Proposal for Tarrit Of Ten Per Cent for Revenue Purposes

Panel of British Ministers Who Are Arranging for the Imperial Conference Will Consider the Matter—A Rebate is Suggested for the Dominions—Die Hard Traders Opposed to it.

LONDON, Aug. 11—A proposal that Britain should impose a general tariff of ten per cent for revenue purposes with a rebate for the Dominions will come before the panel of Ministers who have been appointed to make arrangements for the forthcoming Imperial Conference.

This suggestion has been submitted in a memorandum written by H. D. Henderson head of the government's economic advisory staff and a former editor of the weekly paper, the Nation, which is a Liberal publication.

The proposal is regarded as almost revolutionary by die hard free traders like Right Hon. Philip Snowden and the Daily Herald. The government's organ says it will have to be subjected to the closest and most critical examination.

NEW MINISTERS ARE KEPT BUSY AT THE CAPITAL

Premier Bennett to Welcome British Jurists at Quebec Tomorrow.

Ottawa, Aug. 10—Nomination day—Aug. 25—for by-elections necessitated by appointments to the new Conservative cabinet, will find the majority of ministers back in their constituencies.

While the Dominion Elections Act does not require that they present themselves at nomination proceedings, and acclamations are fully expected, the present intention of the majority of the ministers is to be present in their constituencies for the occasion.

Premier R. B. Bennett will be in Quebec on Tuesday and in Toronto on Friday. The Prime Minister will leave here on Tuesday afternoon for Quebec to meet distinguished British jurists who will attend the annual meeting of the Canadian Bar Association. Premier Bennett will be back in the Capital on Wednesday; and on Thursday night he will leave for Toronto to be present on Friday at the annual meeting of the Association.

Cabinet Meetings

Wedged in between these trips will be one if not two meetings of cabinet. The first sitting of the week will be on Wednesday.

There are no new developments in regard to the post of Canadian High Commissioner in London. A communication, it is understood, has reached the Prime Minister from Hon. Vincent Massey asking for an expression of the views of the Premier in the matter. There is no official statement available on the note which has just been received. Rumors for some time past have suggested that General A. D. McRae, Vancouver, might assume the task.

Had Good Majority

Returns from the election in the Yukon where George Black, a nephew of John Black of this city was the successful Conservative candidate have come to hand. Mr. Black's majority over Dr. W. E. Thompson was 297. The vote stood Black 847, Thompson, 550.

100,000 ON STRIKE IN PARIS

Paris, August 11—Approximately 100,000 workers joined thousands of other strikers in Northeastern France today in the dispute over wages and insurance problems affecting factory labor. The general labor confederation in the towns of Roubaix, Tourcoing, Halluin and Lannoy has offered its members to lay down their tools whenever increase in wages is refused. At Rouen, employers have conceded a six per cent increase in wages. Textile workers were emphatic in their objections to the national insurance act, with its "good-conduct" clause, which the government proposed to put in force. Under it an accumulated sum would be paid each year to employees, provided attendance at work had been regular.

TO MAKE FARM LAND AVAILABLE

London, Eng., August 11—Land among Great Britain's green fields will be made more freely available for small farmers by a new agricultural policy proposed by the Labor government today. A long-awaited statement was made in the House of Commons by Philip Snowden, chancellor of the exchequer, for Premier MacDonald that an agricultural land utilization corporation would be established, if Parliament would so vote, to conduct large scale farms under business management.

LORD DAWSON SAILS TODAY FOR CANADA

London, August 11—Lord Dawson of Penn, the King's physician, has sailed with his wife and daughter for Canada. Lord Dawson will attend the meeting of the British Medical Association in Winnipeg late this month.

THE R-100 PAYS A VISIT TO THE CAPITAL

Carrillon Bells Sounded the Notes of Rule Britannia as Big Dirigible Flew Over the Peace Tower.

Ottawa, Aug. 10—After facing a head wind that retarded its progress throughout its trip from Montreal, the British dirigible, R-100 reached Ottawa at 10 o'clock E.D.T. tonight.

Thousands of people who had stood for hours on Parliament Hill awaiting the arrival of the giant airship, cheered as the silvery shape loomed in the night sky.

As the airship approached the Peace Tower in the Parliament Buildings, the bells of the Carrillon changed forth the notes of "Rule Britannia" as a greeting. As a salutation to Canada's war dead, the ship dipped its nose over the Peace Tower, which contains within its walls, the chamber of remembrance.

During the next half hour the dirigible circled over the city, its metallic hue made lustrous by the searchlights playing over the city. From the ground people craned their necks to gain sight of Britain's greatest contribution to the conquest of the air.

At Ottawa, the R-100 hooked up with radio station CNRO and messages of greeting were broadcast from the ship by officers. Two telegrams were read, one from the Commandant of Shirley Camp, Connaught Rangers, where the Dominion Rifle Association are holding their met, commencing tomorrow, and the other from Carleton Place, Ont., asking that the ship pass over these points.

The reply from the ship said that they would at once start for the Connaught Ranges, and would also go a little out of their way to fly over Carleton Place on its way to Aoronto. The start for Connaught Ranges was made about 11 p.m. D. S. T.

