A Political Crisis Is Now Threatened In the Old Country

Unwillingness of the Labor Government to Allow the Conservatives and Liberals to be Represented At the Indian Conference Has Provoked a Serious Situation.

LONDON, July 15—The government's unwillingness to consent to the demand of the Conservatives and Liberals that they should be represented at the forthcoming Indian round table conference has brought a serious situation that is threatening to become a crisis. The Conservatives and Liberals argue that as all the Indian political parties will be represented at the conference, they should also be represented.

Troops in Egypt

London, July 15—Great Britain has approximately 9,800 troops stationed in Egypt, Tom Shaw War Secretary told a questioner in the House of Commons today.

HINDENBURG REFUSES TO CELEBRATE

Berlin, July 15—Efforts of Prussia to break up the steel helmet organization of war veterans in the Rhineland were vigorously opposed by President Paul Von Hindenberg today in a letter to Otto Braun, Premier of Prussia.

Von Hindenberg refused to participate in celebrations of the freeing of Prussian territory in the Rhineland from Allied occupation, scheduled for Coblenz, Treves, Ail-La-Chappelle and Wiesbaden from Next Sunday to Wednesday.

RIOTING HAS BROKEN OUT AT ALEXANDRIA

Alexandria, Egypt, July 15—Grave rioting broke out here today. Mobs surged through the streets, burning motor trucks and committing other acts of violence.

Europeans took refuge in the house. British troops were summoned. Numerous fatalities were reported, as the rioting continued.

MOUNTAINEERS FIND AVIATOR

Woodford, Vt., July 15—Men who had been searching the mountains in this vicinity during the night straggled back toward Bennington today with reports that Frank Goldsborough, 19-year-old aviator who was trapped in the woods in a wrecked aeroplane, had been found.

An ambulance, it was said, had been dispatched to bring the young flier to Bennington hospital.

A HEAVY MAN PASSES AWAY

Copenhagen, Denmark, July 15—Carl Jensen, thirty three, who weighed 485 pounds and claimed to be the world's heaviest man died today at Holbaek.

THE PEAK OF TOURIST TRADE NOT REACHED

Ottawa, July 15—While the United States tourists spend close to \$300,000,000 annually in Canada, this country's tourist expenditures in the United States are by far the greater, on a per capita basis.

During 1929 Canadian tourists spent \$91,000,000 across the border, a Canadian expenditure of \$9.10 per capita. The per capita expenditure of the United States through tourist activity amounts only to \$2.33 per capita.

It is believed here that the right methods of fostering the tourist traffic to Canada—good roads and more accommodation, would swell the United States per capita expenditures to the same high proportions as the Canadian per capita expenditures in the United States.

If the United States expenditures on tourist activity in Canada reached the Canadian figure of \$9.10 per capita the total value of the trade to Canada would be \$1,137,500,000 annually.

TEN WOMAN CANDIDATES IN THE FIELD

Ottawa, Ont., July 15—Women have enjoyed the franchise in Dominion affairs since 1917, though it was not until 1921 that the unrestricted franchise was given them. Still that is eleven years ago.

Add to that fact, which is that women represent some 56 per cent of the voting strength of Canada at the polls on July 28.

Then consider that in all the 245 electoral divisions of Canada not a woman has been given a nomination by either of the chief parties in a "safe seat."

Miss McPhail, who has sat in the House since 1921, is a Progressive and even she is up against a Conservative candidate.

Half the seats in Canada are reasonably safe for one party or the other. That is, nomination is about tantamount to election. Both parties are pleading strongly for the votes of women but, obviously there has been no real concern on the part of the constituency organizations to see them in Parliament.

SIR HENRY TO PAY A VISIT TO ALASKA

Vancouver, B. C., July 15—On his first visit to Alaska, Sir Henry W. Thornton, Chairman and President of the Canadian National Railways, will sail North from Vancouver on the new Canadian National Steamship "Prince Henry" Thursday. Sir Henry, accompanied by Lady Thornton and several executives officers of the company arrived in Vancouver, Sunday evening after making a short stay at Jasper Park Lodge. On Wednesday Sir Henry will visit Victoria. When the "Prince Henry" reaches Skagway, the party will be conveyed to Whitehorse, Y. L., in a special train provided by the White Pass and Yukon railway, coming down in time to make the return voyage on the steamer and disembarking at Prince Rupert for the east bound trip. The railway president was delighted with his stay at Jasper and expressed himself as greatly pleased with the enlargements and improvements made this season to the Lodge.

WILL "HOUSE OF CARDS" COLLAPSE

St. Louis, July 15—There will be no more house building by the St. Louis National League team this season. Sink or swim, the team will go as is unless the boys pull up to within hailing distance of the pennant contenders, and then a call may be sent to the minors for players.

But the St. Louis chain farm system is not built as a feeder to the big noise in St. Louis. It happens that some of the minor league franchises owned by the St. Louis team pay nice dividends, notably Rochester, and it would be suicide for the club to take a player like Eddie Delker, for instance, and send a man to Rochester who would not be able to hold down the shortstop position as well as Delker. He is booked to return to the Cards next season as a third baseman.

BEAUTIES FEAR GAIN IN WEIGHT

Paris, July 15—Eight European beauty queens sailed this week aboard the steamship Niagara from Cherbourg to enter the Galveston beauty contest. They were the selections of France, Germany, Turkey, Rumanian, England, Hungary, Russia and Belgium.

The Niagara will take the eight young women to Galveston after a month's voyage. They protested the circuitous route via the Canary Islands, saying they were certain to gain weight during the long period on the sea, and therefore would be at a disadvantage in the beauty contest.

