## Rivers in India are on the Rampage and Villages are Flooded

**British Engineers are Working Along the Indus River to Prevent Further Damage—Sixteen Villages are Under Water—Inhabitants Compelled to Flee.**

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

KARACHI, India, July 28—British engineers worked steadily today along the Indus River in the lower Sind to protect Hyderabad, Kotri and other towns from flood waters of the river.

Sixteen villages in the Larkana and Shirkar Pur districts in the upper Sind were flooded when the banks of the Choi branch canal were opened to protect Shirkapur from the rising rivers.

Inhabitants of the outlying districts gathered in the towns and part of Larkana Town was evacuated when the flood waters gained a width of three hundred feet. The refugees there are in the railway station.

Engineers believed the worst of the danger was past in the upper Sind and concentrated their attention to the lower districts.

## 3 KILLED ON PLANE'S LAST TRIP

Mataman, N. Y., July 28—The last trip of the day for a sight seeing airplane resulted in the death of three persons yesterday, the first fatalities since the opening of the new airport. The plane appeared to go out of control at 1,500 feet and went into a tail spin. It crashed into a gully near the port.

## YONKERS, N. Y., COUPLE GREATLY ENJOYED THEIR FISHING TRIP

Mrs. Rogers Battled With A Salmon During An Electrical Storm And Won Out—Proved A Friend To The Kiddies.

Dr. and Mrs. Oscar Rogers, of Yonkers, who stopped over here on Saturday after a very successful trip to Barachois, Quebec, with Raymond Currie, of this city as guide, left yesterday by auto for Topsfield, en route home. The doctor and wife came here on the recommendation of James E. Briggs, a veteran sportsman of New York and Topsfield, who has made a number of fishing trips to New Brunswick, Newfoundland and Quebec in company with Guide Currie. It was their first try for salmon and they succeeded in landing twenty of them during their week's sojourn at Barachois.

Mrs. Rogers had a rather unique experience with one of her fish which she will not be likely to forget in a hurry. It was after eight o'clock in the evening when she hooked it and immediately there came a downpour of rain, accompanied by thunder and lightning. The fish proved to be a real fighter and struggled hard for freedom, but the lady angler finally won out. She was completely drenched on returning to the hotel, but uttered no word of complaint. As she afterwards remarked, "It is all part of the game."

Mrs. Rogers, when not engaged in fishing or watching her husband in action, busied herself distributing candy to the kiddies of the village. She also bought generous supplies of candy, while motoring through New Brunswick and delighted scores of children along the route.

## SYMPATHETIC STRIKE BRINGS TOTAL TO 60,000

Lille, France, July 28—A general strike was agreed upon today by Lille textile workers, in support of the strike of metallurgical workers protesting against the French social assurance laws.

The general strike will bring the total number of workers who have walked out to 60,000.

Several persons were injured and 30 arrested yesterday when demonstrators against the social assurance laws clashed with police at Rouen.

## AMERICANS LEAVE CHINA BY GUNBOAT

Pelung, China, July 28—American residents of Kiukiang and Changsha were evacuated by American Gunboats today before the unimpeded advance of Chinese troops into Hunan and Kiangsi Provinces.

The gunboats Monocacy and Palos were dispatched to the two cities to take out Americans who were said to number 100. They were also attempting to relieve summer vacationists at Kuling before the communists reached there.

## CANADA WILL ELECT 243 M. P.'S. TODAY

**Radio Broadcasts by the Two Federal Leaders from Ottawa Saturday Night.**

Toronto, Ont., July 27—Canada goes tomorrow to the polls. The long, 58-day campaign ended with Dominionwide broadcasts by the Federal party leaders Saturday night, and with final campaigning in Quebec today.

Between 8 A. M. and 6 P. M. Standard Time tomorrow ballots will be cast for the return of 243 members to the next House of Commons. Two—Robert Gardiner, leader of the United Farmers of Alberta, and Henri Bourassa, Independent of Labelle, Quebec,—have been declared by acclamation. They complete the House membership of 245.

In Windsor and Sandwich in Essex West; in East Windsor, Walkerville, Riverside and Tecumseh in Essex East, Ont., electors will have an extra voting hour, and polls will not close there till 7 P. M. Standard Time. The extra hour is granted at these border points for the convenience of voters living in Canada and working in the United States.

To secure a clear majority over all in the next House any one party will need to elect a minimum of 124 members. For the first act of the new House, on assembly, will be to elect a new Speaker who is customarily chosen from the party successful at the polls. Thus 124 would be reduced to 123 or, in a House of 244 (not counting the Speaker) a majority of only two over all other parties and groups combined.

In the last Parliament, Liberals, when they had elected their Speaker, were just one short of a clear majority over all. But their relations with the nine Liberal-Progressives were so close that the Government could always count on a working majority. At dissolution, the standing of parties was: Liberals, 123; Conservatives, 90; Liberal-Progressives, 9; Progressives, 7; Independents, 2; U. F. A., 11; Labor, 3. Total 245.

