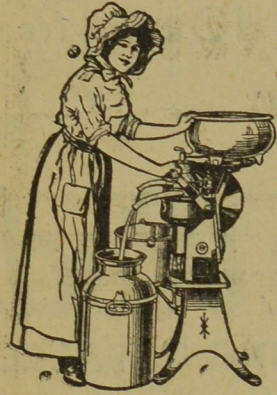

JOHN HUNTER REPLIES TO MRS. HAGERMAN

Reiterates Statement
Made in a Previous
Letter in Regard to
Prohibition.

The Editor, Daily Mail,

Dear Sir:—

My attention has been attracted to a letter in reply to an article of mine that appeared in your valued columns some three weeks ago (8th April), and though the reply may have required serious consideration, yet, three weeks seems to be a tardy response.

The many initials that follow the above signature, W. C. T. U. explains somewhat, that delay.

In a certain measure I am glad to find a woman had sufficient moral courage to protest against what she deemed to be some very adverse reflections made upon present day, so-called Christian propaganda. If my correspondent will again look over her letter of the 25th inst. she will perceive our thoughts accord where the Lord is concerned, and further, that the quotations she takes is also the authority I quote in that article which disposes of onehalf of that belated reply, as we both seem to have a little faith in God. But, it is just here where we begin to separate—by even suggesting doubts upon the wisdom and power of a Creator—and the substituting of human supposition, controverting the written Word is sufficient evidence to show my correspondent has failed to interpret her very reliable authority, and also the article referred to.

Yes, we have some very intelligent people, stiff necked, and proud people, which in many cases is the opposite of innocence, simplicity, or of humbleness, as stipulated essentials in our Christian faith. Further: Regarding the raising of Mr. Dawes to such exalted company I entirely disagree from your correspondent and claim this distinction belongs to an Englishman, our late British Ambassador for years and years at Washington, and up even to a very recent date. Now what was his name? Of course his successor Sir Ronald Lindsay or the American Consul may tell us.

Apparently it is an accepted fact that Mr. Hunter was born in England, in a country where the women and children do things two and three times a day. Yes, I noticed recently that a very beautiful, exalted lady was shown the intricate production of a glass of beer, and did not faint, smiled rather. The same lady some time ago selected the good wine that should go around the world with those who were very dear to her, was as anxious as a similar mother two thousand years ago, and from a very opposite circumstance. However, it's worse than that, but, the only plausible, extenuating circumstance I offer was my extreme youth and want of knowledge at that eventful period, both in the History of Canada and of a little country that's greatest concern is to produce Premiers and Leaders for bewildered humanity to follow. But read my previous article again. It solely applies to false teachings, coercion, confiscation, murder, not Temperance.

CONDUCTOR AL LOGAN HAS QUIT SERVICE

(Telegraph-Journal.)

Making preparation for his last run on the Valley route to Fredericton, which left here last evening at 6 o'clock, A. E. Logan, conductor in the service of the Canadian National Railways, in whose employ he has served for near a half century, received the sad news of the death of his brother, which occurred yesterday morning at St. Stephen.

Conductor Logan comes from a family which took railroading as its chief occupation and during his 46 years of service with the C. N. R. has not had a black mark placed against his record. Officials at the Union depot last night lauded Mr. Logan for the fine record he had attained in the service and it was with regret that the conductor so well known to the traveling public, bade his last farewell and received his orders for his final run.

For the greater part of his railroading career, Conductor Logan has been on the Fredericton-Newcastle run, a period of over 45 years and only last October took over his new duties on the Valley Railway run between Saint John and Fredericton. He entered the old Canada Eastern employ in 1884 and for 20 years served that company until it was taken over by the C. N. R. in 1904. He worked his way up from a helper to the position he held upon his retirement.

Conductor Logan is one of the few oldtime railroad employes of the days of links and chains and jack cars which were operated many years ago, who has all his fingers intact after many years spent at coupling up these old types of cars.

He will leave this morning for St. Stephen, where he will attend the funeral of his brother, John, which will be held on Sunday. His brother had been in the service of the C. P. R. as an engineer for many years.

river banks, where the ground is low, has been at a minimum this year. This is due to the continued cold weather with its effect on the river level. The river has never attained its usual freshet level and expectations are that should there be belated freshets from the melting snows and ice of the northern counties, that it will not reach serious proportions.

Flood Conditions

At the Oromocto Flats, Mauderville and the Jemseg watery roads are the rule, but they are not in grave a state as in former years for reasons above stated. Highways are rapidly clearing up, despite hardly congenial weather. The heavy snows of the past winter, has caused a scarcity of frost, with the results that "boils" have not been as frequent nor as annoying. The cold weather has resulted in a gradual coming out of frost.

The Department of Public Works has found no cause to date to close up any of the roads and the officials of the department are very optimistic over the success of this year's experiment with the New Brunswick highway.

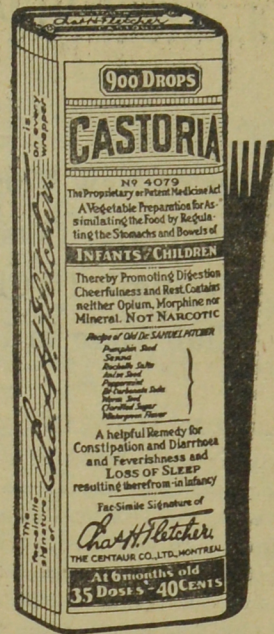

Fresh gaspereaux were a feature, selling for 30 cents per dozen. These are the first gaspereaux to be caught this year. Other prices were about as usual. Following were the prices: Eggs, per dozen, 35 cents; butter, per pound, 40 cents; smoked gaspereaux, per dozen, 40 cents; potatoes, per barrel, \$3.25; beets, per barrel, \$2; carrots, per barrel, \$2; apples, per barrel, \$2 to \$4; maple honey, per bottle, 40 cents; pork, per pound, 15 to 16 cents; veal, per pound, 10 to 16 cents.
