The Airplane City of Chicago May Make Endurance Record

Flew Over Sky Harbor Today on its Sixteenth Day of Continuous Flight—Must Stay in the Air Until Five O'clock Tomorrow Morning to Equal the Present Record.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

CHICAGO, Ills., June 28—With less than one day left to go for refueling record for sustained flight the endurance airplane City of Chicago flew on over Sky Harbor today on its 16th day of continuous flight.

At 4.40 a. m. C. D. T., the City of Chicago had circled continuously over Sky Harbor airport for 396 hours—or three weeks and two days. To equal the present record of 420 hours the endurance plane must remain in flight until 5.01 A. M. tomorrow.

The Hunters' pooled all of the family funds—\$11,000—to make the endurance record attempt. If they stay aloft until tomorrow morning they stand to make about \$200,000 in royalties and advertising.

MARTICULATION NORMAL EXAMS START TUESDAY

Holiday Will Not Be Observed as it Would Necessitate Too Much Delay in Marking Papers—Custom is First Week in July.

Applications for Superior License Normal School Entrance, Matriculation, and High School Leaving examinations in the province received at the board of Education here a few days ago, show an increase in all four divisions over the totals of 1929.

Normal School entrants this year shows a total of 675, while last year it was only 606 an increase of 69 students. The matriculants have increased from 476 in 1929 to 501 for the present year. High School leaving applicants show an increase of 39 from 125 to 164.

Papers will be written here in the rooms of the Normal School Annex. The date for the opening of the period is fixed as the first Tuesday in July and the rule will be adhered to this year, even though the date set is a holiday, July 1st. Dominion Day. A week's delay would cause a setback in the making of the examination papers, it is thought.

LANDSLIDE PUTS BRAKES TO JAP TRAIN

London, June 28—A railway bearing fifty passengers was buried by a landslide near Yamaguchi, Japan, an exchange telegraph dispatch from Tokio said today. The fate of the passengers was unknown, but 800 workers were put to work immediately to dig the train out.

PREMIER KING CONCLUDES HIS EASTERN TOUR

Sherbrook, Que., June 27—Direct issue with Hon. R. B. Bennett, Leader of the Opposition, was taken by Premier MacKenzie King here tonight.

The Prime Minister denied that the boys and girls of Canada are going to the United States. Instead, he stated "the tide has changed and our people are coming back more and more to this side and going less and less to the other."

He met the complaint of the Conservative leader that Canada is exporting her raw materials, by the positive declaration that Canada exports less of her raw materials to the United States than the Republic exports to Canada. If a country was to export goods it must import them also, he asserted.

"Does Mr. Bennett want us to stop importing cotton and close our cotton factories?" Mr. King asked. "Does he want us to cease importing rubber and close our factories which use rubber?"

LIPTON IS SURE HE WILL WIN RACE

Glasgow, June 28—Sir Thomas Lipton, on his arrival here today, expressed confidence in the ability of his Shamrock V to lift the American's Cup this September in the races of Newport, R. L.

"I think I can manage to wrest the cup from my American friends," said the Irish sportsman. "I have a big secret in store for them, but I am not going to say anything about it until my yacht arrives at Sandy Hook."

Referring to the fact that Charles Francis Adams, now American Secretary of the Navy, had sailed the Resolute to victory over Shamrock IV in 1920, Sir Thomas added:

"He will be competing against me this year again, but I am determined to beat him on this occasion."

THE INSTITUTE CONCLUDES ITS MEETING

Canadian Teachers' Association May Meet in Fredericton Next Year—O. V. Miller Chosen Vice President.

Moncton, June 27—The annual meeting of the Teachers' Institute of New Brunswick concluded here this morning, following the selection of the executive and three addresses. H. H. Trimble, of this city, was selected to represent the Institute on the Senate of the University of New Brunswick, while the members of the executive for the next term are Dr. A. S. McFarlane, Diana Gallant, E. G. Mowatt, W. C. Haines, Gerard DeGrasse, Henrietta Smith, C. T. Wetmore, G. H. Harrison, Mildred Haines and Hazel Alward. The text book committee is composed of Dr. H. H. Hagerman, E. J. Alexander, W. McL. Barker, Amanuda Quinn, C. T. Wetmore, Inspector Donette, Jessie Milligan, Louise Kinghorn, Theodule LeJeune and Ida Parker.

"Education and Citizenship" was the subject of an interesting address at the session today by M. G. Fox, inspector of schools.

Dr. A. S. McFarlane was the final speaker and took as his subject, "Directed and Supervised Study," stressing the importance of the preparation of teachers and stated that the lower grade teachers who have received a license to teach without high school experience could not hope to be as successful as one who had. The discussion on this was led by A. S. Robinson, of Moncton.

W. McL. Barker, principal of Aberdeen High School, Moncton was re-elected president for the next two years, and O. V. Miller, of Fredericton, vice president.

An invitation was extended to the Canadian Teachers' Association to come to New Brunswick next year. If the invitation is accepted, it is likely that the sessions will open here, go to Saint John the following day and conclude in Fredericton.

TEAR BOMBS DISPERSE TEXAS MOB

Beaumont, Texas, June 28—Tear bombs were used to disperse a mob of 400 or 500 men who surrounded the county jail here early today in an attempt to lynch a negro accused of attacking several white women. The mob came from Port Arthur, where the negro, Raney Williams, was arrested yesterday.

The negro was brought here last night by officers who saved him from death by fighting their way through a crowd of men who surrounded the Port Arthur jail soon after his arrest.