## AN ELECTION CANARD CAUSES ASTONISHMENT

**No Likelihood of Canadians Being Needed in Egypt**

**STORY IS TOO FANTASTIC**

**The Situation However is Admittedly Very Serious**

London, July 28—London Officials are astonished to hear that capital is being made in the Canadian election campaign of the possibility of British troops being drawn into action in Egypt, the possibility of this is so remote, the British United Press is informed, as to make the idea of any Canadians ever being required fantastic, and while it is admitted that the situation in Egypt is serious, officials do not think the British troops at present in Egypt will be required to intervene. Moreover they would be very surprised if it ever became necessary to despatch others from England in the event of further trouble.

## FOREST FIRE NEAR POKIOK DOES DAMAGE

**Between 15 and 20 Acres Destroyed—Observed Simultaneously From Two Towers—Cause Unknown—Rails Relieve Situation.**

The first forest fire to be reported since July 5th., was observed simultaneously at noon Saturday from the Mount Hope and Doaktown lookouts and traced to the granted lands under the control of the Penobscot Development Co., at Pokioik.

Between 15 and 20 acres were wiped out it was reported this morning. A crew of men are still watching the affected area which is about four miles from the mouth of the Pokioik near the dam at the foot of the headwater.

General rains over the weekend have relieved the hazard, which has grown in tension for some time. Outbreaks traced in origin to the carelessness of blueberry pickers, so prevalent in former years have not yet disturbed officials. The origin of the Pokioik fire is still unknown, although investigation is under way by government officials.

## LEFT WINGER'S RAPE OF MACE COMES TO TOP

London, July 28—John Beckett's "Rape of the Mace" has brought a climax to the difficulties the government is having with the rebellious left wingers. Action will have to be taken against Beckett by the Laborites, because even the Left Wingers are disgusted, and the upshot of it all may be that Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald will find it easier to handle the rebels by showing them what a lack of discipline in the party really means.

### Able to Leave Hospital

Gerald Ashton, young employee of Eaton's Groceries who suffered a severe cut in his hand while cutting bacon in the store last week, has improved greatly, and was able to leave the hospital this afternoon. Stitches had to be taken in the injured member.

## A Serious Crisis May Develop on Turkish Border

**A Tribal Chieftain Met Death at the Hands of Government Troops—Kurds Have Been Making Trouble by Raids on Turkish Territory.**

TESERAN, July 28—A serious crisis threatened to develop on the Turkish frontier today over the killing of the Kurdish tribal chieftain Simtko. Simtko who wields much power among the Kurds was killed by government troops last week. Military reinforcements were dispatched to the Persian Province of Azerbaijan.

The Kurds have been giving much trouble to the Turks recently making raids on Turkish territory, but dispatches from Angora, capital of Turkey said they had been suppressed.

## NOTED CRIMINAL LAWYER TALKS ON WAR DEBT

Toronto, July 26—Canada should not concern itself with preventing liquor being exported to the United States, Clarence Darrow, famous criminal lawyer of the United States and anti-prohibitionist, stated in an interview here today.

"The United States is quite wealthy enough to enforce its own laws," he said. "Why should Canada spend its money when the United States is so much richer and can better afford the expense?"

On the question of War Debts, Mr. Darrow declared that England should never taken onto herself the payment of war debts to the United States.

"We were in the same war," he said, "and we should help to pay for it. If it is not the debt of the United States we should never have been in the war." "I am awfully sorry for England," said Mr. Darrow, "she has backed up the whole expense of the war. Her debts should be cancelled, for she has fought the world's battles."

## R-100 PREPARES FOR CANADA HOP

London, July 28—The R-100 is today only waiting for a favorable wind to begin its long delayed flight to Canada, and the moment that the British Air Ministry received information that conditions over the Atlantic are favorable the huge dirigible will be off.

## COLLEGIANS OF GAY PAREE QUITE HUMAN

Paris July 26—The joyful din of 15,000 students celebrating their successful tiff with the professors of the University of Paris, had hardly died down when the whisper began to be heard that some of the 15,000 candidates for the baccalaureat—about half in fact—had done a little plain and fancy cheating in order to best their instructors.

The whole academic population of Paris is astir, inasmuch as the thing is not supposed ever to have happened before in the annals of the university. There is a good deal of talk about the inevitable "Americanization" angle, and some excited writers on the subject would have it believed that the Yankees are entirely responsible. The Yankees—some 400 of whom are attending the University of Paris—feel otherwise about it.

It seems that about half of the naughty ones knew the subject of their French dissertation about two weeks before it was given out, while the other half was suspiciously familiar with the Latin Version.

M. Charlety, the University's rector, is not sure. He would much prefer to believe that his boys and girls were honest—given to outbursts of savagery at times, but all in good fun. Nevertheless he has ordered a sweeping investigation, and if it develops that reports were correct some of the youngmen and women who so recently won their coveted certificates will have them taken away from them.

### Improved Rink

The management of the Arctic Rink are planning on having one of the most modern and up to date natural ice rinks, next winter. Elaborate are the preparations and improvements on the local rink this summer. Carpenters have been at work for the past month on the interior of the rink, and many innovations have been made, as well as repairs on the old building, so that it looks like a brand new rink. One of the innovations is the erection of bleacher seats at the rear end of the ice surface, which will seat far in excess of what it has formerly. Around the lower floor have been erected box seats giving the appearance of a real arena, and promising the utmost comfort to the fans. About the only thing neglected is a press box. A little more comfort for the scribes might give an incentive for better and truer accounts of the hockey games.
