German Socialist Leader in a Scrap of Paper Statement

Adolph Hitler Tells Federal Court That He Will Employ Legal Means to Evade the Fulfillment of International Treaties by Germany—Tells of German Methods During the War.

LEIPZIG, GERMANY, Sept. 25—Adolph Hitler, leader of the National Socialist (Fascist) party, told the federal court today that if he came into power in Germany, he would employ every means, including illegal ones, to evade the fulfillment of international treaties by Germany.

A Startling Admission

The Hague, Holland, Sept. 25—German agents poisoned horses and mules bought by the allies in the United States during America's neutrality in the world war, and tried to destroy allied ships and stocks in American territory. Dr. Karl Von Lewinski, chief German counsel before the German-American mixed claims commission admitted today.

The commission is considering claims totalling approximately \$40,000,000 for the destruction of two munition plants.

MAYOR SALTER'S IMPRESSION OF BOSTON

Plenty of Liquor at Every Public Function—Easy to Grow Colonels Across the Line.

Boston, Mass., Sept. 24—His Worship, Mayor Reuben Salter of Boston, Eng., who was the city's guest at Tercentenary exercises, doesn't form his opinions of a community simply because he has been hailed a popular idol.

Asked for a statement on his impressions of Boston after a week of unprecedented feting, here are a few of the Briton's startling revelations:

"There was plenty of liquor at every public function, leading to the conclusion that prohibition in the United States is a 'farce.'"

"New Englanders like pomp and parade, delighting to beat the big drum and watch the fireworks go up."

Undue oratory reigns at banquets. Most everyone is called to talk, and invariably the announcer is the worst speaker of the lot. He must always chip in with a wordy introduction of each speaker, giving his life's history back to Adam, and attributing to him qualities that are only to be found in Heaven itself."

"Americans are noted as hustlers, but there's a question as to whether they get to their journey's end quicker than the more sedate Englishman."

"We think in England that our country is unrivaled and I have not yet seen much to compare with it in any other country."

"My word, how you can grow Colonels in America!"

And this form "Jim Hurley, Boston's fiery mayor, as the representative from Old Boston pulled out of the South station—"May we meet again in your country, where men are men." "If you do we'll give you a pub," was the shouted rejoinder.

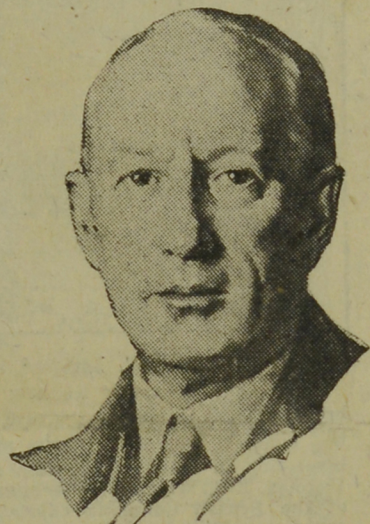

PRESIDENTS OF BIG BANKS ARE OPTIMISTIC

They Look for a Revival of Business But Think it Will be Gradual.

Victoria, B. C. Sept. 24—"We have reached bottom and are at the turn," Sir Herbert Holt, president of the Royal Bank of Canada said here today in commenting on conditions in Canada.

"There is no stringency of money in the country," commented Sir Charles

Gordon president of the Bank of Montreal, another Canadian financier visiting here.

"The trade of the country has suffered a setback, due in some measure to the low price of commodities, but there is a better feeling now," Sir Charles added.

"The revival is coming, but it will be gradual," he continued. "There is plenty of money in the country for the business being done and we are always ready to advance loans for legitimate commercial enterprise."

This year's crop which has been estimated at 400,000,000 bushels, is better than had been expected, Sir Charles commented.

"There should be a permanent improvement in the volume of business done by the manufacturers of the country," he said when questioned concerning new tariff.

MANY CHINKS DYING FROM PNEUMONIA

Peiping, Sept. 25—Hundreds of Chinese are dying of pneumonia and bubonic in the northern part of Shen-Si Province in epidemics which may endanger all North China. Dr. Elmer Galt, an American physician, reported today.

Entire villages have been wiped out. Dr. Galt said. Thousands of residents of Shen-Si have fled across the borders of the neighboring Shan-Si province he reported.

