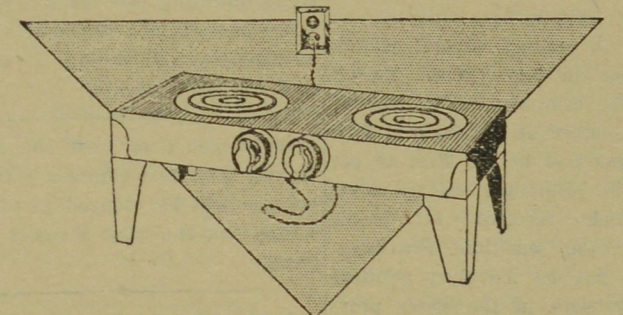
ON DEFEAT OF N. B. LIBERALS

(The Gazette, Montreal, Editorial.) gathered in a fat harvest. The A significant feature of the New Brunswick elections was the defeat of the leader of the Liberal Party, Wendall P. Jones, who made his main onslaught on government control of liquor and who promised to hold a plebiscite on the whole liquor question if elected to office. Mr. Jones charged the Baxter administration with inefficiency in control and lack of good intention. The Conservatives replied that while the Control Act was not perfect, it was a vast improvement over the brand of prohibition that it superceded, and they asked electors to give the act a chance. (The voters have done so and Mr. Jones is without a seat in the Assembly.

Prohibition was adopted by the Legislature in 1916, when Mr. Clarke was Premier and Mr. Baxter, Attorney-General, in the stress of the war days when Canadians wished to bend every effort towards an Allied victory. The act went into effect May 1, 1917, shortly after the defeat of the Murray Government. In the same year the Foster Government took office. It was their duty to enforce prohibition, but their best efforts were unavailing and prohibition became a scandal, while the bootleggers became an army that

of people and there was no noticeable support for it. Customs officials were vigilant and Dominion, county and municipal police sought in vain to suppress the illicit traffic. In 1927, the Baxter Government followed the example of other provinces and established liquor control by government. Under it, conditions became much better and the act has been accepted as a reasonable success by the citizens generally. The two years of control show up well compared with the ten years' failure of prohibition. On May 31, last, New Brunswick, with a population of 419,000, as estimated, had 33 Liquor Act, whereas Prince Edward Island, under prohibition, with 90,000 population, had 70. These are some of the main facts that the Baxter forces presented in reply to the attacks of Wendall P. Jones, the Liberal Leader. The electors have passed judgement and no plebiscite is required. Mr. Jones's fate recalls the experience of Mr. W. E. N. Sinclair, in the last Ontario elections when he followed a course similar to that of the New Brunswick Liberal Leader. The lesson is that prohibition is not a winning political battle cry in Canada today.

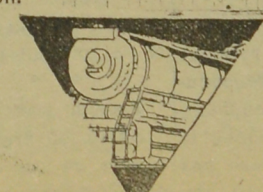
