Liberals May Join With Labor to Put an End to Unemployment

A New Spirit of Optimism Prevails in Old Country Following a Conference Between Premier Ramsay MacDonald and Lloyd George—A Rational Agreement Expected Shortly.

LONDON, Aug. 28—The minor stock exchange boom continued today. It is due apparently to a new spirit of optimism in financial circles, based upon rumors of an alliance between the Labor government and the Liberals to conquer unemployment. The conversations between Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald and Right Hon. David Lloyd George were secret, but it is understood that their discussion was frank and very friendly and suggested that "some sort of rational agreement" between Labor and the Liberals will emerge shortly.

Heat Wave Hits Europe

London, Aug. 28—Europe was enveloped today by a wave of stifling heat from the burning plains of Africa, sending temperatures many cities to their highest marks in seven years, and causing at least 14 deaths in Great Britain.

POLICE GUARD RESIDENCE OF PRESIDENT

Buenos Aires, Aug. 28—Additional police guards were established at the government palace and near Hipolito Irigoyen's residence today ostensibly owing to an announcement that 3,000 employees of the Union Telefonica would immediately begin a 24-hour strike. No complete explanation of the stringent precautions was made and considerable public curiosity was aroused. Similar measures were adopted at LaPlata about forty miles southeast of here.

CONFERENCE ON INDIAN AFFAIRS MAY BE DELAYED

London, Aug. 28—It is reported from Simla today that there is a likelihood of the round table conference on Indian affairs being postponed until the spring when the atmosphere will be more propitious. One of the arguments in favor of such a postponement is the cruelty of expecting the Indian delegates to spend November in London.

BEBE DANIELS HOLDS RECORD

Hollywood, Aug. 28—A Hollywood statistician reveals that Jack Mulhall has appeared in more pictures than any other star or featured player. His total is 300. Bebe Daniels claims 288, while Bety Compson, has kept count up to 219.

Mary Pickford and Norma Tallmadge, who of late have been limiting their annual appearances to one picture, or perhaps two at the most, both have figured to total about 200.

GRANDSON OF DR. H. S. BRIGDES WINS PRIZE

St. John, Aug. 28—Frederick Stevens, of Montreal, grandson of Dr. H. S. Bridges, superintendent emeritus of the Saint John schools, has won the Edward Wentworth Beatty scholarship of \$500 for four years as leader in all Canada in classics in the McGill matriculation examinations, it was announced last night, and New Brunswickers will be glad to extend congratulations to the successful scholar and will be inclined to think that his aptitude in classical studies is in large measure inherited from his grandfather, Dr. Bridges. Frederick Stevens is the son of Mr. and Mrs. F. M. Stevens and his father is in the employ of the Robert Reford Company in Montreal. His mother was formerly Miss Hazel Bridges, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. H. S. Bridges, of this city. The scholarship winner is just 16 years of age and he made a total of 897 marks out of a possible 1,000 in the McGill matriculation examination. He led his class in the Westmount High School this year.

1706 TEAPOT BRINGS \$1900 SPOON 400

London, Aug. 28—A hexagonal teapot weighing only 17 ounces, produced in 1706, was sold at Hurbombs for more than \$1900 and a spoon dated 1533 brought \$400.

Mr. Pennoyer will have addressed various outdoor and indoor meetings in these four provinces. They will return to their home in Chelsea Mass., the first part of September.

ALBERT COUNTY MAN KILLED BY AN AUTOIST

Hopewell Hill, Aug. 27—Ernest Hoar, 55 years of age, a well-known resident of this locality, who was struck by an automobile while riding his bicycle through the village last evening on his way to his home on the Chemical Road, died at the McClellan Memorial Hospital at Riverside this morning, never having fully recovered consciousness. His tragic death is the cause of deep regret throughout the community, where he was held in high regard and greatly liked by all who knew him.

The deceased was struck by an auto driven by Coun. C. J. Carnsworth while bicycling near here on Tuesday. He was taken at once to the hospital, but failed to rally.

An inquest was held this afternoon before Dr. B. J. Dash, coroner, of Hillsboro, in the Riverside hall. The jury, after hearing the evidence of four witnesses, including Mr. Carnsworth, the driver of the car, rendered a verdict of accidental death, with the belief expressed that Mr. Carnsworth had done everything possible to avoid a collision. The jury was composed of M. D. Fullerton, foreman; Charles H. Bray, Lowell Smith, Blair Geldart, Earl E. Robinson and Odel Stiles.

