FREDERICTON TEAMS ALL WERE VICTORIOUS IN RUGBY SATURDAY

U. N. B. Beat Trojans at Saint John, Score 14. to 0—Local High School Winners Over Saint John High, 16 to 0—Fredericton City Fifteen Whitewashed Moncton by Tune of 20 to 0—City Showed Strength in Victory—Look Like Makings of One of Its Best Teams.

The quantity and quality of football talent in the capital city of the province, was highly demonstrated on Saturday, when the local high school, the City fifteen, and the University of New Brunswick all triumphed. A particularly pleasing feature of the victories too, was the utmost superiority shown by the locals in all three games. All were whitewashes.

The U. N. B. beat the Saint John Trojans by a 14 to 0 score at Saint John. Fredericton High School defeated Saint John High 16 to 0, and Fredericton City, showing a fine early season brand of football trounced the Monctonians to the decisive count of 20 to 0.

The two games played on College Field here were in the nature of a double bill, with the Yellow and Black meeting the Saint John high to start, and Fredericton and Moncton, clashing immediately after in the Provincial League opener.

Hot Sun

Beautiful weather, with a bright hot sun, and not a cloud in the sky featured the games. The day was more appropriate for baseball, and was just like a day in July. Despite this favorable sign, there were plenty of empty seats in the grandstand. The day was really not an ideal football day, and it takes a few raw days for the fans to get the real rugby fever.

The Fredericton City team, by their excellent early season showing on Saturday, should pack in the crowds long before the season is over. Though lacking a regular coach, the Green and White has an aggregation, which is the best since the organization of the team several years by one, Royden Colter. Twice the City team has copped the Provincial League title, and bids fair to get in on the flag flying again in 1930.

J. C. Farthing, coach of the Moncton team, white of hair, and energetic, has a good Hub City outfit this year, but on Saturday his team was just hopelessly outclassed. The capital fifteen, though fumbling to excess and at times dangerously, pulled out well, and showed splendid three quarter line runs, coupled with some timely kicking by Shorty Clark, flying half, covers the position so admirably. Fredericton backfield looked more stylish than any time since their organization two years ago.

New Players

The addition of several new players, mostly new men of the team, have helped the capital outfit, and Manager Royden Colter has high hopes of his team furnishing some stiff competition to any team in the province.

About the only thing which hindered good play Saturday was the local fifteen, was the tendency of some of the new backfield players to fumble at critical points in the game. However, Moncton proved a

F'TON HIGH BEAT ST. JOHN SCORE 16 TO 0

The Fredericton High School football team, coached irregularly this year, without the consistent services of its erstwhile coach, defeated its ancient rivals, Saint John High here on Saturday, in the opening Here of the Interscholastic Rugby league. The score was 16 to 0.

The Yellow and Black, have an unusually light weight team this year, but what they lack in avoirdupois, they more than make up in speed. The backfield, particularly, with such speed merchants as Coveney, Burke, and Swan, as well as George Johnston, captain and brilliant kicking and passing half of the squad, shone in the open field.

Chestnut's Kicking

Swan and Coveney, newcomers this year, showed to particular advantage, the latter scoring two tries and showing dash and ball carrying ability. The combination of Burke-Coveney, was lightning, and gained plenty of yardage for the locals. Johnston, was at all times a triple threat with his touch, passing, and back field handling.

Swan, went over twice in the opening half for swell scores while Burke a hard working three-quarter netted another try on a beautiful solo effort. The score at the end of the first half was 13 to 0. Johnston converted the first two of the Yellow and Black tries.

The second half saw slower action with each squad tiring in the hot, torrid sun. Coveney, who was racing madly about all afternoon, but couldn't seem to score in the opening half, went over in the second period, on a nice play on the inside wing. He and Burke combined, with Coveney, crossing the last chalk mark. The mark stood 16 to 0, when Kilburn failed on the kick. Dr. A. F. VanWart refereed the game.