In the estate of Joseph McCutcheon, farmer of Prince William, letters of administration were granted to Adelbert McCutcheon, Prince William. The estate was sworn at \$2,709.50, \$500 real and the balance personal. In the estate of Charles O'Connor, retired barrister, of this city letters of administration were granted to the Maritime Trust Company on the petition of Sarah Sharkey and Agnes D. McTavish, both of Toronto the only surviving relatives of the deceased. The estate was sworn at \$9,000 all personal.

A Former Pastor Heard

Rev. Dr. J. D. Freeman, a former pastor, occupied the pulpit of the Brunswick Street Baptist Church last evening in the absence of Rev. Dr. Camp, who is on a vacation. Dr. Freeman is a native of Nova Scotia, where he was twenty nine years ago, went to the Bloor Street Baptist Church, Toronto. Later he removed to England, where he remained for a number of years. At present he is on the staff of a large University in the State of Georgia. The Reverend Doctor is receiving a cordial welcome from many old friends.

ISMET PASHA WILL RESIGN IS PREDICTED

Turkish Cabinet On Verge of An Upset

WAS OPPOSED TO WAR SCHEME

Did Not Condone Government's Financial Policy

Angora, Turkey, Aug. 11—The resignation of Premier Ismet Pasha in November was predicted today in connection with indications of a general change in cabinet offices.

It was said Ismet Pasha would retire on the grounds that he disapproves the government's financial policy and his belligerent attitude towards Persia, especially in connection with recent Turkish demands that Persia aid in halting the Kurdish frontier uprising.

The Home Rulers Of India to Talk Over Peace Terms

Congress Leaders Will Confer With Gandhi at the Yeravda Jail—The Campaign Has Paralyzed Business in Some Sections of the Country.

BOMBAY, India, Aug. 11—Peace terms will be discussed among the leaders of the Home Rule civil disobedience movement Wednesday at the Yeravda Jail.

Mahatma Ghandi, leader of the nation-wide passive resistance campaign, which has paralyzed the business in some sections, will discuss with other congress leaders the possible peace terms that might be negotiated with the government.

Motilal Nehru and Jawahala Nehru will participate in the discussions. They will go to Poona from Allahabad under escort. Sir Tej Bahadur Sapru, who will act as an intermediary between the congress leaders and the government will go to Poona today.

C. N. R. DOCK AT VANCOUVER WAS BURNED

Vancouver, B.C., Aug. 12—The new Canadian National Railways dock at the foot of Main street was almost totally destroyed by fire late this afternoon.

The blaze for a time threatened several oil tanks at the land end of the dock, but fire-fighters, who gathered from all sections of the city to fight the outbreak, managed to keep the flames from getting at the tanks, one of which was drained as an emergency.

Preliminary estimates place the damage at \$1,200,000. Veteran fire-fighters stated it was the second worst blaze in Vancouver's history. Cause of the blaze is not known, but it is stated that the fire started with a sudden puff at the waer end of the long shed.

The dock was to have officially opened before the end of this month. It was used as a birth for Canadian National vessels for the past month, and only the finishing touches remained to be completed. No boats were tied up at the pier at the time of the blaze.

SMOKING MA CAUSES DEATH OF HER INFANT

Derby, England, August 11—Mrs. Harold Walker took her five-month-old daughter for an arising in a perambulator and at the same time took a smoke. Before calling on a friend she smothered the cigarette, putting the stump at the foot of the perambulator, in order to have another smokes. Later a laborer, from a distance, saw the perambulator on fire. A verdict of death from suffocation was returned.

MUST PAY TAXES ON LOST SUM

New York, August 11—Six heirs to \$199,734 face the prospect of paying on inheritance tax of \$746 each and receiving no legacy. The residuary estate of Aaron de Cordova, prominent in Wall Street, was wiped out in the stock market crash.

HENRY FORD IN FAVOR OF PROTECTION

Flivver King Favors a High Tariff for Canada—Unemployment Result of Ignorance.

Windsor, Ont., Aug. 10—Henry Ford favors a high tariff for Canada, according to statements in an exclusive interview with the Border Cities Star.

"I see no reason to object to the raising of the tariff schedules in Canada," he said. "Though I'm not a tariff advocate in the United States the situation of the two countries is quite different."

"The United States has attained industrial maturity and should be able to stand on her own feet in competition with the world, but Canada is still in the formative stage, industrially, and if a higher tariff will foster industry there, who can object to that."

Sees Great Future

Mr. Ford considers Canada a great country commercially, but says that is not a tithe of what it will become. He says that differences in cost of making cars in the United States and Canada is as a matter of quality and that the price of Ford products in any country are not based on tariff difference, but only on the cost of manufacture.

Calls It Ignorance

Regarding the unemployment situation Mr. Ford expressed the opinion that it was because too many people had their minds centered on money and not enough on work.

"Unemployment," he says, "is not a natural phenomenon; it is the visible result of the general ignorance of economic health laws."

He foresees a 10-month industrial year in the auto industry as one of the means of correcting present difficulties. Such an adjustment will take time, he says, but it will work out just like the eight-hour day and the five-day week.
