Says That Outlook For World Peace is Better Than Ever

Ex Secretary Frank B. Kellogg, Former Ambassador to Great Britain is Optimistic—Addressed League of Political Education After a Conference With President Hoover.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

NEW YORK, N. Y., March 29—In a speech strongly flavored with optimism Frank B. Kellogg, former Secretary of State and ambassador to the Court of St. James and father of the Kellogg peace pact, told the League of Political Education last night that the outlook for world peace was better than ever before.

It was generally hinted that the text of Kellogg's speech had been preceded by a conference with President Hoover at Washington and the text was issued by the State Department.

After Another Record.

Brooklyn, N. Y., March 29—With 1392 passengers on board, the North German Lloyd liner S. S. Europa sailed shortly after midnight today, in all probability bent upon establishing another trans-Atlantic record.

A VERDICT OF ACQUITTAL RENDERED

Ex-Manager of the Provincial Bank at Campbellton Freed on Conspiracy Charge.

Dalhousie, March 28—Louis J. Bourque former manager of the Provincial Bank at Campbellton, was found not guilty on all five counts on the charge of conspiracy to defraud the bank of \$18,650 by the Restigouche Circuit Court here today. J. W. Sansom, of Campbellton, held on a similar charge was also freed on the decision of the Crown not to prosecute.

When the court opened this morning the defense gave notice that they would offer no evidence and prosecution counsel presented their case to the jury. A. P. N. McLaughlin, for the Crown, reviewed the evidence. He contended that an arrangement between Bourque and Sansom to defraud the bank had been disclosed and that the cheque for \$18,650, drawn by Sansom and cashed by Bourque, was the result of a series of unlawful acts and irregular transactions.

E. R. McDonald, counsel for the defense followed.

The jury was charged at 2 p. m. by Judge McLatchey and retired to deliberate at 3.40, returning to the court room at 4.22. In view of the finding, the prosecution waived the charges against Sansom, both he and Bourque being discharged.

FOUR KILLED IN AUTO CRASH

A LANDSLIDE HAS RENDERED 100 HOMELESS

Rome, March 29—A landslide today wiped out the entire hamlet of Cimelli, near Morlasso on the Slopes of the Appenines, making its population of 100 homeless.

The slide was a third of a mile wide, and moved slowly down the mountain sides, crushing all buildings in its path for more than two miles. The inhabitants warned by the rumbling, fled and were being given shelter today by government agencies.

WEST INDIES TRADE OF MUCH IMPORTANCE

Moncton March 29—Just what the West Indies means to the Maritime Provinces may be gleaned from the fact that since the beginning of the present banana season, 389 carloads of bananas have been brought in by Canadian National steamers and moved out through the port of Halifax, N. S., over the rail line of the National System to Montreal and points west. This number of cars moved in sixteen trains. The record for any single movement was reached yesterday with 42,000 stems which eclipses the previous record by 9,000 stems.

Saturday Market

The market at Phoenix Square this morning was a large one with plenty of produce and prices average. Eggs and butter, the staple products, were very plentiful and sold for varying prices. Eggs went at 30 and 35 cents per dozen, while butter sold for 40 and 45 cents per pound. Other prices were as follows: Pork 16 cents per pound; Beef 10 cents per pound; veal, 10 to 14 cents; Chicken, 45 cents per pound; Fowl, 40 cents; Carrots, \$2 per barrel; potatoes, \$2.50 per barrel.

IS LAYING A CLAIM TO THE MINACO THRONE

London, March 29—Prince Albrecht Von Urach, Count of Wurtemberg has gone to Paris to lay claim to the throne of Monaco, according to the Daily Chronicle's Berlin correspondent.

Von Urach's claim is based on his marriage to the Princess Florentine Chirmaldi of Monaco, the Chirmaldi line were ancient holders of the little principality.

ROADS OF THE PROVINCE NOT TO BE CLOSED THIS SPRING FOR LIGHT MOTOR TRAFFIC

Growth of the use of automobiles for business purposes in New Brunswick and the demand for uninterrupted use of the motor roads of the province, has resulted in an order being placed this afternoon by Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works, whereby instead of the roads being closed to motor vehicle traffic this spring, certain definite restrictions will be put in force during the period the frost is coming out of the ground.

Replacing the complete ban on motor vehicle traffic during the spring season, a speed limit of 20 miles per hour will be strictly enforced during this period and traffic will be restricted to vehicles of a registered weight, not exceeding 3,200 pounds and to commercial vehicles and trucks to a gross combined weight of vehicle and load not exceeding 3,500 pounds. Heavier vehicles will not be permitted to operate on the provincial highways while the restrictions are in force. Restrictions will be lifted as soon as the weather and road conditions make this advisable in the opinion of the engineers.

Admission Barred

Motor vehicles which do not come within the scope of the permission granted by the Minister of Public Works' order will be refused admission to the province during the restricted period at inter-provincial and international boundary points.