Dark Weather

The capital is in the throes of a cold fall temperature. Falling leaves, which are turning to the color of brown and yellow, portend the advance of the colder weather. Within the past several weeks, the weather has been decidedly fall-like with temperatures of 30 to 40 above zero being quite common.

MANY KILLED AND INJURED BY AN EARTHQUAKE

Seven Villages in Russia Destroyed on September 23rd.

MANY PEOPLE ARE HELPLESS

Most Severe Damage in the Dubeda Yangbazar Region.

Moscow, Sept. 25—At least 175 persons were killed and more than three hundred injured in an earthquake that destroyed seven villages near Stalin Abad on Sept. 23, it was revealed today.

Twelve hundred persons were reported helpless. The most severe damage was done on the outskirts of the Dubeda Yangbazar region. Further details had not been received here today.

AFGHAN GIRLS TOSS AWAY THE LIPSTICKS

Peshawar, India, Sept. 25—Remnants of Amanullah's attempt to modernize Afghanistan, 18 unveiled Afghan girls traded their smart European frocks for native costumes here.

They had been sent to Turkey late in 1928 by Amanullah for training as physicians, nurses and chemists and passed through here on their way back to Kabul, the Afghanistan capital, to take up life as it was in the days before Amanullah's first trip to Europe.

It is understood that the young women were recalled by King Nadir Shah through pressure put on the government by the orthodox who are against the Europeanization of girls' education.

This was one of the chief causes of Amanullah's unpopularity which led to his downfall.

At the frontier the girls, who had been wearing European clothing nearly two years, were met by relatives who had brought with them bundles of native costumes.

Without a murmur the travellers cast aside their modern skirts and high-heeled shoes and slipped again into the Afghan attire they had known from childhood.

And at the border line the girls threw away their lipsticks and powder puffs and agreed that the old garments were quite comfortable, after all.

NEW GOVERNOR FOR THE BANK OF FRANCE

Paris, Sept. 25—Clement Moret, will succeed Emile Moreau, as governor of the Bank of France today, the government has decided. Moreau will officially hand his resignation to Minister of Finance Paul Reynaud at 3.30 P. M. after which the promotion of Moret from first under governor to Governor will be announced.

Old Country Shoe Makers Sore on Hon. Mr. Bennett

Manchester Guardian Says Mingled Amusement and Anger Has Been Aroused Over Premier Bennett's Statement That Cheap Labor Shoes Have Been Dumped Into Canada—Disgruntled Over Boost in Duty.

LONDON, Sept. 25—Northampton is very sore at Hon. R. B. Bennett. What the Manchester Guardian calls "mingled amusement and anger" has been aroused by the Canadian Prime Minister's statement that boots manufactured by cheap labor in Northampton are dumped into Canada.

The local manufacturers are already disgruntled at the increase in the Canadian tariff, and the excuse that they dumped boots into the Canadian market is bitterly resented. "Stupid", "idiotic", "based on sheer ignorance" are some of the mildest terms the Northampton manufacturers have applied to the new tariff.

MUGS WERE USED AS PHONES IN PRISON BREAK

London, Sept. 25—James Turner, who escaped from Wandsworth Prison recently, and his accomplice a man named Sparks, who failed in the attempt, laid their plans in unusual fashion. They were in adjoining cells and made their plans by using their enameled mugs as a kind of telephone.

One would talk into his mug, placed against the cell wall, while the other would listen with his mug against his ear like a telephone receiver. The magnifies sound, it was found.

Another of their devices was to fill their washing bowls with water and place them on the floor, of the cells when they were carrying on a conversation. These water bowls provided a warning of the approach of a warden, for the water would ripple when a warden entered the steel-floored corridor outside the cells.

48 PERSONS WERE EXECUTED AT MOSCOW

Moscow, Sept. 25—The execution of 48 persons "for counter revolutionary work in the population's food supplies" was announced by the secret political police today.

The persons executed were accused of attempting to manipulate food supplies to create popular discontent with the Soviet regime.

The announcement of the executions was part of the disclosure of the activity of counter-revolutionary organizations, the police said.

KELLOGG WAS ELECTED ON THE FIRST BALLOT

Geneva, Sept. 25—Frank B. Kellogg, former Secretary of State of the United States and Author of the Kellogg peace pact, was elected a judge in the world court succeeding to the unexpired term of Charles Evans Hughes, on the first ballot by the League of Nations Assembly today.
