The Former Bishop of Oxford Opposed to Birth Control

Rev. Dr. Gore Leader of the Anglo Catholics,
Planning to Make a Solemn Repudiation of
the Sanction of the Lambeth Conference—A
Meeting to be Held in London Soon.

LONDON, Aug. 20—Rev. Dr. Gore, former Bishop of Oxford and leader of the Anglo-Catholics, is planning to make a formal and solemn repudiation of the Lambeth conference sanction of birth control, according to the Daily Herald today.

In this connection, it is likely that a great meeting of Anglo-Catholics and other churchmen who are firmly opposed to the bishops report will be held in London next month. They desire that they cannot reconcile their principles with the bishop's declaration that married couples might practice birth control by the use of contraceptives if they had "any clearly moral obligation to do so."

CHARGES U. S. SEEKS TO DOMINATE

Cambridge, Eng., Aug. 20—I. C. Hannah, a lecturer at Cambridge University, addressing a group of summer students today said: "America is a nation which can not always govern itself but thinks it can govern the rest of the world."

"I never have seen worse government than when I was in Chicago. America is building up a new empire of financial domination of all parts of the world. It used to be said, in the days of Queen Victoria, that trade followed the flag. Britain today is finding that it is not necessarily her own trade. We are finding that we are patrolling and policing a great part of the world for American trade."

GREAT CITY IF IT IS EVER FINISHED

New York, August 20—This ought to be a great city if it ever is finished. Thus far this year 1,593 buildings have been razed to make room for new ones, bridges, subways and the like.

POETRY IS TEST NOT BATHTUBS

Williamstown, Aug. 20—Poetry, not bath tubs, is the test of the quality of the civilization, Prof. C. Delisle Burns of the University of Glasgow told members of the Institute of Politics today.

Judging American culture on this basis, Burns concluded that the new world has extended the foundations for a new civilization, but had not yet built on them.

Burns said that for all her trains, automobiles and evidence of material prosperity, America had nothing to compare with the work of Shakespeare or Beethoven.

However, he added, the industrialism of America may produce poetry, admitting that a man can use a bath tub and still be a poet.

Yusuke Tsurumi, former member of the Japanese Diet, said Japan sought to be custodian of oriental culture and the harmonizer of the civilization of east and west. He expressed concern at the possible effects of Japanese culture of the industrial civilization of the east.

U. S. TOUR PARTY PLEASED WITH MARITIMES

Moncton, N. B. Aug. 20—"All of our party were exceedingly charmed with scenic beauties of the Maritimes and Cape Breton particularly appealed to them, especially the trip over the Bras d'Or Lakes" Prof. C. A. Adams of the tour party stated on his arrival here today with the party which is travelling via Canadian National Railways. They stopped at the Nova Scotia hotel in Halifax and considered this one of the finest hotels in Canada. The party visited also the Evangeline country and Prince Edward Island and were much impressed with what they saw. They left Moncton this afternoon for Saint John and Fredericton, N. B., from where they will proceed to Montreal.

BOYS CHARGED WITH MURDER AT CAMBRIDGE

Believed to Have Inflicted Fatal Injuries on A. T. McPherson Formerly of Hampton, N. B.

Cambridge, Mass., August 19—Three boys, the oldest of whom was but 18 years were arraigned before Judge Arthur P. Stone in the Third District Court in East Cambridge today, charged with the murder of Allan T. McPherson, formerly of Hampton, N. B., who died after a beating he received when he went to the aid of a Cambridge police officer on August 2.

John A., and Martin A. Donohue, brothers, who were held first on an assault and battery charge, and after the death of McPherson on August 12, were charged with the murder, were released and declared to be innocent of any part in the assault, as the result of information subsequently received by the police.

The boys now charged with the crime are: Theodore Kinzler, 17, of 115 1-2 Hampshire street; John Costa, 18, of 746 Main street; and Vito Ananie 15, 42-A Union street, all of Cambridge. They were held without bail for the grand jury.

On August 4, MacPherson, who lived at 29 Putnam street, with his wife and two children, went to the assistance of a policeman. After the wagon had gone, hoodlums set upon MacPherson and beat him so badly that he was taken to a Cambridge hospital. After the affray, the Donohue brothers were arrested, but after a thorough police investigation, they have been freed absolved from any part in the assault.

Seek Two Others

The police are seeking two others mission for the City of Cambridge believed to be implicated in the attack.