Clint is a newcomer, and though his passing was not up to snuff in the game on Saturday, he shows great promise. Gammon has a plunging style of running which reminds one of Richards of U. N. B.

Mite Mushy Myrshall, he of the three M's, had lots of go, turned in a good performance. The mite marvel had dash speed and courage and his receiving at half, was almost letter perfect. Almost, at times, he actually picked the oval from beneath the feet of his behemoth teammates, but the ref didn't see it so that's that.

Trites, Vaughan and Campbell are three hefty looking forwards and will mean plenty to the City ere the season is quitted.

Strong Dribble

Fredericton were especially strong in the dribble and open field play, with the visiting team, excelling at kicking at times. Occasionally they got away for nice backfield runs, but the keen defensive work of the capital team stopped any embryo scoring.

Dick Chestnut, burly captain and third liner for the Green and White scored the first three points of the game, soon after play started in the opening half. A beautiful kick from about 20 yards, and at a difficult angle, after Referee Egbert Cass gave the locals a penalty on a kickout from scrum, was the opening.

Thereafter, it was just matter of piling up the points. The local haves and three quarters worked together like clockwork and with little "Mushy" Myrshall handing out pretty passes from behind his scrum, and the three quarters making enormous yardage, one try after another piled up. The score at the end of the first half was 11 to 0. Jimmie Trites fell on the oval across the Moncton goal line near the close of the close of the opening period, making the score 8-0. The try was converted by Chestnut on one of the nicest converts seen here this year.

With about 50 seconds to play, Bud Steen, fleet outside wing, dashed over with the pigskin tucked in his arm, for the final score in the first session. Chestnut failed to convert at a bad angle and the whistle blowing a second later, saw the Green and White leading by 11 to 0.

Second Half

From the start of the second period, the Fredericton team pressed its already looming advantage. "Mushy" Myrshall, who was playing a whale of a game in the picking position, turned in another three points, when he grabbed a loose bouncing ball, to score. When Shorty Clark failed to convert the score was 14 to 0. Fred Campbell front liner, scored another, a short time later. Jenkins' kick from a rather hard position, was a bad one, the ball going almost across the field.

Fast Baby

"Sec" Clark, who plays a fast outside wing, was the medium of the final tally, when he took a peach of a pass from Shorty Clark, the kicking star of the capital backfield. The dark haired, plunging youth made his try in the farthest corner of the golden, and the kick to convert was flubbed by Chestnut.

BALDWIN MAY LINE UP BEHIND BENNETT'S PLAN

London, Oct. 11—A long and bitter political fight on the tariff issue was presaged yesterday by the booming guns of political oratory on both Conservative and Labor sides. Breaking a silence of many weeks, Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, Conservative Leader and former Prime Minister, prophesied in a public statement that the next British general election "guided by the views expressed yesterday by the Imperial Conference," would be fought out chiefly over the tariff question.

Backs Plan

He stated that his party would line up solidly behind proposals brought up by Premier R. B. Bennett of Canada and other Dominion Statesmen for a large increase in the preferential duties in Empire trade.

Meanwhile the First Lord of Admiralty, Rt. Hon. A. V. Alexander, speaking at Leicester, denounced "attempts to use the Conference for stampeding the country into protection." His statement was made before a meeting of the co-operative movement.

"Every effort is being made to stampede the country into a drastic change in our fiscal system and to exploit for this purpose the fact that the Imperial Conference is sitting in London.

"I would say to the worker who thinks that this particular industry would be helped by a tariff that Mr. Churchill was right when he said years ago 'Protection is a good starter but a bad finisher.'

"For as soon as you move from a particular to a general tariff the workers' condition becomes worse. The workers in fact suffer a back door attack upon his standard of life."

It regretted "the complete absence of any response or practical rejoinder on the part of British representatives."

The effect of Mr. Baldwin's declaration on the present confused political situation is expected by experienced commentators to be profound.
