Casualties in Hindu Moslem Riots are Reported as Heavy

Eighteen Were Killed During Three Days of Rioting and Three Hundred Injured—The Police in an Effort to Restore Order Arrested Three Hundred.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

SHANGHAI, China, Aug. 6—Two hundred bandits and an equal number of farmers and merchants were killed when the former made a raid upon the village of Wuyuansien in the southern section of Amhwep Province, according to dispatches received here today. The bandits numbering about 450 attacked without warning.

Action Called For

London, Aug. 6—The Chinese National Government was urged by the British Government today to act immediately to secure release of women missionaries held in China by bandits.

To Picket Clothes Shops

Bombay, India, Aug. 6—The congress leaders today sent six hundred pickets including many women to start intensive picketing of foreign clothes shops in the Indian quarter of Bombay. Police did not interfere.

At 5.00 a lawn party will be held at the Countess of Ashburnham's to which members of the St. John and local boat clubs are invited.

True Name Disclosed

Police here gave out today that the man who gave his name as William Myberg, when he was arrested two nights ago, with three others from Saint John charged with breaking and entering, has confessed that his real name is William Finley. The other three who were arrested on the charge of breaking into the O'Dell place, were Mrs. Helen Myberg, John Carr and May Anderson. The four appeared this morning before Magistrate Limerick and were discharged. The charge was not pressed.

Assumes New Duties

Mr. Corcoran was formerly general agent in the steamship passenger department, and his duties kept him stationed most of the time in Quebec and Halifax.

KING GEORGE EYE WITNESS OF A COLLISION

WILL TRY TO BREAK ALL THE SPEED RECORDS

Roosevelt Field, N. Y., Aug. 6—Captain Frank M. Hawkes left here at 5 a.m. E. S. T. today for Los Angeles in an attempt to break all existing speed records from coast to coast.

The present transcontinental speed record is held by Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindberg, who flew from Los Angeles to New York last Easter with one stop in 14 hours and 21 minutes.

THE PRINCE TO VISIT BRAZIL

BURNT HILL IS FAVORED FOR NATIONAL PARK

Woodstock, August 5—The Burnt Hill district, 23 miles from the forks of the Miramichi, is under consideration as a site for a national park. Dr. G. F. Clark told the Town Council at their meeting here last night. Dr. Clark said that an area about 10 miles square was under consideration. It was hoped that the area would take in Miramichi Lake and McKiel Brook. Fishing and hunting in the locality was excellent.

R. W. Maxwell, secretary of the Woodstock Board of Trade, said that the Mount Carleton site had previously been favored, but it was thought that the expense of development there would be very great. Mr. Harkins, of the Dominion Parks Commission, would be in the province about the middle of the month. It was hoped to have him look over the Burnt Hill site. He suggested that the Council agree to look after the expenses of the trip there.

Dr. N. P. Grant said that a park at Burnt Hill would be an immense advantage to Woodstock, which would be a national gateway to it.

Councillor Ridley remarked that the Burnt Hill site had the advantage that already there was a very fair road from Juniper leading to within a few miles of it.

STRAY BALLOON HAS SCIENTISTS BADLY PUZZLED

Albany, Aug. 6—For several days meteorologists and scientists were puzzled over an object which was sighted in the heavens about seven or eight miles high. After the discovery was chronicled in the newspapers an anonymous letter was received at the Albany airport weather station. Enclosed was a newspaper clipping which told of the loss of a big advertising balloon which escaped from the roof of a Pittsfield, Mass., store. It is believed the object sighted was the lost balloon.

PROFESSIONAL BASEBALL NOT SUCCESSFUL

Professional baseball, when played in New Brunswick cities has proved unsuccessful from a financial point of view. The backers of professional baseball in this city have always made a heavy loss.

St. John is trying it again this season as a member of the New England Two-Light League. Word from that city is that the promoters stand to lose a lot of money.

Liquor And Gas

Two local men are in the city lockup today, as result of too much mixing of gas and liquor last evening in a motor boat ride, which had disastrous results for them. The two when taken from the boat by authorities were charged with an infringement of the Intoxicating Liquor Act and appeared this afternoon before the police magistrate. Their "whoopie party" was thus terminated sadly and today they are bemoaning the ill fates of a stalled motor, which blew them into the arms of the law.

DESTITUTE BRITISHERS HOMESICK

Hundreds in New York Looking for Chance to Stowaway

ALL SHIPS ARE BEING SEARCHED

Police at All British Ports Have Been Notified

London, Aug. 6—The police at all British ports have been informed by the New York authorities that hundreds of destitute Britishers are hiding there waiting for a chance to stowaway on homebound liners, according to the Daily Herald today. Announcement was made in open court at Southampton to this effect and at all ports where trans-Atlantic ships call special vigilance measures are being taken to arrest stowaways while all ships out of New York are being searched for them.

Chinese Bandits Made an Attack Without Warning

Raided the Village of Wuyuansien in Anhwep Province—Two Hundred Were Killed Along with an Equal Number of Farmers and Merchants.

LONDON, Aug. 6—Heavy casualties at Sukkur, in the Sind, and at Balia United Provinces, India, during communal and independence campaign riots were inflicted in dispatches received here today. Eighteen were killed at Sukkur during three days of communal riots growing out of a dispute Sunday between Hindus and Moslems. Karcachie despatches to the British United Press and the London Daily Herald said. Three hundred were injured a number of them seriously. Two hundred were arrested as police sought to restore order.

Meeting Was Stormed

Calcutta, India, Aug. 6—A group of 400 youths stormed the meeting of the Calcutta Corporation city administration today and attacked the councillors who were routed and prevented from selecting a new mayor.

MR. TOMPKINS TO PAY VISIT TO NEWFOUNDLAND

AVERS WOMEN GET BAD DEAL

Washington, D. C. August 6—It's harder for a woman to get a job than it is for a man. A woman has to be better than a man at the same job to break even. Women get the less attractive, less well-paid jobs. There's a prejudice against women workers, not only among employers and co-workers but among women as a mass.

This is what Mary Anderson, chief of the United States Woman's Bureau, finds after years of study of the situation of the woman worker whether she be in industry or in professional life.

Considering the feeling of women themselves against the woman worker, Miss Anderson thinks that it will be harder to deal with than matters of equal wages or open examinations. It is a fact that women do not easily employ a woman doctor or a woman lawyer.

SUMMER HOME WAS DESTROYED OVER NORTH

Campbellton, August 5—The summer residence of James W. Sansom, built in 1926 at a cost of approximately \$12,000, was totally destroyed with the contents at an early hour this morning. It is thought smouldering embers from an open fireplace ignited the floor of the living room, the flames spreading quickly to the walls.

The scene of the fire is about 12 miles east of this town, on the banks of the Restigouche river. The owner of the property and his family and guests were occupying the dwelling at the time and barely escaped with their lives, having time only to make their hurried exit, pajama-clad. It was said today the insurance carried covered about one-quarter of the damage.

WILL TRY TO OVERTHROW U. S. OIL TRUST

Wellington, N. Z. Aug. 6—A proposal by which the New Zealand Government would attempt to overthrow the American trust control of the New Zealand gasoline and lubricating oil market was before Parliament today. The proposal was that the government enter into an agreement with a British oil firm to form a monopoly in this country's markets as competition to American interests.