A resolution has been filed with the State Legislature seeking permission to pay MacPherson's widow \$5000 as a moral obligation, and numerous benefits are planned. The youngest MacPherson child is but one month old.

AVALANCHES SNUFF OUT 4 ON MONT. BLANC

Total of 100 Deaths
Since January on
Alps

TWO STUDENTS WERE VICTIMS

Tourists Being Warned
To Take Guides With
Them

Chamoix, France, Aug. 20—Avalanches on Mont Blanc killed four persons today, making a total of 100 deaths in the Alps since January. The last four killed included two brothers named Pierson who were students in Paris. The unusually high death toll among mountain climbers was due to a heavy rain or a strong sun melting the snow. Authorities advise guides to warn tourists against the danger of climbing alone and it was said conditions were dangerous even when guides were present.

HEARING IN MURDER CASE ON THURSDAY

Isabel Carr, Charged
with Mrs. C. N. Clark
Murder Will Be Given
Preliminary Hearing
in Police Court To-
morrow at 10 a. m.

The preliminary hearing of Isabel Carr, 19-year-old domestic, charged with the terrible murder of her mistress, Mrs. C. N. Clark, aged 90, will open tomorrow morning in the local police court at ten o'clock. Because of the gross features of the case, it is highly probable that the public will be excluded from the hearing.

James Forest, aged 20, said to have been a former suitor of the Carr girl, and an employee of the Canada Construction Company at Campbellton, will appear tomorrow as a material witness. Forest was brought here last night by Provincial Police constables. Subpoena was served on young Forest, when it became known that he had previously been "keeping company" with Miss Carr for about a year.

New Evidence

Both the local and the Provincial police have been busy during the past two weeks on the case, and will have, it is rumored, many new points of evidence other than was disclosed at the inquest some time ago.

The witnesses heard at the inquest into the death of 90-year-old Mrs. Clark have again been subpoenaed for the preliminary hearing tomorrow morning.

C. R. Hawkins, city, is counsel for the Carr servant girl, while C. L. Dougherty is the prosecuting attorney for the Crown. The case has aroused the feeling of the community as no other in many years.

FRENCH ACE IS DELAYED BY WEATHER

Mrs. MacPherson Denies That She Hit Her Mother

Evangelist Admitted Newspaper Men to Her Sick Room and Declared That There Has Been a Slight Argument—Says Her Mother Fell in a Tantrum and Broke Her Nose.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 20—Although suffering from a serious nervous breakdown Mrs. Aimee Semple MacPherson, the Evangelist admitted newspapermen to her sick room today to deny the story that she had knocked her mother down in a quarrel.

"I never would strike mother, never" cried the evangelist, "We did have a slight argument, but mother received the broken nose when she threw herself downward on the floor in a tantrum. The argument was the result of some unkind remarks mother was said to have made about Angelus Temple employees."

Has Lost Her Sight

Los Angeles, Calif., Aug. 20—Aimee Semple MacPherson, evangelist, was reported today by her private secretary, Emma Schaffer, to have gone blind. Miss Schaffer said she had spent the night with Mrs. MacPherson at Hamilton Beach cottage, where she said, the evangelist was fighting to regain her sight. The secretary made the announcement to newspapermen.

IMPROVING NEW BRUNSWICK DAIRY STOCK

For several years there has been a prosperous Jersey Calf Club at Gagetown, and at a meeting of the directors held not long ago it was decided to buy a Jersey sire for the use of the club members, and others interested in the breed. This is in with the policy laid down by the department of Agriculture, who do not place calf clubs where there are no Agricultural Societies to assist in promoting the work.

The bull that has been purchased for them by Jas. Bremner, Eastern Jersey Fieldman, comes from the well known herd of B. H. Bull & Son, Brampton, Ontario. This new bull is a son of the great herd sire Stalebread of Woodlawn, whose dam is a daughter of the famous old sire Combination's Premier, that sold for \$13,000 at auction when 13 years of age. She has a record of 700 lbs. of fat. For a dam the Gagetown bull has the well known show cow in the herd of Senator Hardy, at Brockville, namely Parkfield Prudence. Not only is she a famous prize winner, but she also has a 350 day record of 618 lbs. of fat. Senator Hardy paid \$2,100 for this great cow at auction.

This bull was always held at \$500 but the Gagetown district was fortunate in getting a special price on him.