Announcement of the decision to keep the motor roads open to automobile traffic this spring was made following the annual conference of the Minister of Public Works with the highways engineers. In a statement which was issued by Hon. Mr. Stewart, pending the preparation of the necessary formal notices which will appear in all the newspapers of the Province, the move which has been made was referred to as an experiment for the benefit of those whose business and avocations demand use of the highways.

As Experiment

The Minister stressed the fact that success of the experiment depends upon the co-operation of the motorists of the province, which he requests. It was further pointed out that the highways engineers will keep in close touch with the conditions of the roads in their districts and if it is found that any road is being seriously damaged by motor traffic during the time that the frost is coming out of the ground they are under orders to immediately close the road to motor traffic.

THE LIVES OF FIFTY-TWO MEN ENDANGERED

Two Vessels Met With Disaster Off the California Coast.

ONE LIKE TO BREAK UP

The Crews Are Reported to Have Been Rescued.

San Francisco, March 29—Fifty-two men endangered when two vessels met disaster in heavy fog off the California coast were reported safe today.

The Japanese freighter Rhine Maru was believed breaking up on the rocks of Point Sur 110 miles south of here and the Schooner Claremont was thought safely beached off the Presidio in San Francisco Bay.

The tug Sea Sailor, is bound for Point Sur to endeavor to tow the Rhine Maru to port.

Paris Newspaper Makes an Attack On the Young Plan

Royalist Organ Says Evacuation of the Mayence Region of the Rhineland Would Lead to War—The Parliament Building Showered With Leaflets From the Air.

PARIS, March 29—The parliament building was showered from the air today with leaflets protesting the Young reparations plan, dropped from airplanes as the Chamber of Deputies prepared to vote on the plan.

The tracts were signed by the Royalist newspaper, Action Francaise which violently attacked the Young plan and said evacuation of the Mayence region of the Rhineland would lead immediately to war.

The chamber hurried its final debate on the plan hoping for a vote late today. Premier Andre Tardieu, after explaining the advances of the plan asked the chamber for unanimous ratification.

PILSUDSKY HAS FAILED IN HIS TASK

Warsaw, Poland, March 29—Jan Pilsudsky, brother of the Polish dictator, Marshall Joseph Pilsudski, informed President Ignacy Moscicki today that he had failed in his efforts to form a new cabinet.

The government whip in parliament, Col. Valerian Slavek, and former Premier Casimir Bartel were mentioned as the president's probable choice to form a cabinet.

SONG WRITER'S WIFE ASKS FOR ALIMONY

Los Angeles, California, March 29—Nacio Herb Brown, writer of such song hits as "Singing in the Rain" and "The Doll Dance", was sued for separate maintenance here today by his wife, Ruby Porter Brown. The composer's wife also asked that he convey to her property valued at \$90,000 which she claimed to have inherited from her father's estate. Mrs. Brown said her husband had an income of \$50,000 and asked \$2,500 a month for support of herself and their son, Junior.

TOWNS SHAKEN BY EARTHQUAKE

Sofia, Bulgaria, March 29—A severe vertical earthquake shook the towns of Borisovgrad and Skobelgo today. The population fled from their homes in alarm.

May Close Roads

"The engineers will keep in close touch with the roads in their district, and, should they consider that any certain road is being seriously damaged, immediately close that road to motor traffic.

NO TRACE YET OF MISSING ST. STEPHEN MAN

St. Stephen, March 28—Search parties are still scouring the country in this vicinity for a trace of John Ryder, 35, who has been missing from his home here since Monday. Although several people, intimate with Ryder have been interviewed since his disappearance, none has seen him.

The provincial police are carrying on the search. They believe him to be one of the two men who disappeared from the woods near St. George on Tuesday, but this was cleared up when Constable Myers, of the St. George detachment, found both men, Ben Lodge, of St. George and another who gave his name as McLaughlin, who is a resident of Bailey's. Constable Myer received a telephone message from the vicinity of Second Falls yesterday that John Ryder was seen in that city. On investigation, he found the man pointed out to him to be McLaughlin.

No communication of any sort has been received by Ryder's relatives, either from himself or friends whom many think he may be visiting.

EVOLVED HAT TILT TO ESCAPE HIS HEADACHE

London, March 29—It is not a striving after notoriety or a love of the bizarre that prompts Admiral of the Fleet Beatty to wear his hats and caps at a jaunty angle.

The famous tilt which the titled sailor favors is due to a cranial conformation which makes the wearing of a hat "on the level" most painful.

This fact is revealed by Lieutenant Commander Geoffrey Rawson in his unofficial biography, "Earl Beatty: Admiral of the Fleet."

Efforts to wear his cap in an orthodox manner caused severe headaches and he finally evolved the Beatty tilt, which is known all over the world.