Sandino Claims Heavy Victory for the Rebels

COURIER TAKES NEWS TO MEXICO

Nicaraguan Police Also Are Bested in Scrap

Mexico City, July 15—Heavy casualties among United States marines and Nicaraguan constabulary were claimed by General Augustino Sandino, leader of the Nicaraguan rebels in a statement released here last night by his Mexico City representatives.

The statement was signed by Pedro Zepeda, who is handling Sandino's affairs in Mexico. Zepeda claimed a courier had reached him from Sandino bearing the information contained in the statement.

WESTERN CROP CONDITIONS SEEM TO VARY

Ottawa, July 15—Prairie growing conditions for 1930 vary considerable, according to the latest reports from the Department of Commerce. Reports indicate that the recovery from the effects of the high winds has not been uniform.

Although moisture is abundant and progress is generally satisfactory in Northern Alberta, the injury in that province attributed to soil drifting and insect pests is slightly above the average. Eastern Saskatchewan conditions are promising but the province has some badly blown areas across Regina, Moose Jaw and adjoining districts. Conditions of all crops in Manitoba are below average due to frost and wind, but the bulk of the crop has progressed normally. The height of wheat over the whole west averages from 6 to 8 inches.

A LARGE FUNERAL

George F. Goan, 22-year old victim of shotgun charge on Sunday Buried this morning at Oromocto—Counties of Sunbury and York Well represented at funeral—Beautiful floral tributes—Many present from this city.

The funeral of George Goan, 22-year-old son of ex-Sheriff James W. Goan, Burton, who was killed by a charge fired from a shotgun in the hands of Donald Kimball, 14, of Oromocto on Sunday night, was held this morning from the late home, and was one of the largest seen in a number of years. People from all over the counties of York and Sunbury, sympathizers with the bereft family on the tragic and terrible death of their son, were present to pay respect.

The floral tributes were very numerous and came from all parts of the province. A large number from here was present at the funeral ceremonies. Service was held from the St. Vincent de Paul church at Oromocto with High Mass of Requiem at 10 a.m. conducted by Rev. Father Allen. In testament was made in the cemetery adjoining. E. Douglas Terry, of the Adams & Terry funeral directors, was in charge of the proceedings. The pall bearers were F. F. McElroy, Thomas Banks, Harry Hilary, Tristan McFadden, Lawrence McMonigal, and Vincent McFarlane. The chief mourners were as follows: James W. Goan, Emmett Goan, Arthur Goan, Frederick Goan and Frank Capen.

Racial War Now Threatened in an Oklahoma Area

Negroes Are Fleeing in Terror Where Rumors of Strife Are on Foot—Disturbed Officials Have Called the Authorities of the State for Help—Troops Held in Readiness.

ERICK, Okla., July 15—Groups of negroes tramped and rode over highways around Erick today, fleeing in terror from an area in which were rumors of impending racial war. An uneasiness which was believed a prelude to violence was apparent throughout Beckham County, in which Erick is located, and in Collingsworth and Wheeler counties, just across the Texas border.

Disturbed officials called upon their state superiors for aid and troops were held in readiness at Oklahoma City. Texas Rangers already had been sent to the troubled sector in that state.

WATER SPORTS WILL DRAW A LARGE NUMBER

Everything is in full swing for the afternoon and evening of July 22nd, the day of the A. & B. water sports. Rear Admiral Miller is commander of the Royal Kennebecasis Yacht Squadron and his fleet of some 30 vessels will hoist anchor at Saint John on the 19th inst., and expect to drop anchor at the A. & B. Club waters on Tuesday morning the 22nd, and then will dress the vessels and make preparations with the A. & B. Club officers for the big regatta. About 40 silver cups are on the way from the silversmiths and will be displayed in the windows of various stores in the city. The swimming, diving, and canoe racing will take place in the afternoon while the sculling, motor boat and the sea sled racing will be in the evening. The band concert will also start at 8.30 o'clock and dancing in the club house at nine o'clock.

The Countess of Ashburnham is offering a beautiful silver cup for the fastest boy swimmer while Messrs. Jas. S. Neill & Sons are offering a very fine silver cup for the fastest lady canoeist at the regatta. Kenneth Holder will have keen competition this year from H. W. Irvine. Young Irvine has the same kind of a stroke as that one time great oarsman of Saint John "Belyea". Mr. Belyea will probably attend the regatta and give the boys a few pointers.

The Red Devil and also the Sea Horse both sea sleds are planning on retaining their cups won here last year. The sleds are among the speediest boats in the Maritimes at times attaining a speed of 50 miles per hour. If the weather is ideal on the 22nd. It is generally estimated that upwards of 10,000 people will witness the regatta.

Oslo, Norway, July 15—Norway, with its 2,700,000 inhabitants, has become the fifth greatest mercantile shipping nation in the world. Before the war this country ranked eighth. Since then it has added 1,000,000 tons to its fleet and in the last year has passed France, Holland, and Italy.

E. J. Dunn, city editor of The Boston Post, one of the best known newspapermen in the New England States, arrived yesterday from Boston and left last evening by C. N. R. for Half-Moon Cove, where he will start a canoe trip down the Southwest Miramichi river and enjoy salmon fishing for the next ten days. Tomorrow he will join a party of Boston Post people, including Clifford R. Davis, advertising specialist, and Mrs. Davis and Miss Lucille Ripley, of the art department, and her father, who left Fredericton last week to make the trip as guests of William T. Griffin, president and members of the New Brunswick Guides' Association, who were in Boston the last two winters attending sportsmen's shows and entertainments.