SELF CONFESSED MURDERER GOES TO CHAIR

George Williams of Columbus, Ohio, Had Killed Five

POLICEMAN WAS A VICTIM

Confessed That He Figured in Four Hundred Holdups.

Columbus, Ohio, June 28—George Williams, 68, self confessed murderer of five men, died in the electric chair at the Ohio State Penitentiary at 12.14 A. M., today.

Williams shot and killed Policeman Carl Sherman, of Cleveland March 6, 1923, when the latter stopped him on the street to question him. Later Williams admitted having killed a Columbus grocer, two Cleveland fruit dealers, a St. Lawrence grocer and confessed to four hundred holdups.

50 HURT AS REDS RAID FASCISTI

Berlin, June 28—Twelve persons were in a serious condition at hospitals here today from injuries they received when communists attacked Fascists holding a meeting in North Berlin last night.

Fifty persons were injured, but most of them were able to go to their homes. The hall was wrecked during the riot, and police had difficulty in separating the fighters.

WILL OF J. H. CROCKET ADMITTED TO PROBATE

Fredericton newspaper publisher left an estate sworn at \$38,316.28—Bequeathed to his four children.

The will of the late James H. Crocket, Newspaper publisher of this city has been admitted to probate and letters testamentary issued to the two sons and two daughters of the deceased who have been named as executors.

The will is dated September 12th, 1928 and disposes of an estate sworn at \$38,316.28 consisting of personal property and insurance.

The property is bequeathed to the four children of the testator, J. Alexander Crocket, W. Wallace Crocket, Mrs. Elsie M. Trites and Mrs. Beatrice V. Moore, who are also named as executors.

S. S. Gov. Dingley Is in Trouble off The Maine Coast

Eastern Steamship Liner Caught in a Dense Fog and is Lying at Anchor With a Broken Propeller—Was En Route from St. John to Boston—350 Passengers on Board.

BOSTON, Mass., June 28—Minus her propeller, the Steamship Governor Dingley of the Eastern Steamship Line, with three hundred and fifty passengers aboard, was anchored off the Maine coast in a dense fog today while coast guards craft sped to her assistance. Radio messages from the helpless passenger steamer which was enroute from Saint John, N. B. to Boston, indicated that she was in no immediate danger. It was believed by coast guard authorities however that if weather conditions permitted, the passengers would be taken off later today.

BENNETT TO BE AT ST. JOHN MONDAY NIGHT

St. John, June 28—Hon. R. B. Bennett, Dominion leader of the Conservative party, will address a mass meeting in the Capitol Theatre on Monday evening next at 8.15 o'clock. Amplifiers will be installed in King Square in order that those unable to obtain admittance to the theatre will be afforded the opportunity to hear Mr. Bennett and the other speakers. The addressed will also be broadcast over CFBFO in a provincial hook-up with other stations in the province. Accompanied by his sister, Miss Mildred Bennett, Mr. Bennett will arrive in Saint John at Noon Monday and will make his headquarters at the Admiral Beatty Hotel. Hon. R. W. Wigmore will act as chairman of the meeting. There will be an informal reception for Hon. Mr. Bennett and Miss Bennett at the Admiral Beatty Hotel on Monday afternoon.

MLAREN AND BELL AGAIN IN THE FIELD

St. John, June 28—Thomas Bell, M.P., and Dr. Murray MacLaren, M.P., were unanimously nominated candidates for the constituency of Saint John-Albert in the coming Federal election campaign at a convention of Liberal-Conservatives from the two counties, held last night in the Pythian Castle. Frank Lewis was chairman.

Dr. MacLaren was nominated by W. H. Harrison, K. C. M. L. A., and Mr. Bell by Commissioner R. W. Wigmore. Mr. Bell was absent from the meeting, being called to Ottawa the previous night. A letter of appreciation in event of his name coming up for nomination was sent to Commissioner Wigmore by Mr. Bell and read at the meeting.

Late Ian Milne

The funeral of the late Ian Milne, 21-year-old Scotch youth, who was tragically drowned at Barker's Point on Thursday night, will not take place on Sunday as was mistakenly reported in the Mail on Friday. The time of burial is still undecided as it will probably depend on what day the wife of the deceased arrives here. She is on her way at present to this city, still unaware of her young husband's death.

THE PROPOSED MINTO PLANT CONSIDERED

Meeting of Hydro Electric Commission Held Meeting at St. John Yesterday.

St. John June 28—Details of a steam power plant in the Minto coal field area, were discussed at both the morning and afternoon sessions of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission in meeting here yesterday. Professor John Stephens, of the University of New Brunswick, Fredericton, was present in an advisory capacity, while the members of the board present consisted of the chairman, Hon. E. A. Reilly, K. C., Moncton; A. D. Ganong, St. Stephen; J. D. Robidoux Shediac; in addition to the chief engineer of the commission, S. R. Weston.

The report was made up under four heads: The advisability of employing consulting engineers during the construction of the building and installation of the equipment; the proper designing of the plant and transmission lines to Fredericton and the hook-up with the Canadian Cottons, Ltd., at Marysville; calling for tenders from local contractors for the excavation and construction of the buildings; calling for tenders for the major items of equipment, and the assembling and installation of the machinery under the supervision of engineers competent in their class of work.

The cost of the plant, the transmission lines and the installation of the equipment and the length of time necessary to get the plan in operation were also discussed.

U. S. MARINES KILLED IN NICARAGUA

Mexico City, June 28—The newspaper Grafico published a dispatch from Managua, Nicaragua, yesterday claiming that several marines were killed in popular demonstrations against the government of President Jose Maria Moncada.

The date of the occurrence was not given but the newspaper said its dispatches was delayed several days by a censor.
