deceased. Interment was made in the cemetery at Burtt's Corner. Telegrams and expressions of sympathy have been extended to the family.

BOLTS STRIKE HOUSE TWICE ON SAME DAY

Lynchburg, Va., Sept. 1—Lightning does strike twice in the same place.

During a thunder storm lightning struck a tree in the yard of M. H. McMahon of this city, traveled on a radio aerial into the house, ripped a lightning arrester to pieces and burned up a radio set worth \$200. A second or two later a bolt struck the house from the opposite side and melted wires in a telephone. Plaster was torn from the walls, but members of the McMahon family were uninjured.

Outlook in Old Country of a More Hopeful Nature

The General Attitude Towards Industrial Depression is Improved—Reports from Various Parts of the Country are of a Very Encouraging Nature.

LONDON, Sept. 2—Indications this week confirm the significant change, which first manifested itself last week, in the general attitude towards industrial depressions. Now instead of the former gloomy outlook, there are signs of a possible improvement in business.

It is very noteworthy that this is not connected with last week's minor stock exchange boom which was founded on unconfirmed political rumors. Reports from various parts of the country telling of works reopening and of improving prosperity in certain industries are giving a most hopeful aspect to industrial conditions in general.

A BIG CROWD AT ST. JOHN EXHIBITION

Saint John, Sept. 2—Labor day has come and gone. It was a day long to be remembered in the annals of the Saint John Exhibition, approximately 20,000 people passing through the turnstiles to view the finest displays and exhibits ever prepared for the annual show, putting aside the worries and cares of daily toil to enjoy the holiday to the fullest. From the oldest to the youngest, rich and poor alike, took advantage of the day resplendent with nature's glorious gifts, sunshine and cool sea breezes, to patronize Saint John's biggest and best fall fair.

M. P. WILL GET A PER DIEM ALLOWANCE

Ottawa, Sept. 1—When the special session of Parliament opens a week from today to deal with unemployment the members, appropriately enough, will be paid on the day labor plan.

The sessional indemnity for members of the Canadian House of Commons is \$4,000, but to receive this, the session must last 51 days. If that minimum is not reached, the members receive \$25 per day.

Various forecasts have been made on the probable length of the special session but all have been far below the 51 day mark. It is practically certain that it will not last that long, which means that the members will not be paid the full sessional indemnity.

The length of the session will be governed by several factors, chief among them being the Government's proposals to relieve unemployment and their reception by the Opposition. The Government headed by Hon. R. B. Bennett, of course, has sufficient numbers to outvote all other groups but there are many ways of dodging a division until such a time as the Opposition desires one.

There have been veiled stories on Parliament Hill that the Government is prepared to resort to a closure if its legislative program meets stout opposition. It has been some years since this has been utilized in Canada although its application has been threatened on more than one recent occasion. Time alone, however, will tell whether this move, on the Government's part will be thought necessary.

HOLIDAY PASSED BY PEACEFULLY

No Unusual Happenings in or Near the Capital City—Accidents Were Few and of Minor Character—Many in St. John.

Labor Day, the holiday which generally gives Maritimers their last taste of summer vacation pleasure came and went and left nothing but pleasure in its path. As far as known there were no serious accidents on the holiday—at least in this locality. Several minor accidents in the nature of car collisions, resulting in damaged fenders were the only black marks against the day's pleasure.

Locally the day was a quiet one, with the only program being special talking pictures at the two local palaces, rounds of golf for the business men, and tennis for the younger and livelier generation.

Crowds of people from here took advantage of the Labor Day holiday to attend the opening of the Saint John Exhibition, which had a banner day. They left here in cars yesterday morning and made the return trip last night. A number of baseball fans attended the baseball game between the Saint John Twilight League team and the Philadelphia Giants, a colored aggregation.

CAT SCRATCH CAUSED DEATH OF YOUNG MAN

Yarmouth, N. S., Spt 1—Edward LeBlanc, aged 21 years, a native of St. Bernard's, Digby County died in the Yarmouth Hospital today. About ten days ago LeBlanc received a severe scratch from a cat on one of the fingers of his right hand. No particular attention was paid to it at the time but in a day or so blood poison developed. About five days ago, he entered the Yarmouth Hospital for treatment, but the case had made such development that little or nothing could be done for him.

The body was taken to his home at St. Bernard's, where the funeral will take place on Wednesday.
