

Brazilian Federal Troops Take Four Towns from Rebels

Communique Issued by the Minister of Justice Reports Successes for Federal Troops — Towns Occupied are Motto Santo, Tronqueiras and Bon Successo.

RIO DE JANEIRO, Oct. 18—Federal occupation of four towns in Minas Geraes state were reported today in a communique issued by the Minister of Justice.

The Federals, the communique said, took Muzambitso, Motte Santo, Tronqueiras and Bon Successo the rebels making a hasty and disorderly retreat.

MODERN SNAILS ARE LIKE THOSE OF STONE AGE

Urbana, Illinois, Oct. 18—Snails that form one of today's table delicacies are just the same kind of snails that existed about 40,000 years ago, according to Dr. Frank C. Baker, curator of the University of Illinois Museum.

Dr. Baker has just completed a study of snails sent to him from Algeria that were found embedded in rock of the stone age period. He said that the snail rings and other characteristics were the same as those of today.

PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT HELD MEETING

Action Taken in Regard to the Unemployment Problem — Statement Issued by Premier Baxter.

The Provincial Government met here last evening and again this morning and transacted considerable business, mostly having to do with the unemployment situation. The meeting adjourned at one o'clock and this afternoon Premier Baxter and his Cabinet attended the unveiling of a cairn in Forest Hill Cemetery in honor of the late Bliss Carman, Canadian poet.

Statement Issued

In a statement given out following the meeting last night, the Premier said:

"The Government has decided that works are to be undertaken, not for the purpose of giving continuous employment, but to provide some work for a time to time for those who would otherwise suffer but for such help.

"Assistance to municipal undertakings will be considered, in each case, on their respective merits and to the extent that extraordinary conditions of unemployment will be relieved thereby.

"Any work undertaken for the above purposes should be limited to localities where unemployment exceeds its normal proportions. This should be established by declarations from reliable persons in each locality, occupying positions of authority and familiar with actual conditions.

"The classes of work most imperative to construction are:

"(1) Elimination of dangerous railway crossings.

"(2) Rock work and other kinds of a permanent character on highways.

"(3) Skirting of roads and such other descriptions of road work as will not cost substantially more than their value performed in the winter season."

He stated that it is incumbent upon Canadian manufacturers and business men that they send representatives to the West Indies to make a study of the situation and cultivate the trade, thus taking advantage of the opportunity now presenting itself in the view of the favorable sentiment towards Canada of greatly increasing the trade between the two countries.

Flight Lieut Hill Came to Grief on Island of Timor

Was Trying to Break the Record of Bert Hinkler on an England-to-Australia Flight—Plane Was Damaged But the Flier Escaped Uninjured.

MELBOURNE, Australia, Oct. 18—Flight Lieut. C. W. Hill, who is attempting to break Bert Hinkler's England-to-Australia flight record of fifteen days, twelve hours, crashed between Koepang and Atamboea on the Island of Timor, Dutch East Indies, according to word received here today. The flier was uninjured but his plane was damaged. Hill was flying from Sourabaya, on the Island of Java to Port Darwin, Australia and expected to break Hinkler's record by several days. No details of the cause of the crash were received here.

Each week at this hour Canadian and United States networks carry this programme to 29 radio stations covering a population area of 70,000,000 people.
