British Bankers to Help Clients Carry Their Securities

At a Secret Meeting They Decided to Reverse the Policy Which Hitherto Had Caused a Slump on the London Stock Exchange—Will Relieve Depression.

LONDON, Aug. 21—There is more cheerful news for British business men today. At a secret meeting of the directors of five leading banks, it was decided to reverse the policy which hitherto has caused the slump in shares on the London Stock exchange.
Instead of calling in loans, they will now help reputable firms to carry their shares, which will keep them off the market and prevent quotations being forced down. While no public announcement of this is being issued, it is understood that the banks have decided on a common policy.
The necessity for such action has been frequently demonstrated in recent months, and the news of the new policy should infuse some optimism in the stock exchange which has been suffering from psychological depression in harmony with industry.

KING ALFONSO GIVES OATH TO NEW MINISTER

Santander, Spain, August 21—King Alfonso administered the oath of office here yesterday to the new ministers of finance and national economy appointed as a result of the resignation of former finance minister, Manuel Arguelles, due to Spain's purported financial crisis.
Dr. Julio Wais, who held the portfolio of National Economy, took the oath as finance minister, and Luis Viguria, new member of the Cabinet was sworn in as Minister of National Economy.

6 DROWNED WHEN YACHT HITS ROCKS

Polperro, Cornwall, August 20—The motor yacht Islander was swept on the rocks of Lantivet Bay by a violent gale last night and wrecked. Five men and one woman were reported drowned. The royal yacht squadron craft was forced ashore three miles from Polperro, while participating in the squadron's regatta.

RUSIAGORNISH MAN MET DEATH AT KENTVILLE

Kentville, N. S. Aug. 20—A. T. Noble, 42, of Kentville, formerly of Russia-gornish, foreman of Canadian National and Canadian Pacific telegraph lines between Windsor and Annapolis, was instantly killed at 7.53 o'clock this morning, when the motor trolley on which he and two other linemen were traveling to Wolfville was crashed by two D. A. R. Light engines two and one-half miles east of Kentville.
Lewis Threan and Austin Hicks escaped death by jumping. The engines were proceeding from Grand Pre to Kentville, after having brought a special train from Truro, which conveyed hundreds of New Brunswick and Quebec Acadians to the Acadian celebration held at Grand Pre today.
Curve Hides Lorry
When Engineer Wilmer Lockhart, driving the first engine, rounded a curve near the New Minas Fruit Co. warehouse, he saw the motor trolley only some 20 feet away. Threan and Hicks leaped to safety, but Noble, in control of the trolley, stayed, stopped the motor, an dmet his death.
Noble came to Kentville about a year ago from Fredericton Junction.

CAT KILLS BIRD IN TREE TAKES 30-FOOT FALL

Newark, O., Aug. 21—A remarkable bird-catching stunt by a black cat in a tree top, while a large crowd watched below, was enacted here recently. The bird, singing on a slender limb 30 feet above ground, attracted the attention of the cat, which stealthily climbed the tree. From a vantage point it leaped, hooked and held the bird with one paw, but lost its own balance and tumbled through the branches to the ground. The animal lighted on its feet, apparently unhurt. The bird was dead.

CELEBRATION AT GRAND PRE A BIG SUCCESS

Thousands Present at the 175th Anniversary of the Expulsion of the Acadians.
Grand Pre, N. S. Aug. 20—Today in this romantic spot Evangeline returned again to the scenes of her childhood and courtship in the persons of comely descendants her people who were excited in the tragic removal of those far off days when France and England played for a Gigantic stake, over Lordship of the continent of North America, dressed in the quaint costumes of the strenuous time thirty maidens of Louisiana visited the scenes indelibly portrayed by Longfellow and his poem, Evangeline. The forest primeval the murmuring places and the Hemlock have since departed from the scene but they still stand the willow trees planted by the hardy Acadian pioneers and which have withstood the storms and tempests of the centuries brooding over the tragic scenes of long ago and Gargiel was not forgotten for his direct descendant over the self same fields he himself trod when he wooed the fair Evangeline, yet their descendants talked not of strife; forgotten are the animosities that were endured by the act of forcible removal.
Weather Favorable