A THRILLING RESCUE IN NEW YORK HARBOR

Freighter Rams a Scow Goes Down With its Captain

MEMBERS OF THE CREW SAVED

Night Was Intensely Dark When Collision Occurred

New York, N. Y., Aug. 28—The Clyde Mallory freighter Neches rammed a scow at the entrance to the bay early today and sank with the loss of the captain, but the twenty-five members of the crew were fished out of the water in one of the harbor's most thrilling night rescues. The Neches, outward bound for Key West, Tampa and Mobile, was slipping silently through the narrows shortly after midnight.

The night was intensely dark, a haze shutting out all light from the sky. As the vessel passed Fort Wabsworth at the entrance to the Bay the scow loomed ahead, and before Captain Eber Estes could slow down or swerve, the crash came.

WAR VETERAN SHAKEN UP IN ACCIDENT

Lee McCutcheon, Great War veteran, narrowly escaped serious injury last evening, when the wheel of the car which he was driving came off and threw the machine into a ditch on the Hanwell Road.

Mr. McCutcheon luckily escaped with only a few minor scratches and rather a severe shaking up. The car was towed to the city for repairs this morning. The driver was able to be around this morning not much the worse of the accident.

New Delhi, India, Aug. 28—A new working committee of the All-India Congress was formed today shortly after the announcement that ten members of the old committee, arrested yesterday after the organization had been declared unlawful had been sentenced to six months imprisonment.

Head of Peruvian Military Junta Hailed as a Hero

Lieut. Col. Cerro Arrives at Lima by Airplane and Was Given the Reception of a Conqueror—Was the Instigator of the Recent Revolt Which Resulted in Leguia's Overthrow.

LIMA, Peru, Aug. 28—Hailed as a national hero and given the reception of a conqueror when he arrived here from Arequipa by airplane yesterday afternoon, Lt. Col. Luis F. Sanchez Cerro was at the head of a new military junta, or committee, charged with conducting the government of Peru today. Sanchez Cerro instigated the original revolt at the Arequipa Garrison which resulted in the overthrow of President Augusto B. Leguia. Yesterday he succeeded the military committee headed by General Manuel Maria Ponce and formed his own government.

GUARDSMEN SUCCUMB TO SUN STROKE

London, Aug. 28—Four members of a guards regiment participating in manoeuvres near Pierbright, Surrey, died from sun-stroke today as Great Britain sweltered in the third day of an unusual heat wave. The death of the guardsmen brought the heat wave fatalities throughout Great Britain to fourteen. Several other guardsmen were reported in critical condition from the effects of the heat.

5,000 DIGGERS STAMPEDE TO THE DIAMONDS

Johannesburg, South Africa, Aug. 28—Five thousand diamond diggers are participating in a rush on the Lichtenburg townlands about 120 miles west of here. For days all the roads to the townlands have carried a constant stream of automobiles, vans and carts, and a mushroom town has sprung up.

The rush is being conducted by a ballot system. None of the diggers can cross the starting line before his name is drawn by the mining commissioner. Early operations were successful and revealed diamonds of fair size and exceptional quality.

WILD FOWLERS MUST NOT USE AIRPLANES

Montreal, Que., Aug. 27—Although nothing is said about airships perhaps because there are not enough—R-100's running loose in Canada, the department of the interior, in issuing instructions for the impending hunting season, makes it clear that airplanes may not be used to bring down the ducks and geese. Boats, either sail or power, and automobiles and buggies are also taboo as a means of getting the bag. So are machine guns and batteries. The season opens in some provinces on September 1st and the Canadian National Railways tourist department is already busy making arrangements for visitors from the United States as well as from Canadian centres.

COMMITTEE IS DECLARED TO BE UNLAWFUL

Madras, India, Aug. 28—The working committee of the All India Congress was declared unlawful by the Madras government today on the grounds that "the committee has as its object interference with the administration of law and order and constitutes a danger to the public peace."

GOLF COURSE ON RIVER BOAT

Pomeroy O., Aug. 28—Betsy Ann, the trim little Ohio river packet on separate occasions to the Chris Greene and the Tom Greene is first in at least one thing.

She claims the distinction of having the first miniature golf course installed on any of the river packet boats. The tiny course recently was laid on the hurricane deck of the steamer.

The plant at which Reynolds works caught on fire and the wedding was stopped until he could check up on the extent of the damage.

Fighting Hard

Miss Margaret Guthrie, daughter of Col. and Mrs. P. A. Guthrie, city, received a telegram this afternoon from her parents, who are at the bedside of their son, Ronald, seriously injured in an automobile crash a few days ago at Hanson, Mass. The injured youth is lying in the Brockton hospital in a very serious condition with concussion of the brain, a punctured lung, and other complications. The telegram stated that Ronald was operated upon last night, an incision being made in his throat to allow him to breathe. He is still in an unconscious state. All efforts are being made to save the life of the Fredericton youth.