The day broke with a slight mist but as the morning wore on the sky cleared and by the time the ceremonies had commenced the sun shone forth in all his glory shedding as it were a benediction over the scene of two virile races now united in one common allegiance and a steadfast purpose of making Canada great among the units of the Empire. A large throng attended the 175th anniversary of the removal of the Acadians from the land of Acadia. Special trains brought numerous crowds to witness ceremonies and which was a special Canadian National Railways train with Acadians from New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, the delegation from New Brunswick includes Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, Premier of the Province and Hon. Chief Justice Leblanc of the New Brunswick Supreme Court, there were present also Hon. Pascal Poirier of Shediac, N. B. Dean of the Dominion Senate, his Honor Justice Arsenault of Charlottetown, P. E. I. H. H. Melanson, assistant vice-President of traffic, Canadian National Railways, himself a Canadian. Born at Scoudouc, N. B. and whose ancestors were among the earliest settlers of Grand Pre and others. His Hon. the Lieut. Governor of Nova Scotia, J. A. Torry, headed the list of speakers which included besides representatives of the church, Government officials, prominent Acadians and others. At the conclusion of the colorful ceremonies the Louisiana party left for Halifax. They will leave tomorrow night for Memramcook, the seat of St. Joseph College, the highest seat of learning in the Maritimes for the Acadians. From College Bridge the party will continue on their Journey via the National System to Quebec and from there to Montreal visiting Niagara Falls before they return home.

NEW ZEALAND RETALIATES AT CANADA

Withdraws Tariff Preference On Canadian Cars
PREMIER FORBES ANNOUNCES IT
Might Replace Preference on Canada's Reciprocation

Wellington, N. Z., August 21—Withdrawal of the tariff preference on Canadian motor vehicles and accessories starting today was announced by Premier Forbes.
The Premier said he was willing to replace the preference pending conclusion of a trade agreement provided Canada would reciprocate by continuing the preference for New Zealand.

LONE BANDIT GOT \$7000 IN BANK HOLDUP

Calgary, Alta., August 20—Unmasked and alone, a bandit walked into the Below Park branch of the Bank of Montreal early this afternoon, and at the point of a nickel-plated revolver forced the bank teller to hand over a roll of bills amounting to approximately \$7,500, then backed out of the door and disappeared.
H. H. W. Feyerstein, the teller, was alone in the bank at the time, the manager, W. T. Woodward being out for lunch.
He telephoned the city police immediately after the robber disappeared and described the bandit as similar in appearance, actions and dress to the unknown man who shot Ernest Midwinter, taxi driver, to death after robbing him on the Okotoks road Saturday night.

Menace of Quick Distribution of Air Forces Seen

Rear Admiral Hepburn of the U. S. Navy Thinks It Will Be a Real Danger in the Next War—Refers to Predictions of a Two Hours War—War Against "Butter Bootleggers".

WILLIAMSTOWN, Mass., Aug. 21—Rear Admiral J. Hepburn former chief of staff of the United States navy, admitted in a speech at the institute of politics today that the menace of quick distribution by air forces in the next war is a real danger.
The admiral referred to predictions of a "two hour war" in which large numbers of aircraft might wreck great havoc quickly in large centres of population by the use of explosives, incendiary bombs and lethal gas.
Butter Bootleggers
Philadelphia, Pa., Aug. 21—War was planned against "butter bootleggers" today by the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture after disclosure that thousands of house wives were being cheated by the distribution of re-churned and watered butter in this section.

ITALY AND RUSSIA SIGN TRADE PACT

Rome, Aug. 21—Signature of a trade agreement between Italy and Russia furnishes a good explanation of Italy's attitude toward Aristide Briand's plan for a United States of Europe, which she officials declared she could not favor unless all the countries of Europe, implying of course Russia, were included.
This agreement was signed in Rome Saturday. It is considered destined to give Italy and Russia all the advantages that they might have obtained from any United States of Europe plan.
Italy, with a great number of well equipped factories which have been greatly handicapped because of a lack of raw materials, agrees to furnish Russia with manufactured articles almost at a cost in return for which she receives material at an equally great reduction.
Under the new agreement, Italy will exchange finished machinery, such as tractors, automobiles and electrical motors for Russian oils, wheat wood and other raw products.
This agreement has not been officially published as yet, but it is understood that Italy's first shipments in the next few months will have a value of \$25,000,000.
